been listed as one of 618 survivors of a torpedoed Japanese prison ship, the War Department has notified his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Reinhardt of Denver

City, former Matador residents Sgt. Reinhardt has been a prisoner of war since the fall of Corregidor and was sent to Japan on December 13th from Camp no. 1 where he was held

According to an AP story released to the daily newspapers last week, Japan has informed the War Department that 942 American prisoners of war were killed outright when a Japanese prison ship was torpedoed in Subic Bay in December 1944.

Fifty-nine died later, two survived and evaded capture and survived and presumably were moved to Japan. The War Department has received a partial list of the dead and relatives have been notified of their deaths

The names of 482 of 618 survivors have been received from

Japan, the notices said. The message to Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt stated that the captives were sent to a camp on northern

Honshu Island. In a letter to friends here, Mrs. Reinhardt said that a number of nurses and friends of Malcolm who were liberated in the Philippine invasion, had written them, one being a doctor who had worked with Malcolm in the hospital at Corregdor and later in the camp hospital, after the latter was assigned to hospital duty on February 25, 1942.

The most glaring example of inflation at its worst exists in Greece. I priced a pair of sandals seen in a shop window. No one in this country would have looked at them a second time because the sole was made from an old rough discarded tire casing with two straps of artificial leather. This pair of so-called sandals cost at the then rate of exchange \$50. I priced a pair of fairly good men's shoes which were handmade because the Nazis left the Greeks with very little machinery of any kind. The storekeeper quoted a price of \$150. I journeyed through the public market in Athens and saw the natives bargaining and buying what they could under the terrific price schedule which prevailed One native had a hen - which obviously was a sick hen, for which he asked \$20. While the French rate of exchange is obviously not equitable to the Americans over there, additional steps have been taken to correct these inequities to some extent. This place is thrown open to all members of the armed forces where they can buy a good meals for ten francs, which is twenty cents, get a nice room where royalty used to sleep for 40 cents a day. And they can play pingpong, dance, or even get a dish of good old American icecream - with chocolate. This is one of the most popular places in all of Europe and the boys seem to throughly enjoy all the privieges offered. In addition there are numerous USO and Red Cross establishments scattered in or a-round Paris. One thing the boys would like to do is to go up on the Eiffel Tower.
