

# **New Construction** To Begin At School

In a few weeks you will notice construction taking place at the Motley County Schools. Plans for three elemen-tary classrooms and a new concession

stand/restrooms have been approved.
Thanks to the Jayton I.S.D., the Motley County School District will be able to build and offer students much needed opportunities.

Senate Bill 7 gave wealthier school districts several options to share their wealth with the less wealthy districts or send their so called excess money to the state. Motley County was one of the school districts the service of the school districts the service of the school districts the service of the service of the school districts the service of the service of the school districts the service of the serv districts that was selected by Jayton to receive additional revenue. As you may have guessed, there were strings attached

to this money by the state. One requirement is that the money must be used to improve student achievement. Another requirement is that the money could not be used to lower the districts tax rate; nor could the money be used to replace any part of the districts budget or debt.

With these thoughts in mind, and the limitations put on this money, Motley County I.S.D. has decided to build and equip an elementary computer lab, a pre-Kindergarten classroom and a science/art multi-purpose room.

PARENTAL REFORM, A KEY TO CHILDREN'S SUCCESS IN SCHOOL.....

swer is parental reform
Since 1965 parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children living in single parent families and the proportion of mar-ried mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's

When 24,600 eighth grades were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their parents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the impor-

of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television view-

ing restrictions.

Here are some things parents can do to help increase their child's success in

— The first step is communication.

Talk regularly about current school experiences. Students who never talk to their parents about school are three times more likely to drop out of school than those who do talk with their parents.

Restrict television viewing on come along.

SAMPARAMANA school nights. Students with television

restrictions are 9 percent less likely to drop out than those with no restrictions.

— Finally, provide adequate afterschool supervision. Let students know what is expected of them in terms of education, Parents who expect more of In the war against declining student achievement, many solutions have been tried. A quest for better teachers, improved texts and challenging curricula have each played a roll in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is proven to prove the provent in several profession.

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT In a nationwide poll of 24,600 eighth

graders, students were asked how often during the school year they talked with one or both of their parents about things studied in class. Over 45 percent talked with their parents twice or less during the entire school year. An analysis of the National Educational Longitudinal Study found that talking regularly about current school experiences had a positive effect on student test scores.

# TELEVISION RESTRICTIONS AND SCHOOL DROP-OUTS

It has been determined that parents tance of education, kids tend to do what monitoring and restricting television they want to do. Few of them choose viewing times of their school-age chileducational activities. This same group dren can lower the chances of the child dropping out of school. A group of eighth graders were monitored and 19 percent of those having no television restrictions dropped out of school. Nine percent fewer students dropped out when television viewing was restricted.



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
