The Matador City Council met Thursday, October 13, with Mayor Gary Lancaster, and Council members L.B. Campbell, Don Warren, and Brenda Perryman attending. Travis Jameson and Shane Jones were absent.

The minutes and bills were read and approved, except for the membership to SPAG. Mayor Lancaster read a letter the County Judge stating that they had dropped the \$100 per month for the night-watchman from their budget, and will no longer be sending it to the City.

Michael Clawson, County Agent, explained the Immigration Reform Act. Clawson also handed out booklets completed from the long range Extension Program for the shaping of the future of Motley County.

Craig Turner explained his two-way radio systems. Council elected to purchase three of the radios.

Charlie Johnson asked the Council if the Methodist Church could put a handicapped ramp on the southeast side of the

* Accepted resignations of Larry Hoyle and Kenny Barton from Water District Board and appointed Travis Jameson and Shane Jones to fill these places on the Board.

Meeting adjourned.

TRAFFIC SAFETY CAN SAVE MONEY

Recently, at the Lifesavers Symposium in Washington D.C., the U.S. Secretary of Transportation Fredrico Pena emphasized the fact that highway safety can help contain health care costs.

Reduced drunk driving and increased safety belt use will benefit the nation's health care system by reducing emergency and trauma costs.

Pena set national goals for 1997 aimed at reducing health care costs by \$1 billion. This entails saving 3,000 lives annually, decreasing alcohol-related fatalities from 45 percent to 43 percent and increasing safety belt use from 62 percent to 75 percent nationwide. Pointing out that murders snuffout about 70 lives each day while the daily death toll from traffic crashes is more than 100, Pena asked, "Shouldn't we find that statistic equally alarming?"

You can make a major contribution in reducing injuries and fatalities associated with motor vehicle crashes by insisting that everyone in your vehicle buckle up. If you choose to drink, know how you are going to get back home safely. Individuals must be responsible not only for themselves but for others. Impaired drivers

also endanger innocent victims. Watch out for those who have been drinking. Don't let them drive.

Educational efforts are targeting groups to promote the safety benefits of child safety seats, safety belts, airbags, motor cycle helmets, driving alert and sober, etc. For program information on traffic safety, contact Janie Harris, passenger-occupant safety education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at (409) 845-1859.

State and local agencies that oversee traffic safety have been charged to strictly enforce the safety restraint laws, motor cycle helmet laws, and anti-drunk driving measures. You can get involved in your community by supporting the enforcement of the Texas Safety Restraint Laws and Texas DWI laws.

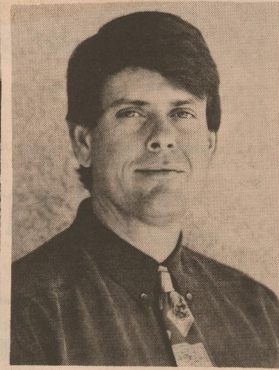

Kelly Wason Receives Doctorate In Marketing

Kelly Don Wason completed in August the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in business administration at Texas Tech University with a marketing major.

A long-time resident of Plainview, he attended Plainview public schools, graduating from PHS in 1976. He also is a 1981 graduate of Wayland Baptist University where he received the bachelor of science degree in biology.

While working as a researcher at the El Paso Products Co., in Odessa, Wason completed the master of business administration degree at The University of Texas of the Permian Basin in 1983. For the next several years he worked as a key accounts manager and original equipment manufacturer (OEM) sales engineer with the computer industry. Based in the Dallas area, he had national and international

responsibility for developing and maintaining major manufacturing customers. During his tenure as a doctoral student, Wason received the Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching. He also won a summer research grant in university-side competition.

His dissertation is entitled "Effects of Context on Consumer Complaining Behavior" and is an application of attribution theory (the way people assign causes to events that happen in their lives to negative consumption experiences). The focus of the research is on when and how consumers complain about unsatisfactory products or services.

Dr. Wason has been a member of the faculty of the College of Business at Eastern New Mexico University since 1992 where he serves as an assistant professor, teaching and doing research in the area of marketing.

