Last week Matador regis tered 1.01 inches on June 29 bringing the month's total to 2.05 inches and the year's total to 6.51 inches

below average rainfall over 20year period). Showers starting with .30-inch early Sunday morning, .10-inch Monday, .05nch Tuesday and 1.32 inches early Wednesday, the week's total was up to 1.77 inches and the year's total looked more favorable with 8.38 inches.

Not reported in last week's Tribune was the flash floods that brought devastation to Flomot and Quitaque areas (see photo at left). Much of the rich Flomot farming land was washed away, including crops and soil as terraces broke under the strain of torrential rains.

During the flood period the stream was approximately one mile wide, sweeping away fences, telephone lines and 200-feet span of the old wooden bridge up river between Flomot and Quitaque. Thousands of acres of fine crops were washed away during the storm which tore away terraces over a wide area. 
