

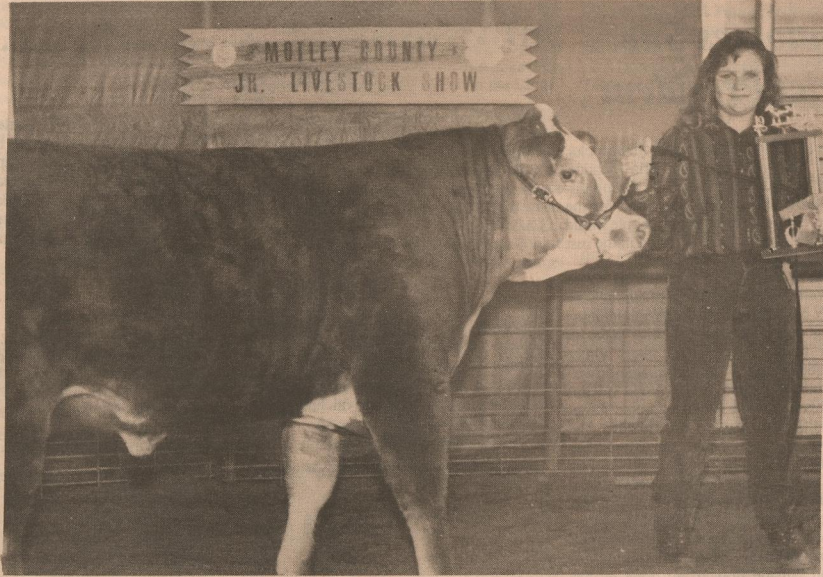

## Motley County School Board Accepts Three Teacher's Resignations

The Motley County Board of Trustees met March 9 with a lengthy agenda, with two items of which were renewing contracts and accepting of resignation for the 1994-95 school year.

Contracts renewed were for all teachers. The resignation of Mrs. Irene "Sis" Stephens, Leslie Birkey, and Jackie McNew were accepted.

Other items discussed were as follows:

## Matador City Council Hears Update Report On Sewer Plant

The Matador City Council met March 10 for their regular meeting.

Council heard and discussed with Jamie Johnson of OJD Engineering the updates on the Waste Water Plant and the Solid Waste Plant.

Johnson discussed the arid exemption rules he had called Austin to find out about, and is still waiting on the ruling. They should know something within two months. Matador has one of 60 landfills in the state and 20 are in this region.

Johnson also suggested any letters or phone calls to Senator Carriker and Representative Pete Laney might not hurt from citizens, requesting help.

Johnson also answered the question that if they could acquire extra land for a new landfill they can take in other cities trash to help defray the cost. He suggested this fix a separate place for brush, etc. to have hauled to a permitted pit, to save the existing pit.

Council appointed Election Judge for

\* Joe Grimes, Architect of Grimes & Assoc. of Wolforth, presented the blue prints for the building addition to the southeast side of the present school. The new addition will be 5917 sq. feet for a new computer lab room, pre-kindergarten room, and a multi purpose room, also with restrooms. This addition will be built with part of the funds from WADA (funds from Jayton).

## Motley County Commissioners Meet In Regular Session

The Motley County Commissioners Court met March 14 with Judge Laverna Price opening the Court and J.M. Russell giving the invocation.

All reports were read and accepted along with the minutes and bills. The J.P. collected, Precinct 1, Place 1, \$2825, and Place 2, \$165.

Glyndard Moore met with the Court requesting a road on their property be closed. Moore explained this road hasn't been used as a county or public road in years and they want to fence it into their

Mayor Gary Lancaster presented the new budget to study. No action was taken.

Council heard a complaint of debris on city street in the 400 block of Lariat Street. The citizen making the complaint has had several flat tires from driving down this street, several options were discussed.

Council discussed the ordinance concerning permits for Transit Peddlers. They elected to have the City Attorney, Tom Hamilton, rewrite the ordinance to best protect the City and local businesses.