While at Eastern New Mexico University, he has had research accepted for publication in "Advances in Marketing", "The American Marketing Association Summer Educator's Conference," and "The Southwest Business Symposium."

He also taught in the Business Department of Wayland before moving to Portales. He and Susan Livesay were married in 1981. They have two daughters, Sarah and Emily.

Dr. Wason is the son of Don and June Wason of Plainview and the grandson of Artie Wason of Matador, the late W.B. Wason and the late Preston (Peg) and Beatrice Spray.

The formal hooding ceremony will be at Texas Tech University graduation on December 17.

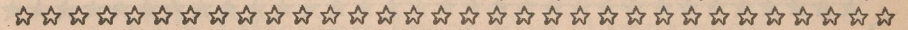

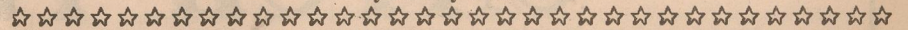

Matadors Fall To Petersburg, 28-6

The Petersburg Buffaloes proved to be too strong for Motley County as they handed the Matadors their first district loss, 28-6, last Friday night.

The game was dominated by the cold, rainy weather and the stout Petersburg defense. That defense scored the first touchdown of the game as Buffalo Jesse Ovalle picked up a Matador fumble and ran it back 31 yards for the score. The extra point failed and the score stood at 6-0 early in the game.

After receiving the kickoff, Motley County put together its best drive of the night. Starting at their own 38 yard line, the Mats marched to the Petersburg 13 before a pass interception killed the drive. Petersburg then drove back down the

field in 8 plays with Rudy Marquez running for a 2 yard touchdown to make the score 12-0.

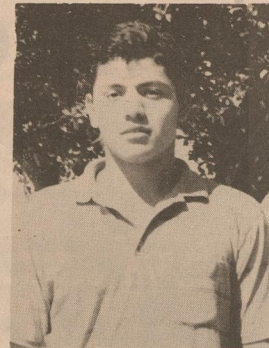
Two strong defensive stands by the Matadors in the second quarter prevented Petersburg from scoring anymore points before intermission. First, a fumbled punt snap gave the Buffaloes the ball at the Motley County 10 yard line, but they were stopped at that point and missed a 21 yard field goal attempt. After a Matador punt, the Buffaloes drove inside the Motley County 5 yard line where they were held out of the end zone as time ran out in the first half with the score still 12-0.

Petersburg would score twice more in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. Ramiro Ramos ran 54 yards for one

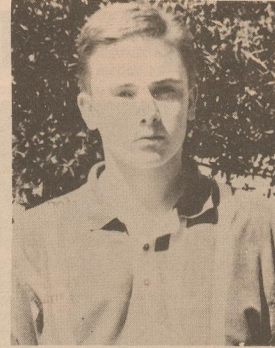
touchdown. The 2 point run made the score 20-0. A fumbled punt gave the Buffaloes the second touchdown of the quarter. Another successful 2 point run made the score 28-0 entering the final period.

Motley County got on the board in the fourth quarter as Brad Thacker ran the quarterback sneak for a 1 yard T.D. The touchdown was set up by Kevin Keltz's 84 yard interception return that gave the Matadors the ball at the Buffalo 11 yard line.

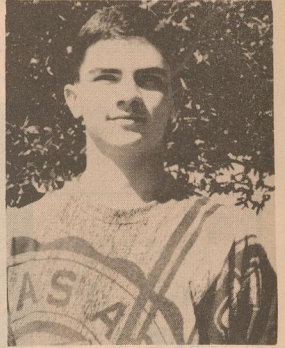

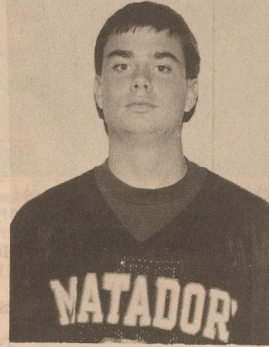

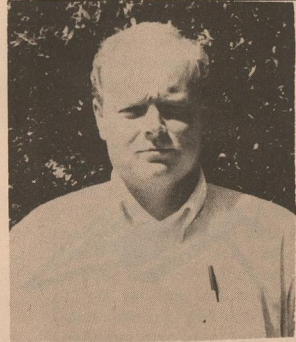

David Brewer is a new teacher and coach at Motley County ISD. We are all glad to have him as a part of our school. Coach Brewer is originally from

