

# Boys Buried Alive Is Rescued From Cave in

was cheated Tuesday by the heroic efforts of Water Department Engineer Dick Dewbre. He dug a cave near the Green home in northeast Matador in the vicinity of the well. The near-tragedy happened shortly before noon. Young Berryman is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Berryman. He

and his younger sister, Sue, had arrived here Friday to visit his cousins and family and another grandparent, Mrs. C. M. Colley. The cave fell in burying the Berryman youth alive, and covering Jimmy Green up to the armpits. Tommie Green ran to his mother, who was preparing lunch, screaming the sudden

tragedy. Mr. Dewbre drove by about the time the frantic mother became aware that her nephew was buried. He had difficulty in learning what had happened, then he began to dig with his hands.

**Hard To Locate**  
Mr. Dewbre said it was hard to determine where the boy was located. In the meantime the eight-year-old Tommie called the Matador Volunteer Fire Department. Mr. Dewbre found the boy and uncovered his head. His face was dark and he was unconscious as the sand was removed from around his head and shoulders. Presently he regained consciousness, shook the

sand from his nose and mouth, and began helping dig himself free.

The fire department had arrived in the meantime and firemen relieved Mr. Dewbre. The boy walked back to the house unaided. The boys had been cautioned of the danger in the cave where they were playing. Members of the family said

yesterday that cars had been driving to the cave location since the accident so that parents could show children the danger of digging in sand and loose dirt. They said a number of boys had arrived to view the scene of the near-tragedy of their own accord, and talked with the trio who had experienced the close brush with death.

Jack Norman was returned to the post of secretary-treasurer. Bill Seale was installed as first vice-president, Curtis Graham as 2nd vice-president and Alvin Stearns as 3rd vice-president.

Two-year directors were Henry Ford and Baby Webb, and one-year directors taking the oath of office were Henry Pipkin and James Taylor. Miss Rachel Patton was reinstated as Lions Sweetheart, Pat Sheridan as club recorder and Vance H. Gilbreath as Lion Tamer. Experienced and fully competent Ralph Stapleton relieved Tail-twister Ben Edwards of his office. The new Tail-twister's first official act was to fine the new Boss Lion and the visiting District Governor 25c each for allowing the program to run two minutes overtime. Gov. ### Former Resident Seriously Injured

W. T. Marshall, former Matador resident is in a critical condition in Bataan Memorial Hospital, Albuquerque, N. M. following a recent accident while mowing hay at his father's farm near Moriarty, New Mexico. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Marshall, also formerly of Matador.

The accident occurred on June 16, when he stepped from the mower to clear it of hay, and the tractor slipped into gear. One of the tractor wheels and the mower ran over him, according to information furnished by his sister, Mrs. Margie Scott, who wrote the Tribune. "He had 48 stitches taken in his head, and received serious injuries to his spine. One vertebrae is broken and his legs are paralyzed. The doctors do not know whether he will ever walk again or not. He will be in the hospital possibly about six weeks or longer."

His parents and wife had just left the field where he was mowing hay, and looked back in time to see the tractor moving across the field. Returning to the scene his wife stopped the tractor, which was traveling back toward him. Both P. L. Marshall and his son are operating farms near Moriarty.

### RITES HELD FOR PIONEER JURIST

Funeral rites were held yesterday for Judge Henry S. Bishop, 82, at the First Presbyterian Church in Amarillo. He died Tuesday in Northwest Texas Hospital following a brief illness.

Judge Bishop had many pioneer friends in Motley county. The veteran jurist, who retired Jan. 1 after 28 years as judge of the 47th District Court in Amarillo, was one of the first school teachers in this county. More than three score years ago he taught school in what is now the Flomot community, and "bathed" with the late W. J. Whitworth, about the time Motley county was organized. Burial was in Llano cemetery, Amarillo.

Henry Stephen Bishop was born at Miami, Saline county, Missouri, July 22, 1872. He moved with his family to Washburn, about 15 miles east of Amarillo, in 1893.

In 1900 he entered law school at the University of Texas and was graduated on June 11, 1902, and was immediately licensed to private practice.

Public power brigade in Ohio is trying to get a bill that would commit the government to build a dam on the Snake River between the Snake and Oregon. Led by Sen. Wayne Morse, they have the old familiar cry that it will be a 'steal' if the government were to permit the Power Company, an in-owned public utility, to build three small dams on the Snake River that would generate the same amount of power as the big dam. Let's see who would be benefited from whom. . . . The estimated cost of the dam, including transmission facilities and interest on construction, is \$465,000. . . . How much of this would be paid from Ohio taxpayers? . . . The Council of State Chambers has provided the answer—\$29,743,533. The only mobile unit for color TV in the world today—built and operated by the Radio Corporation of America—will be based at the Fair throughout the 16 days and 17 nights of the exposition. Live color programs will be telecast daily.