Council opened bids for the hauling of the clay to the city sewer plant from the landfill site. Appain Corp. of Hereford bid \$3.17 to load and haul; Julian Lipham, Floydada, \$2.67 to load and haul; and Dogget of Lubbock, \$2.85 to load and haul. The bid went to J. Lipham of Floydada.

Meeting adjourned.

## New Construction To Begin At School

In a few weeks you will notice construction taking place at the Motley County Schools. Plans for three elementary classrooms and a new concession stand/restrooms have been approved.

Thanks to the Jayton I.S.D., the Motley County School District will be able to build and offer students much needed opportunities.

Senate Bill 7 gave wealthier school districts several options to share their wealth with the less wealthy districts or send their so called excess money to the state. Motley County was one of the school districts that was selected by Jayton to receive additional revenue. As you may have guessed, there were strings attached

to this money by the state. One requirement is that the money must be used to improve student achievement. Another requirement is that the money could not be used to lower the districts tax rate; nor could the money be used to replace any part of the districts budget or debt.

With these thoughts in mind, and the limitations put on this money, Motley County I.S.D. has decided to build and equip an elementary computer lab, a pre-Kindergarten classroom and a science/art multi-purpose room.

If you know someone from Jayton, please thank them for giving our students the facilities, equipment, and the opportunity to achieve.

The Board elected to meet March 21 to finalize the plans and approve them.

\* Board approved depository contract.

\* Set date of March 24 for drawing of places on ballot for the May 7 election. March 23 is the last day to file for a position on the School Board.

\* Approved election Judges for May 7 election, Hazel Donovan, Matador; Wilburn Martin, Flomot; Betty Simpson, Northfield; and Venita Sedgwick, Roaring Springs.

\* Approved to order additional 65 passenger school bus. Busses ordered in March will be ready for delivery in October.

\* Board passed a resolution regarding unfunded mandates. This resolution will

also be presented to other taxing entities and then sent to the Governor, Senator and Representatives.

\* Approved Textbook adoption sent in by the Textbook Committee.

\* Vann Francis, Board member and representative to the County Appraisal Board, elected the Board to approve setting up the necessary legal steps to collect delinquent taxes owed the school and county.

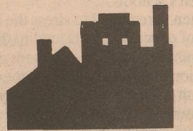
Mr. Blanch explained that Kathleen Wason, Chief Appraiser will come to the next Board meeting to explain changing the Homestead exemption act in Motley County.

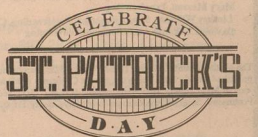

## Home Economically Speaking

### PARENTAL REFORM, A KEY TO CHILDREN'S SUCCESS IN SCHOOL.....

In the war against declining student achievement, many solutions have been tried. A quest for better teachers, improved texts and challenging curricula have each played a roll in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is parental reform.

Since 1965 parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children living in single parent families and the proportion of married mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's schools.

When 24,600 eighth grades were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their parents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the importance of education, kids tend to do what they want to do. Few of them choose educational activities. This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television viewing restrictions.

Here are some things parents can do to help increase their child's success in school:

— The first step is communication. Talk regularly about current school experiences. Students who never talk to their parents about school are three times more likely to drop out of school than those who do talk with their parents.

— Restrict television viewing on

school nights. Students with television restrictions are 9 percent less likely to drop out than those with no restrictions.

— Finally, provide adequate after-school supervision. Let students know what is expected of them in terms of education. Parents who expect more of their children educationally, have children who perform at least adequately in school.

### PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

In a nationwide poll of 24,600 eighth graders, students were asked how often during the school year they talked with one or both of their parents about things studied in class. Over 45 percent talked with their parents twice or less during the entire school year. An analysis of the National Educational Longitudinal Study found that talking regularly about current school experiences had a positive effect on student test scores.

### TELEVISION RESTRICTIONS AND SCHOOL DROP-OUTS

It has been determined that parents monitoring and restricting television viewing times of their school-age children can lower the chances of the child dropping out of school. A group of eighth graders were monitored and 19 percent of those having no television restrictions dropped out of school. Nine percent fewer students dropped out when television viewing was restricted.

