Rounding a curve on damp, slippery pavement, his machine skidded off the road and rolled over and over down the side of a steep embankment; finally came to rest right-side-up with the driver crushed in the wreckage. Stated speed limits apply only to average conditions, and a safe speed at ordinary times can be a very dangerous speed in bad weather. The law has a right to expect motorists to drive below stated speed limits when special conditions demand it.

WAA TO SELL 100 DALHART BUILDINGS

Spot bid tactics in the disposal of surplus real property will be adopted by War Assets Administration for the first time in Texas in selling 100 buildings at the Dalhart Army Air Field July 15, officials of the Grand Prairie office announced.

"Through elimination of the customary sealed bid procedure, we hope to solve some emergency problems for West Texas growers in handling their bumper 1947 wheat harvest," Jack Cowart, chief of the urban rural branch, non-industrial real property division, who will conduct the sale. "Many of the frame structures will be suitable for bins, storage, poultry and stock, barns or for conversion into living quarters," he said.

Informal bids will be accepted at the sale and awards will be announced as fast as high bids can be determined on non-priority basis. Most of the buildings will be offered individually and bidding will be open to all comers. The property includes a complete cold storage plant, barracks, supply rooms, administrative, recreation, shops, service stations and dog kennels.

The public is invited to make inspection daily through July 14

Electric Iron In Top Position As Home Fire-Starters

Among the items that help start household fires as the housewife goes about her daily tasks, the electric iron ranks up among the worst of them.

Ordinarily the blame can't be put on the iron, but on the person who goes off for a few minutes and forgets to turn it off.

Home management specialists of the Texas A & M College Extension Service say that if a housewife is really safety-minded, she will not only turn off the iron when she leaves it, but disconnect it as well, even if she leaves only for a few minutes.

"Octopus connections", several electrical connections from one outlet, are another serious household fire hazard, the specialists say. A safe rule is to make only one or two connections from an outlet and avoid

the use of extension cords except as temporary wiring.

Other electrical "don'ts" around the house are: don't hang extension cords over nails, or run them through doors or underneath rugs; don't use worn cords on lamps and appliances; don't let clothing, draperies, or other inflammable materials come too close to light bulbs.

Is Your Child a Self-Feeder or Not?

For many months the baby is content to be fed. Sometimes, however, early interest in the spoon may appear even as early as seven months. If that is so, allow the infant to play with a spoon while feeding him. This encouragement will reap future rewards, but it will require many months before the baby is able to fill the spoon and carry its contents to his mouth without dropping the food. However, spilling accidents should be cheerfully ignored. Between eighteen and twenty-four months great progress in self-feeding is made. Some children are adept with a fork at two years but a spoon or fingers are usually preferred. The competency of a knife and fork is achieved by quite a few five-year-old tykes.

Some children change from trained to junior foods without any trouble; others require a period of gradual education. Usually at about eight months or so these coarser foods are introduced. At that time it may be wise to include a small amount of the junior foods, together with a serving of the strained foods which the baby knows and enjoys. It is necessary for a child to eat a variety of foods, to learn to chew properly and exercise his teeth and gums. Junior foods are specially made foods for toddlers. They include:

- Chicken Farina Vegetable Porridge, Vegetables with Lamb and Liver, Creamed Tomatoes and Rice, Creamed Diced Vegetables, Chopped Mixed Vegetables, Chopped Carrots, Chopped Green Beans, Chopped Spinach, Pineapple Rice Pudding, Prune

Pudding, Apricots and Apple Sauce.

