

for statehood. Opposed were 7 Republicans and 13 Democrats, at 8:30 p. m., it was announced most of them Southerners. Texas Lyndon Johnson and Ralph Yarborough were announced in favor of the bill but neither voted Monday

The territory's first delegate to Congress, James Wickersham introduced the original Alaskan statehood bill in 1916.

Alaska was promised it eventually would become a state in a treaty signed after this country purchased the territory from Russia during the adminstration of President Andrew Johnson for \$7,200,000.

Once known as "Seward's Folly," after Secretary of State William H Seward who arranged the deal, the vast area is expected to become a new star in the flag sometime in Decem-

Before then, however, the President must sign the bill, Alaskans must also vote to accept statehood. They are virtually certain to accept it, but some opposition does exist in the territory.

Unprecedented celebrations broke out in Alaska where a river was dyed gold, bonfires roared skyward and a beauty queen astride a fire ladder pinned a 49th star on a 40-by-60 foot American flag.
