Brothers Arrested Here On Charges In Wichita Falls

TWIN brothers, Leo and Lyle Babcock, 48, were arrested here early Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Jody Graham, after a check with Wichita Falls Police Department disclosed that they were wanted on theft charges there.

Deputy Graham was informed by Lewis Blevins and A. J. Stephens that a car was parked in a pasture near US Highway 70 just east of Teepee Creek. He received the information about 11 o'clock Sunday night. He made a routine check and found the two men asleep.

He brought the men to town for further questioning and called Wichita Falls, giving the police there the address given him. At first he was told the men were not wanted and they were released.

They told deputy Graham they would drive out west of town on the highway and sleep. Shortly after they had left, Wichita Falls called the Sheriff's office here and said the men were wanted on theft charges of a large amount of merchandise.

Fog had blanketed the area by that time but Deputy Graham began searching for the two men. He found them about 12 miles west of town and brought them to jail here, then notified Wichita Falls.

COUNTY'S NEW WILDCAT YIELDS OIL ON SWAB

(Ft. Worth Star-Telegram)

New oil was being recovered along with some water Thursday on swabbing tests of the Permian-Pennsylvanian through perforations at 4,232-4,240 feet in Pan American Petroleum Corporation's No. 1-B-C R. Brandon, section 3, block 0-2, A. M. Bourland survey, four miles east of Roaring Springs Permian-Pennsylvanian pool in Motley County.

Acidized with 1,000 and 3,000 gallons, it yielded 10 barrels of load oil, 39 barrels of new oil and 91 barrels of water on latest 24-hour swabbing test. Recovery the last two hours of this test was five barrels of new oil and six barrels of water.

VEGETABLES MAY BRING NEW INCOME TO FARMERS HERE

Commercial production of vegetables may offer a new source of income to Motley County farmers, it was announced this week by County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

The possibility warrants investigation and Mr. Palmeyer has arranged a meeting Friday night (March 21) in the District Court room here, starting at 7:30 p. m.

Principal speaker will be Ashley Mixon, President of Plains Food, Inc. of Plainview. The program will explain vegetable growing and marketing and questions will be invited.

Mr. Palmeyer said that although commercial vegetable production is new to Motley County farmers, may be the answer to increasing farm income and give the farmer a change to fully utilize irrigation water.

"Past experiences have shown that the marketing of the crop is the most important factor," Mr. Palmeyer said, "and it will be the main topic dealt with. Up to date publications on production, fertilization, insect control and harvesting may be obtained at my office."

In the early autumn of 1871 the Fourth Cavalry Regiment was riding about 50 miles south of Matador. They were bound for Blanco Canyon, where they were to ascend the caprock and make the first attack by a major column of troops on the South Plains country since the days of the Spanish conquistadors.

The Fourth's assault on the plains country is told in the final chapters of a new book by Frank Tolbert called *The Staked Plain* (Harper, \$3.95). Writing in the Sunday book section of the San Francisco Chronicle, Robert H. Dillon predicted that *The Staked Plain* will be "a sure-fire bet for Tommy Thompson's Silver Spur award."

The *Silver Spur* is given through the Western Writers of America annually for the best book on the west.

Robert Dillon is the California State Library's Supt. Branch librarian and a nationally known expert on western Americana.

"*The Staked Plain*" is the best western story to hit this reviewer's desk since Alan Le May's *The Searchers*," said Dillon. "Readers will find that the oft-scorned 'western' can run to a fresh, lusty kind of humor. This excellent second novel is simply a superlative western and makes no pretences of being anything other than a horse opera."