Many people will have an opportunity to see for the first time with their own eyes the wonders and beauty of this latest electronic marvel.

Fairgoers will see many of their favorite network television programs in full color on the dozens of color television sets which will be in operation on the fairgrounds.

In addition, color television programs will be projected onto a giant, movie-size screen 15 by 20 feet by one of the few color TV projectors in existence.

The huge color TV stage in the Agriculture Building will have complete facilities for telecasting color programs, either on a local, regional or nationwide basis. Interest has been expressed in originating network shows from the fairgrounds which would show the glamour and spectacle of the nation's largest Fair to viewers throughout the country.

The RCA Color TV Caravan will be making its first appearance in the Southwest. It is the successor to a similar RCA mobile unit which traveled across

**Benefit Payments Confused By Many With Old Age Aid**

A representative from the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Matador at 9:30 a. m. on July 13 at the First State Bank and will be glad to assist you in all matters pertaining to social security.

Many retired workers and their dependent families are not claiming social security benefit payments to which they are entitled.

Recently, a 70-year-old lady called at the office and explained that her husband is 71 years old and that he had worked on a job covered by social security from 1937 to 1945. He became ill at that time and has not been able to work. Because they thought that the benefits represented charity rather than an insurance payment this couple had lost a few thousand dollars during a period of their lives when

it was certainly needed. Their only income is from a small business that she operated. During our interview with this lady we were impressed with the fact that she constantly confused this program with old-age assistance. She questioned us repeatedly as to whether or not we would be interested in their property and it was difficult to convince her that their entitlement is based on a matter of right rather than need.

This is a striking example of the lack of knowledge of the old-age and survivors insurance program on the part of many people and so we suggest that if you know of anyone in the community who is over 65 and retired and it appears as though they might be eligible for benefits under the Social Security Act, you would be rendering a real service to them by instructing the individual or a member of his family to call at the local security office.

