SUDDEN illness Tuesday prevented Dist. Governor Bill Smith of Ralls from attending the regular meeting of the Matador Lions club held in the Methodist Church basement. Program sponsors went to the vast reservoir of talent, the Matador School System, and brought up one of the finest programs in years.

Six students, Mike Groves, Pat Seigler and Gerald Pipkin (instrumental music), and Charlotte Campbell, Kay Norman and Frances McMahan (vocalists) re-

ceived enthusiastic applause at the end of each number. Lions and visitors who had not heard the group perform, were amazed at the outstanding talent of the youngsters.

Information on Governor Smith's illness did not reach club officials until about 9:30 a. m., so the substitute musical program had little time for preparation.

MRS. G. T. EDWARDS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Mrs. George T. Edwards, 82, long-time resident of Matador, died suddenly about noon Sunday, at the home of Mrs. C. D. Wilson in Roaring Springs. She had been staying there since leaving Stanley Hospital a week earlier.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday, at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Ray Manning of Throckmorton, a former pastor here, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Gene Hawkins, present pastor.

Burial was in the Garden of Memories Cemetery, Paducah, Texas. Eudy Seale Funeral Home of Matador was in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were, Forrest Campbell, Billy Wason, Algie Groves, M. S. Patton, Clyde Gilbert and Bert Ezzell.

Mrs. Edwards was the widow of the late George Edwards, a former Matador mayor. He preceded her in death, Nov. 8, 1952, and is buried in the Paducah cemetery. Two sons of the couple are also buried there in the family plot.

She is survived by five sons: Jack, of Amarillo, Bill, of Silverton, Tom, of Whiteflat, Ben and J. E. (Jake) both of Matador; 7 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Edwards was born Ora E. Billingslea, Jan. 30, 1876, at Joplin, Missouri and died on February 16, 1958. She and Mr. Edwards were married at Anson, Texas, Dec. 20, 1897, and soon afterwards moved to Paducah. They came to Motley County from there, in 1916 and had lived here continuously since that time, first at Whiteflat and later moving to Matador.

Mrs. Edwards was converted and joined the Baptist church in early girlhood. During her more active years she has been a faithful worker in the church and its various organizations.

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Flomot Youth Wins Ginners' 4-H Award; Goal Is To Follow Brother's Footsteps

George Reed, 17, of Flomot, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Reed, has been declared district winner of the 4H cotton program sponsored by the Texas Cotton Ginners Association.

He will receive \$10 for his winning cotton demonstration which was five acres of irrigated land. His yield was 619 pounds of lint per acre (despite the early freeze that reduced yields throughout the area).

Young Reed has set a higher goal. He wants to follow in the footsteps of his brother, Leo, who is attending Texas Tech on a scholarship won by his cotton demonstration in 4H work.

The younger boy followed also in his treatment of the land. He applied cotton burrs and barnyard manure to weak spots in the land. Leo Reed was a state winner.

George Reed is president of the Flomot 4H club, and is also a member of the entomology training judging team. He credits this training with helping his insect control program, which consists of two sprays for stink-bug control, and one application for the control of leafworm and leaphoppers.

Short Wave Radio Picks Up Boston

Short wave radio is a boon to law enforcement officers and greatly aids in the efficiency of their services. But the short wave can be temperamental. Under certain conditions it may be difficult for Sheriff Jinks Wilson or Deputy Jodie Graham to get a message through to a neighboring town. 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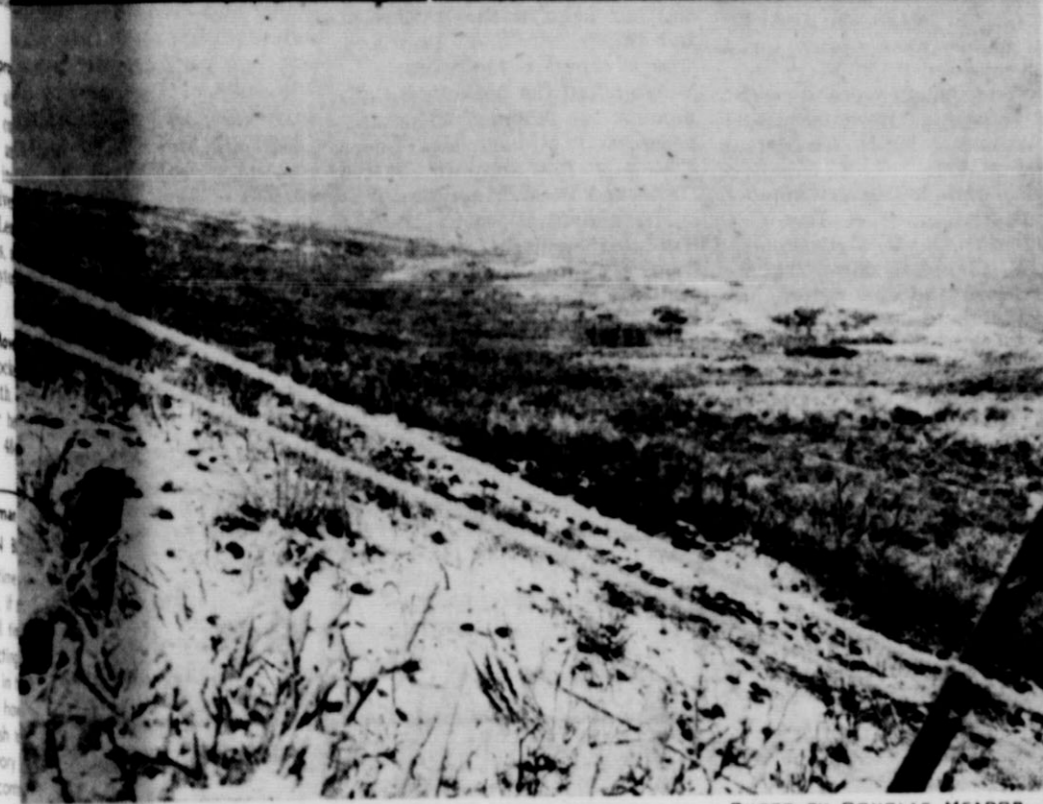

RAIL DUST

The law frowns on the distribution of alcoholic beverages in Cottle County (as it does in Motley County) but there is no law against a train leaving the track and piling up ten cars of freight. The law is powerless if a tank car of wine is in the wreck and pours its potent contents onto the thirsty soil.

That is what happened on the QA & P RY. about two miles west of Paducah Friday morning.

But people are resourceful. They brought jugs and buckets and other containers. A tank car of wine and it was wasting. The word spread fast.

Accounts of the accident say railroad officers arrived and put a stop to the "salvage" procedure, but not until some parched throats had been relieved.

A burned off journal in one of the wheels caused the derailment. The 10th car in the 34-car train slipped off the axle and nine other cars piled up behind. There were no injuries. Damage was estimated at more than \$100,000 to cars, track and freight.

Traffic on the line was halted while clearing operations started Friday afternoon. C. D. Tomison, track superintendent for the QA & P, who was a passenger in the caboose along with the conductor, Bob Cadle of Quanah, said approximately 500 feet of track was damaged. Loss was confined to eight freight cars and two tank cars.

Engineer Eldon Marsailles took the engine and nine remaining attached cars to QA & P headquarters at Quanah.
