REEVES NOMINATED COUNTY JUDGE

Former Legislator Wins 5 of 7 Boxes In County's Most Pronounced Contest

DEMOCRACY functioned in Motley County Saturday with deliberate candor as more than 1000 qualified voters went to the polls and quietly selected the candidates of their choice in the Democratic primary.

Omar Parks of Roaring Springs will be in the runoff election for county commissioner of precinct 4 with Charles Long Parks and J. N. Fletcher.

Malcolm Turner is Winner

In the county commissioner races Malcolm Turner of Flomot defeated Alfred Watson of Whiteflat 170 to 74 for the precinct No. 2 office.

NEW MANAGEMENT

Notice appeared in last week's Tribune of Mrs. Pete Ozborn assuming management of the Roaring Springs cleaning plant.

Most unusual race in the county was that for commissioner in precinct 4. J. N. Fletcher and Omar Parks each received 78 votes while Charles Long received 88.

Incumbent State Senator Andy Rogers carried Motley County against his nearest opponent Leroy Saul 505 to 433. Districtwide he was re-elected by about 3 to 1 majority.

Yarborough Carries County U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough carried Motley county for the first time in his bid for re-election, 552 to 433 for Wm. A. Blakley. It is interesting to note that the vote for Saul and Blakley was exactly the same, although Saul had 149 opponents and Blakley only one.

Gov. Price Daniel swept the field of four candidates with a clear majority as he did throughout the state. Nearest contender was W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel (632 to 279).

Also winning with a clear majority was incumbent John C. White for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture who received 667 against his combined opponents' 289.

W. D. Lipscomb, unopposed for Democratic county chairman received 920 votes. Leon Smallwood received 44 votes (write-in) for precinct chairman here in Matador's No. 2 (south) box. Tom Moore received 44 votes for Northfield precinct chairman. His name was on the ticket. J. P. Sturdivant received 10 write-in votes for precinct chairman, north, Matador box.

Yarborough and Blakley each received 146 votes in Matador south box but Blakley carried the town 254 to 225. Leroy Saul also carried Matador in both boxes over Sen. Andy Rogers (100 to 69 in north Matador and 166 to 118 in south Matador).

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4) — Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriation and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36) — Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 3) — Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

Conservatives In Precinct Control

A paradox has developed out of Saturday's Democratic primary that defies analysis of political observers. They are unable to locate a dividing line between the liberals and the conservatives.

The voters gave Gov. Price Daniel — long labeled a conservative — convincing endorsement for a second term and apparently the majority he sought in Democratic Party control.

But at the same time, on the same ballot, Texas Democrats also gave Ralph Yarborough — who has always been tagged a liberal — a clean-cut and equally convincing majority reelection to six years in the U. S. Senate.

Both Yarborough and Daniel have insisted along that theirs had been a middle-of-the-road course which was neither all-liberal nor all-conservative.

"It could be," according to Dave Cheavens, AP political writer, "that the Democrats in large numbers are seeking some effective middle-road with a minimum of petty bickering and splinter activities."

The splinter movement created by the DOT (Democrats of Texas) may have served as an instrument to bring the liberals and conservatives closer together. It is significant in Denton County that Alex Dickie Jr., state vice president of the DOT was defeated for precinct chairman.

Unusual Attendance Largest attendance in this community's history marked the two precinct conventions held Saturday afternoon in Matador. Conservatives took control of both meetings and with an overwhelming majority elected a combined 15 delegates to the county convention.

A token effort was made in the precinct No. 1 meeting (north) in the Commissioners Court room to name a liberal slate and stop the nomination.

Number superiority made it possible for conservatives to nominate and elect their delegates. In precinct No. 2 (south) District Court room, conservatives, with a number superiority of almost 3 to 1, took control and nominated and elected 10 delegates.

RAIN, LIGHTNING IN SUNDAY STORM

Rain and an electrical storm struck Matador Sunday afternoon in the wake of a cool front that produced scattered but welcome precipitation for growing crops.

Home of rancher D. I. W. Birnie here in Matador was damaged by a bolt of lightning but no one was injured. Mr. Birnie was at the ranch when a bolt struck a power line and damaged the home. It knocked all bulbs out of a light fixture, burned out the electric hot water heater and burned out the downstairs telephone. The bolt also knocked silver from the dining table and burned a hole in the carpet. Mrs. Birnie had just stepped from the room when the lightning struck.

Other reports of lightning damage include television sets put out of commission and minor damages.

Rain here from the cool front (including Monday morning) totaled 88 inches, bringing the total for July to 47.9 inches. Total rainfall for the year to date is 15.84 inches as compared with 22.59 inches on the same date a year ago. No rain fell here last year during the month of July.

On the same date in 1956 the total rainfall for the first seven months of the year was 3.65 inches. Rainfall and records are courtesy of Bob Stanley.

Visit Home from Alaska Laced with Amusing Incidents for Family

lines was flying. This I couldn't believe for the clouds were low and patches of fog hung between the hills.

I asked her to repeat so that I could be sure my ears had played me no tricks. It was the same message the second time. Alaska Airlines was coming with six hundred pounds of first class mail for Elim. They would not land on our runway (too muddy) but if we would take a boat to Moses Point they would off-load Elim's mail there on the way down.