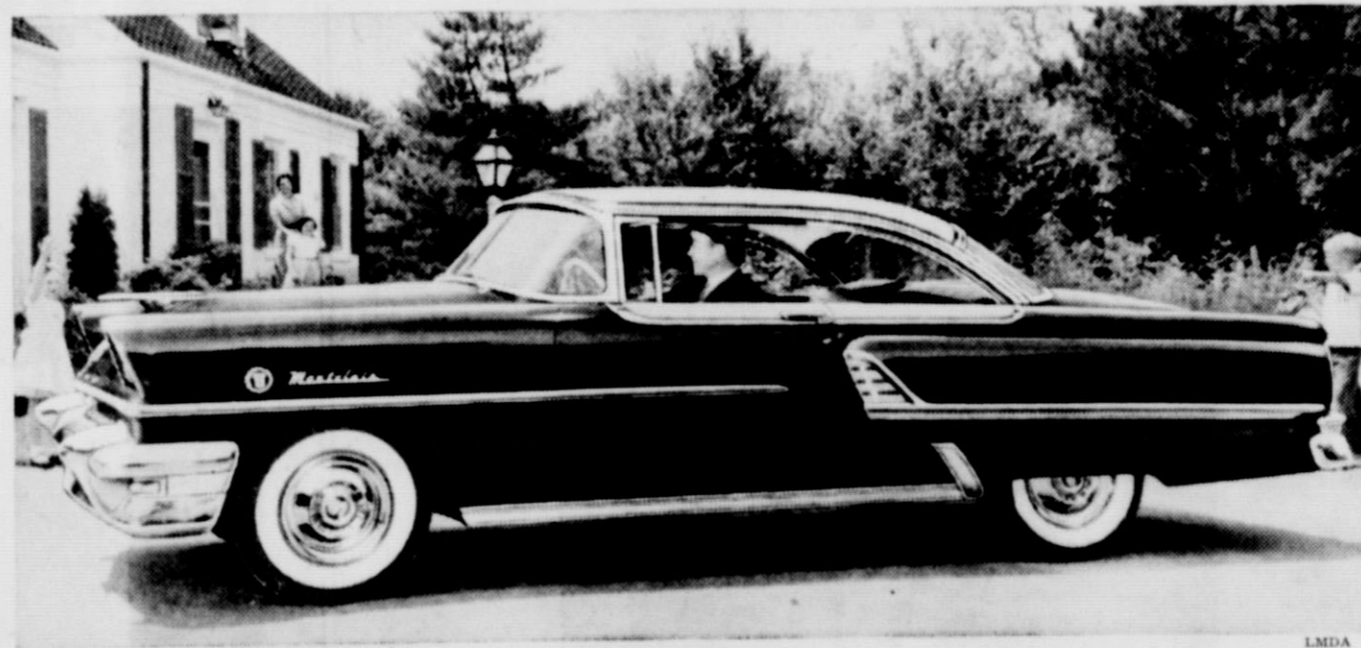

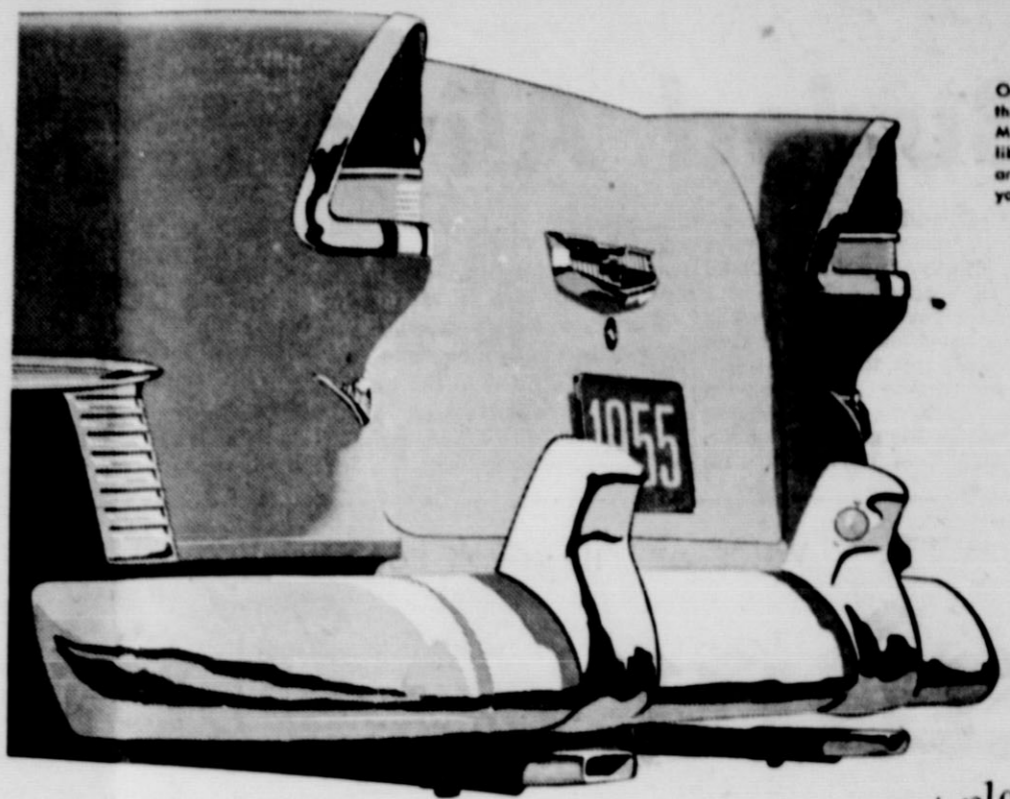

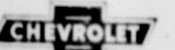

during the Russian blockade. He said it cost a great amount of money but that it convinced the people of Europe that the US is concerned and sincere. He contrasted the difference between east and west Berlin. He said the shops were empty in the Russian zone and that there were no automobiles on the streets. In the western zone he declared the stores were filled with all types of excellent merchandise and the streets crowded with automobiles.

**Turks Not Afraid**  
Mr. Formby said Turkey was the most interesting country he visited. He said the Turks were not afraid of the Reds. He said Turkey has fought the Russians 13 times and expect to fight them again. He said the Turks were extremely friendly to Americans and would be our best ally in event of a major conflict.

In Moscow Mr. Formby went everywhere without any restraint from the Reds. He takes a dim view of the Russian peace overtures.

"The Russians talk and preach peace, still they have never disarmed, but instead have grown in armed power since the end of the war. They could have an army of 4 million soldiers in a short time. They have 20,000 front line planes, probably not the best, but good planes. They have more submarines than the German empire had at the peak of Hitler's power."

The people of Russia are not hungry, Mr. Formby said, but agriculture is their No. 1 problem. The Reds have taken the spirit out of the Russian farmer and they have taken his property away from him. The country does not have enough land to feed its growing population, he said.

**Russians Friendly**  
He found the Russian people friendly. He visited Stalin's tomb and saw the dictator, perfectly embalmed and looking exactly like his picture. He went to a Baptist church in Moscow where 2,000 people crowded into a building intended to seat 500 people were going to church throughout the Russian capital.

"God has not forgotten nor forsaken the people behind the Iron Curtain", he declared, "people are filling the churches on everyhand and religion is their hope."  
"I am grateful for the opportunity of having visited Russia."

I am no longer afraid of them. I believe we can outproduce them and defeat them in event of a conflict. On the other hand I have a healthy respect for them."
