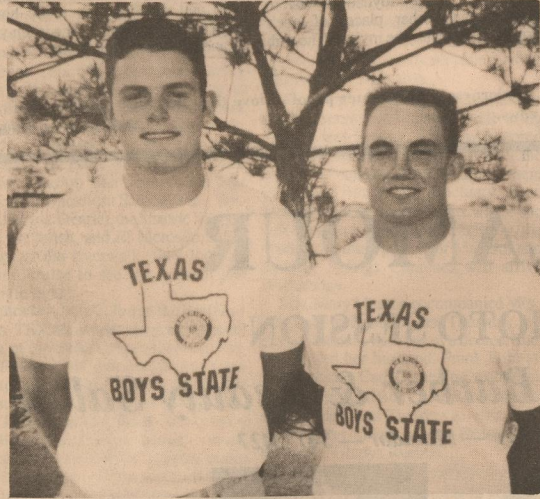

## Single Family Housing Loans Available

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Spur, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes—add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an

existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75 percent with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1,050 square feet of living area.

In addition, Farmers Home Administration guarantees home ownership loans

made to applicants of low or moderate income. Guarantees offer opportunities to families who are unable to afford a commercial loan without a Guarantee.

These loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the value of the property and are made for terms of 30 years. The interest rate is based on the Federal National Mortgage Association rate with a maximum loan amount in most counties of \$67,500.00.

The Farmers Home Administration assists rural America by guaranteeing private sector loans and by providing temporary, supervised direct loans to farm and housing borrowers who have a reasonable chance for success, and whose current needs cannot be met at reasonable rates and terms by commercial sources. The Agency is committed to excellence in providing its services.

"Application for assistance may be obtained at the Farmers Home Administration office located at 314 Willard Ave.", FmHA County Supervisor said. The FmHA office in Spur is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

## Matador City Council Meets

The Matador City Council met June 9 for regular session. After the minutes were read they were corrected with one correction. The bills were read with extra expense this month due to the extra wastewater plant and landfill work being done at this time, which are due to meeting State regulations and requirements.

Bill Luckett requested to move the water meter from its location inside the city limits to his property (the former West Texas Gin). Luckett had a copy of the ordinance with the City and Quanah Cotton Oil Co. in 1961 concerning the waterline. The ordinance also stated, after the gin ceased to operate the line reverted back to the property of the city.

After discussing that they don't want to own waterlines outside the City limits,

the motion was made and passed to give the waterline in question to the property owners on the line, Luckett and Lucretia Campbell, and leave the water meter where it is.

The City considered accepting lots from Furman Vinson. They accepted them.

Councilman Don Warren asked if they had any reason not to put in a sewer line on the West side of State Highway 70 South. The Council said it wasn't done when they did the other line work because of the extra cost of a lift station and there were not enough funds then or now.

Motion was made and passed to charge \$50 to outside contractors to dump in the city landfill.

## Two CEU's To Be Offered At Insect Scouting Workshop

Two (2) CEU's for recertification of private applicators license will be offered during the Insect Scouting Workshop set for Monday, June 20th in Flomot. The workshop will start at 9:00 a.m. at the Flomot Community Center and will conclude around 11:00 a.m. Refreshments will be provided courtesy of the Flomot Gin.

Emory Boring, Entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Vernon, will be on hand to discuss pest management and insect scouting techniques. The first part of the workshop will be classroom discussion on early season

pests and up-to-date boll weevil and boll-worm trap results. The second portion of the workshop will include hands-on training in local cotton and peanut fields. Producers will gain knowledge regarding early season pest scouting and insect identification.

This will be an excellent opportunity for local producers to polish their scouting and insect identification skills, in addition to receiving two (2) CEU's toward recertification of their private applicators license. The Motley County Commissioners Court met June 13 for regular court day. Commissioner J.N. Fletcher opened with the invocation. The minutes were read, and reports were approved with the JP Place 1 collecting for the county, \$2395.00.

Items heard and tabled until final information is presented, were the following:

\* NTS phone system, presented by local representative Charles Keith.

\* Motley County Library Board member Charley Johnson wanted to know if the Court would hear a request at the next Court meeting from the Library Board, after the Board meets this month. The court put this on the agenda for the next meeting.

\* County Trapper Jim Stockton, wanted to speak to the Court regarding a letter they had received from the Texas Animal Damage Control office. Stockton knew the State had mandated the County raise their part to ADC an extra \$150 per month. He said he would be willing to work a 9 month year if the State

would approve it. This 9 month work year would not affect the aerial services in any way.

\* The Court heard Gail Davis, representative of MH/MR report on the progress and setting of the budget for the coming year. They were leaving Motley County at the same amount of money to operate, but were suggesting they could up their quota with money or inkind.

Davis said they would love to have an office available to them when necessary. The court said they could possibly do this.

\* Judge Laverna Price had to make a report of the county maintained road mileage, it is the same as last year, 272 miles.

\* Court passed to build and place an additional handrail at the handicap ramp which is being required by the Texas Department of Health following their inspection.