The hinge of the whole day's affair was that mail. None had been delivered to Elim the entire month of May. Well, this White family had ordered new summer clothes, two new bags, cash to have on the trip, etc.

Beside needing these items we could put in our appearances Stateside, final letters as to who would meet whom and where, were in that undelivered mail.

Since we had been caught slipping, if we were going to make the schedule we must do last minute packing, close up the building, and grab a boat to Moses in an hour and a half if possible.

takes forty-five minutes to go to Moses Point, so we really hurried.

I remembered to turn off the fire, the burner to the ice box, and to wash the coffee pot. W's suitcase and new tailor-made suit had not arrived, so he was to pack socks, shirts, etc. in Roger's bag, get his own out of the mail and make the transfer later.

He suddenly remembered his relic, the mastodon tooth, that he wanted to give to Douglas Meador. Running to get it, he met the man who was going to see after things while we were gone. R. W. got busy showing him which key was which, where things were for the light plants, how the ACS schedule worked and other last minute details.

Have you already guessed? When I arrived at Moses Point, Roger's suitcase contained Roger's things that I had packed — and one mastodon tooth. R. W. had started his summer vacation with the clothes he had on, and not another stitch!

At Moses Point we waited. Two hours later we had word that the pilot had left Nome. It took five minutes and we were forced to return because of fog. So, we sat — wet from the boat ride and a bit dejected. At 4 p. m. word came the radio that another pilot had departed Nome and would pick us up.

Twenty-five minutes later we saw him — no one knew. The clouds and fog were that low! — As soon as we saw that this pilot was Bob Jacobs, we knew that we had both an old timer and an ace. We had an ace in the weather too, so I still had quails. Since hilltops were not visible we flew over the open waters of Norton Sound. We must have been a whole seventy-five or one hundred feet above water. Once the pilot grinned and asked how we liked our fast boat ride.

You know, of course, that we did not in our mail plane so he could not help us on that score. After registering at the manager of Alaska Airlines.

"Sir, I must have my mail. Where is it?" "That mail had to be taken off the plane overnight and is now locked up in the office." "When will you pull mine out?" "Why, not on your life would I open one of those mail bags. That will have to be done by the postmistress."

I'd have to do it for everyone who came into Nome and wanted to see what might be going out to the village for him."

Patiently I explained again why it was necessary to have this mail, that it had not been delivered in over a month with utterly no excuse and furthermore, Alaska had definitely promised me the mail or I would never have departed Elim.

I'm not responsible for Alaska Airlines. I release the mail to them and what happens from there is no affair of mine."

As I said, mellow as steel. By this time I was beginning to wish that the plane hadn't made it in a beautiful sunny Saturday morning dawned. My disposition was still fog shrouded. We went to the Airlines office at 8 a. m.

"But they need that mail," were the words I heard as we walked in. The girl talking put down her receiver and shook her head. It seems she had no luck with the postmistress either.

Through a doorway I could see into and started examining parcel post packages. I saw one addressed to R. W. White. I set it aside. A boy in white overalls came in, looking at me a bit, then started helping me sort and look.

A brisk swing of the door and another figure entered. I looked up just enough to see the dress shoes and trouser cuffs. Expensive dress trousers, said those cuffs — it could be no one save the manager. I held my breath but kept searching. He departed via the same door. When I glanced at the white coveralls, he grinned so we dug in again, but had only a moment until the dress trousers were back.

An embarrassed yes. Somewhere, somehow that strange device called pressure politics had gone into play, I felt sure. I had my mail and was on my way out so I did not stop to ponder. Now the sun was really shining!

We lugged half of that six hundred pounds up to our rooms in the hotel, sorted, and repacked. Everything had arrived except R. W.'s tailor-made, I could hardly keep my face straight. That new bag he carried so matter-of-factly held one lone mastodon tooth.

running unattended where it might be a temptation to children and others who don't know how to handle it. Be sure that children and pets stay away from the machine when you are mowing. Keep a steady footing and balance when mowing on inclines. Don't make adjustments, remove clogging grass or sticks, or reach in front of the mower when the engine is running. Always disconnect the spark plug wire when making adjustments. Keep hands, feet, and loose clothing away from moving blades, reels, motor belts, and exposed chains. When storing the mower, remove the spark plug or spark plug wire to prevent inquisitive youngsters from starting the machine. Observance of these simple rules can greatly reduce the hazard of injury involved in the task of lawn-mowing.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Lawn Mower Safety Urged

A power lawn mower can be a helpful and faithful servant, but it may turn into a dangerous machine unless a few safety precautions are observed.

Several injuries have occurred recently from objects being thrown by the mower. Nails, wire, rocks and other objects can be picked up by the mower and thrown at tremendous speeds, causing serious bodily injury. To reduce the possibility of such injury, it is advisable to go over the lawn before mowing to remove foreign matter and debris. Start the mower on level ground, making sure your feet are away from the cutter blade or bar. Keep the machine firmly on the ground when starting by placing one foot on the deck and holding the handle with one hand. Don't leave the mower

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

H. J. R. 248—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision, and a general law may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, providing for an election, a term of office shall be the term of a proclamation therefor.

SECTION I. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows: "Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT providing that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter or Charter Amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