The job financed by the women took about four months. They are marketing it through various media.

The segment of the video Mrs. Ross showed was "The Essential Kitchen Utensils" including a crock pot, cast iron

skillet, plastic cutting board and vegetable shredder. She also displayed the arrangement of a kitchen for convenience when cooking.

When the couple explored possible part-time businesses to earn extra income in 1990, they consulted with experts at Texas Tech Small Business Development Center before investing into their franchise. They had two weeks training offered by Video Data Service. Their most recent work involved producing the above video.

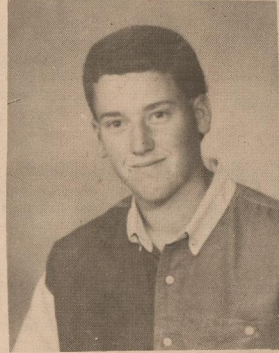

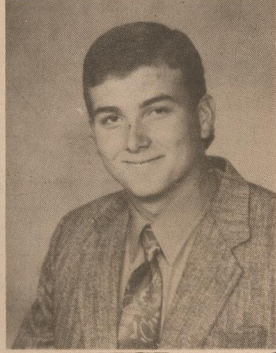

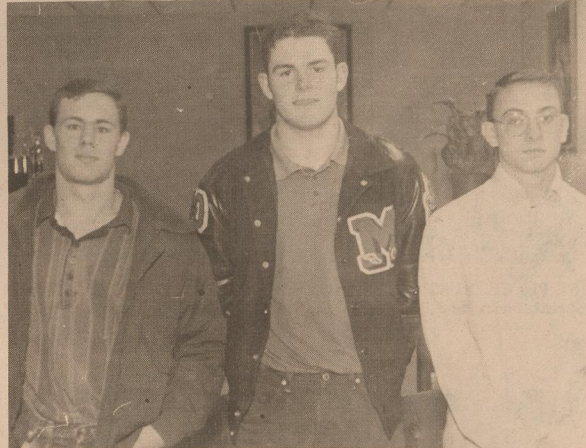
Everyone at school was very anxious and impatient last Friday. We were all ready for a break.

The Court explained that it was extremely hard to change a polling place. They suggested making arrangements before the election to correct any problems. Also that other precinct election judges were responsible for the cleaning and preparing of their polling places. Gail Davis and Gary Clawson, representatives of the Central Plains MHMR gave an update on the services provided by MHMR for Motley County and the other eight counties. Clawson and Davis informed the court they were working on more outreach in the outlying counties. They are also interested in using office space available in smaller counties to bring help to the people. They announced there will be a public meeting on April 6 in Matador for public citizens to bring needs of the County and answer any questions about the program they might have. The Judge and the Commissioners were also invited to a luncheon and tour of the MHMR facilities in Plainview on April 14. The Court discussed joining the School District in trying to collect delinquent taxes. 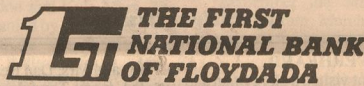

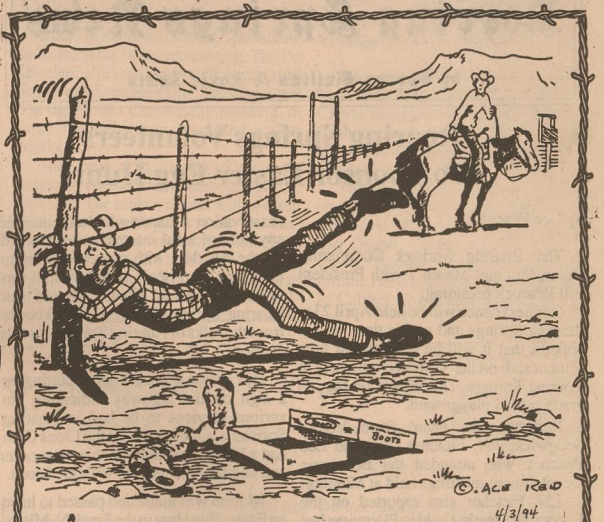