In smoothing out feeding difficulties consider these feeding tips for the toddlers:

1. Make a mealtime fun. Avoid quarreling, nagging or teasing. Maintain a pleasant attitude when serving food to the baby. Treat spilling accidents calmly.
2. Be sure the eating set-up is comfortable. Seat the child in properly-sized table and chair arrangement. Use dishware and silverware easy to handle and suitable to the consistency of the food, regardless of adult table etiquette.
3. Serve food attractively. Use small servings of bite-sized pieces, allowing plenty of second helpings. Do not run food together on the baby's plate. Select good color combinations in food. Make food more inviting by serving it in attractive dishware. Serve a variety of foods but respect the baby's dislikes.
4. Prevent distractions during meals. Avoid excessive play at mealtime. Do not complicate meal with too many table-manner instructions—don't set your standards for table etiquette too high.
5. Teach good habits at mealtime. Permit no bribes or threats to eat food. Employ no coaxing. Avoid forcing of food—learning is gradual. Create a social atmosphere during meals. Prevent dawdling over food, allowing 20 to 30 minutes for each meal. Allow child to eat at his own rate of speed.
6. Create the right mood in the child before mealtime. Prevent overtiredness and excitement.

ECONOMY WAVE SEEN AS PERIL TO TEXAS SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

AUSTIN, July 8. Federal retrenchment carries a threat to operation of the national school lunch program in Texas, says Dr. L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction. The program next year will have to carry on with reduced appropriation, he said, adding that the school lunch act has not yet been finally passed by Congress and the extent of the cut is therefore uncertain.

Last year, 3,716,472 free meals were given. All told, 46,158,286 meals were served, with the federal government refunding \$4,152,984 to Texas schools participating.

"The program has been credited with promoting regular attendance at the school in addition to the nutrition and health benefits which will accrue to growing children from a well-balanced meal," Dr. Wood said.

WHEAT PILED HIGH IN AREAS OF PANHANDLE

Seven-foot high piles of wheat in farmyards, along railroad right of ways, on grassy plots and even on the vacant lot behind the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, steadily increased in number thruout the Panhandle Tuesday as the harvest continued without any relief for already-bulging elevators.

Every county in the harvest area reported grain on the ground in quantity, and J. B. Kidd, farm labor field assistant at Plainview, estimated 25,000,000 bushels already have been dumped because of the shortage of storage space.

He estimated that between 40,000,000 and 50,000,000 bushels of wheat will spend some time on the ground in the Panhandle alone, but predicted that spoilage will be less than one per cent, and the loss will be less than the cost of extra handling.

But he added that the 1947 record wheat crop had disclosed one Texas weakness: lack of storage facilities along the Texas Gulf Coast.

He said he had asked Georgia for information on its marketing bureau. He said a similar agency might spur Texas coastal cities to greater facilities.

COTTON STOCK TO FALL SHORT

WASHINGTON — The United States faced the prospect Tuesday of the smallest supply of cotton for the coming marketing year in nearly a quarter of a century.

The Agriculture Department's acreage figures, the first cotton report of the season, indicated that production this year possibly may fall nearly 2,000,000 bales short of estimated requirements.

The department reported the cotton acreage in cultivation on July 1 at 21,389,000 acres, an increase of 17.6 per cent over last year but about 10 per cent below the government's recommended goal.

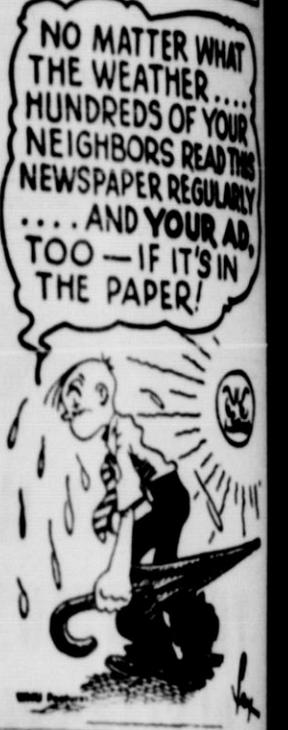
The department made no production forecasts, but the crop would be about 10,495,000 bales if the acreage abandoned is equal to the ten-year average and the yield per acre is equal to the long-time average of about 250 pounds.

The first official production forecast will be issued August 8. In setting a goal of 24,000,000 acres, the department last winter estimated needs for the marketing year beginning August 1 at about 12,360,000 bales.

The report gave no reason for failure of farmers to plant the recommended acreage, but officials said shortages of fertilizer and farm workers were factors.

This year's crop will be supplemented by a carryover of about 3,000,000 bales from previous crops. This carryover is the smallest since 1929 and is 60 per cent smaller than last year's.
