# World Democracies Should Share Support Of Refugees

(Special to the Tribune)

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Congressman Jack Hightower declares he is against the United States' taking hundreds of thousands of South Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees under its wings, particularly during this recessionary period when a high percentage of Americans are unemployed and swell the welfare rolls.

The Congressman noted there have been reports of 600,000 to one million refugees coming to America. "This must not happen," he

Hightower said an estimated 50,000 South Vietnamese are considered in special danger of Communist retaliation. "I hope the President will call on the democracies of the world to assist these people," he said.

"The Communist brand of justice has been too often demonstrated to us," the Congressman said. "It would mean torture and probable execution for these people lives on the line solely because of their assistance to and friendship with Ameri-

Hightower said many of these refugees are close relatives of Americans or resident aliens. "I believe no person with Christian compassion can ignore their tragic plight," he said.

#### Season Tornado area. If you are caught in "Tornado

COLLEGE STATION -Texas had the dubious honor of leading the nation in the number of tornadoes last year with 116. And another tornado season is at hand.

'Most tornadoes occur during April, May and June during the late afternoon although they can occur at any time of the year or any time during the day," points out Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Most tornadoes occur in the South and between the Rockies and the Appalach-

With a total of 944 reported tornadoes in the United States last year and 361 resulting deaths, 1974 was the worst year for tornadoes since 1925," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Although the average annual number of tornadoes

reported has quadrupled in the past three decades, the number of tornado fatalities has been decreasing. This is probably due to better methods of sighting tornadoes, warning systems and advance preparation for tornadoes, notes Keese.

Tornadoes usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour but wind speeds in the funnel of a tornado get up to 300 miles per hour. Because tornadoes are so

erratic, it's hard to tell just where or when they will occur," points out the engineer He stresses the importance

of having a well rehearsed plan for quick action if a tornado is sighted. The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric

conditions are favorable for

warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar. "If a tornado watch is announced, stay tuned to a

radio or television for weather advisories. A tornado warning demands action, so you should quickly move to a basement, cellar or civil defense shelter," advises Keese. "Keep a battery-powered radio handy in case power is lost.'

If your home doesn't have basement or cellar, go to the lowest level in the center of the home or get in a closet or small room or under heavy furniture, suggests the engineer. Open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes.

Stay away from windows and buildings such as gymnasiums and auditoriums with wide free-span roofs. If you live in a mobile home, move to a shelter

from the tornado at a right angle to its path or lie flat in a ditch or ravine," he adds. "Do not stay in your car if you cannot safely evade the tornado by driving away from it or at right angles to its path. If you sight a tornado,

report it promptly to the nearest law enforcement officer, but do not tie up the phone with unnecessary calls "After a tornado, always

wear thick-soled shoes and gloves in cleanup work and watch for broken gas pipes and downed electrical wires," warns Keese. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you are sure there are no gas leaks

Furthermore, stay away from disaster areas unless you're helping with rescue and cleanup operations.

that work that can be done. Enameling means many things in America," she said, enameling woodwork, enameling fingernails, and other everyday things you think of when you think of enamel. Enameling is one of the fine art crafts and ranks with painting, sculpting, and jewelry. To artists it means applying glass to metal, heated at high temperatures where it fuses to metal, copper, silver or gold." The art dates back to the era before Christ, she said. "Cloisonne' is the forerunner to all enameling, she added.

Two types of enamel which Mrs. Bennett uses are opaque and transparent. She explained that pieces are fired at a temperature between 1400 and 1500 degrees Farenheit, and are fired each time a different color is added. "One way to tell if the enamelware is hand-done is to look for the firing ring around the edge of the piece. Another way is to be sure it has, on the back, a

coat of enamel," she said. Mrs. Bennett also is interested in painting, stitchery, and pottery, but always returns to enameling. "Art is a strong motivating force and makes a person appreciate everything more," she declared, adding that she is never bored as "... each day

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



4. Don't order new or unfamiliar products over the phone unless you know the dealer, or are sure of what you're buying, who you are buying from and when to expect delivery.

5. Check into the costbenefit ratio -- be sure the investment will pay off.

6. Beware of "good deals" on name brand products or unknown "wonder products" that do not carry state label approval - they may be fraudulent or stolen. When in doubt, contact your local extension agent for verifica-

7. Finally, when you do purchase and use a new product, leave an untreated check strip to verify the product's relative efficiency. (This is one reason we run many of the local tests.)

Says process an animal on-thefarm in four to six hours. Home slaughtering and processing can save 30 to 50 per cent of the price of a retail beef, and the normal locker plant charges of about \$50 for a 600 lb. calf.

As long as the individual is butchering the animal for his own use, he is within the law by doing so. It is illegal to custom slaughter or cut beef for other people unless the operation is properly inspected and meets all legal requirements.

Don't limit 1975 crop production before you plant. Be sure of the seed you plant. Conditions in 1974 didn't allow all seed to mature properly, so if you caught your cottonseed for planting, have a germination test run. If you buy seed, make sure germination information is available.

You can't produce on a plant that isn't there, and no one wants to spend the time and money trying to get up a seed that won't come up.

That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, towit: one election at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the District shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically, with respect to a submitted PROPOSITION, (a) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors of the District, and also (b) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against the

PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. Each elector shall be entitled to vote once, in accordance with the provi-


sions of this Resolution. 5. That a substantial copy of this Resolution shall serve as proper Notice of said election, and said Notice shall be published in a newspaper having general circulation in said District, once each week for two consecutive weeks, with the first publication to be at least 14 days prior to the

6. That at said election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION "Shall the Board of Directors of Matador Water District be authorized to issue the bonds of said District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$284,000, with the bonds of each such series, respectively, to mature, be sold at such prices, and bear interest at such rates, as shall be determined within the discretion of said Board of Directors, for the purpose of acquiring or constructing inside or outside the boundaries of the District water walls and all

works, plants, transmission lines, and other facilities necessary or useful for the purpose of diverting, impounding, storing, drilling, pumping, treating and transporting water to the City of Matador, and others for municipal, domestic, industrial, mining, oil flooding, or any other useful purposes; and shall said Board of Directors be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds when due, with said bonds to be additionally secured by and payable from a lien on and pledge of all or any part of the revenues or income of the District, including contract payments, as are specified in the resolution authorizing the issuance of such bonds, all in accordance with House Bill 675, the 64th Legislature, Regular Session, 1975?

7. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" aforesaid PROP-OSITION, and said ballots shall be printed in substantially the following form:

Demand for quality cotton continues to increase. Not only is the use of natural fiber rebounding, but the by-product market is also expanding. Since average cottonseed meal is at least 41 percent protein, it is becoming increasingly important as a primary feed for cattle, sheep and horses.

Expeller, Hydraulic and Solvent are processes used to produce meal or cake from raw cottonseed. Expeller and Hydraulic processes leave about 5 percent fat content in processed meal while the Solvent process leaves less than 1-1/2 percent.

Research now underway may result in an economically feasible method of limiting Gossypol (a cottonseed toxin) content to low enough levels to make cottonseed meal a primary protein supplement for swine and poultry. Success could significantly increase this by-product demand.