Court discussed the Appraisal District Budget.

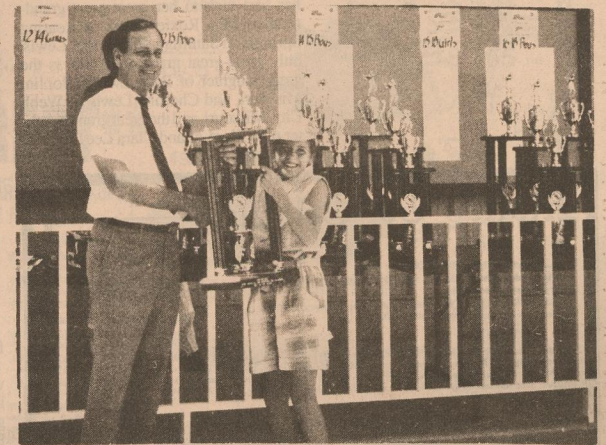

## WTU Pilots Customer Focus Program

West Texas Utilities Company is testing a customer satisfaction program called "Talk to Me" in the Northern part of Texas this month. The pilot program will give customers in Matador and surrounding towns the chance to voice their opinions and suggest ideas on how the company could improve service.

Response cards featuring a picture of Reddy Kilowatt saying "Talk to Me" will be handed to customers who will have the option of filling in the card immediately or returning it by mail. The objective of the program is to focus on customer service and find out what our customers think of WTU.

"To be successful in the future, our focus has to be on customer service, a total marketing effort and business growth," Pete Churchwell, executive vice president, said. "These three targets will be achieved if our customers are truly satisfied with WTU. We welcome their

ideas." WTU wants to provide "optimum customer services and options in a safe, reliable and cost-effective manner to make WTU the electric provider of choice," Churchwell said. One way to find out if we are meeting our customers' needs is to ask, he added.

"Talk to Me" cards are simple and direct, which will help WTU record the honest and candid opinions of the customers it serves. The new program was created as another way to meet customer needs, but customers can always talk face-to-face to someone directly at the nearest WTU area office. "This depicts the kind of neighbor-to-neighbor dialogue we have had with customers for years," Churchwell said.

If the test program proves to be successful, "Talk to Me" will be implemented companywide in July. WTU serves 52 counties of West Texas.

## Health News

Hot summer weather may drive some people to drink. Drink water, that is.

"The body loses large amounts of fluids during hard physical activity, particularly if the weather is hot and humid," said Dr. Jim Pivarnik, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "It is important to replenish them. The best way, as obvious as it sounds, is to drink plenty of water."

Whether working construction, running, or merely spending a day at the beach, the heat can sap the body of precious fluids, leading to dehydration.

The simple rule, according to Pivarnik, is to pay attention to urine color. People who have adequate amounts of body water content normally have pale-colored urine. A darker yellow color indicates that the kidneys are forced to concentrate urine.

Not drinking enough fluids can affect exercise performance, and can lead to heat illness, which can be fatal, Pivarnik says.

Signs of water depletion include extreme thirst, dry lips and tongue. In severe cases, there can be an increase in heart rate and breathing, dizziness, confusion, and eventual coma. The skin can appear dry and non-elastic while the sufferer may feel lethargic, and have headaches, cramps and a pale complexion.

Don't wait until there are symptoms to take precautions warns Pivarnik.

"Thirst is not a good indicator by itself since by the time you are thirsty, the body's water reserves have already decreased to unhealthy levels," he said.

Pivarnik suggests drinking water continuously to keep the body hydrated. "Take a drink every time you pass a water fountain, and keep a water bottle at your work area and sip on it through the day."

He advises spreading water consumption throughout the day rather than trying to make up for low levels in large gulps. A minimum of one pint of water per hour is a good starting point.

During exercise or strenuous outdoor activity, Pivarnik says to drink approximately 8 ounces of water every 15 minutes. Although the body can sweat two quarts of fluid in one hour during hot summer weather, it can only absorb about one quart, making it crucial to be "stocked up" before, during, and after those summertime activities.

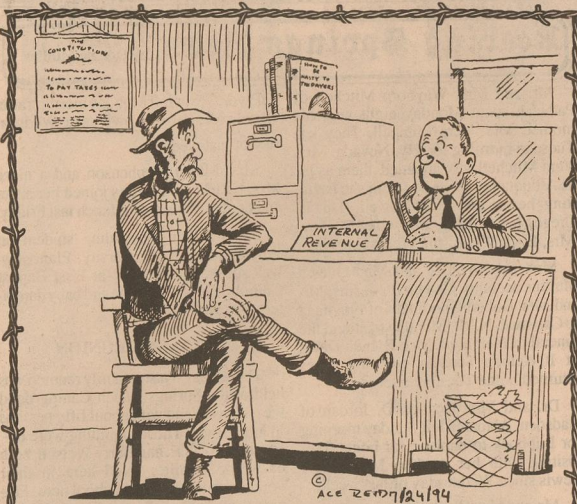