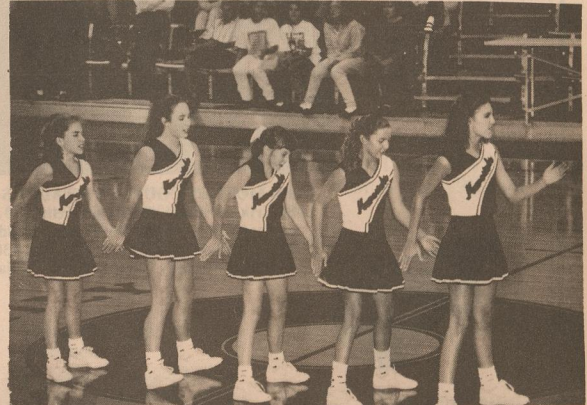

He says that he likes it here because there are great kids with great attitudes and teachers and administrators who really care.

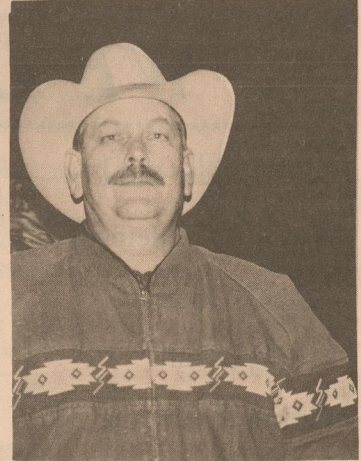
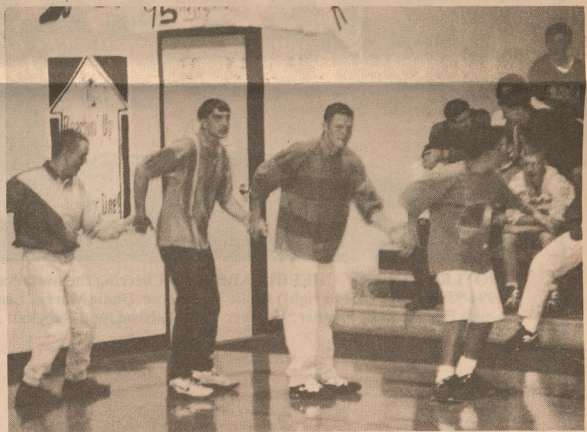

SCS Offering Trees For Windbreak And Wildlife Planting

The Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District will again be offering trees for windbreak and wildlife planting. This program is a joint effort between the Soil and Water Conservation District and the Texas Forest Service.

The West Texas nursery located at Lubbock grows the trees from seed and delivers to the SWCD's throughout the western half of Texas. Orders must be turned in early due to the quick depletion of available stock. Last year many species

were sold out before the end of October, so order early. Evergreen trees being offered at \$35.00 for 20 trees include: Eastern Red Cedar, Afghan Pine, Arizona Cypress, and Austrian Pine. These trees are 12 to 18 inches tall and in small containers when they arrive.

Hardwood trees offered at \$26 for 50 include: Catalpa, Russian Olive, Desert Willow, Flameleaf Sumac, Honeylocust, Sandcherry, Nanking Cherry, Shumard Oak, Aromatic Sumac, Green Ash, and

Little Walnut. These trees are bare rooted and 12 to 24 inches tall.

Deadline for ordering trees will be February 1, 1995. Trees may be ordered at the Soil Conservation Service Office in Matador any day of the week. Office hours are 7 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. daily.

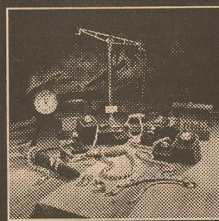
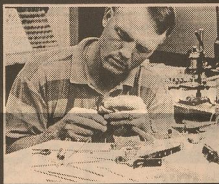

L.T. STARKEY ENDS CAREER AS A LAWMAN

L.T. Starkey, son of Mrs. C.W. (Bessie) Starkey of Flomot, will retire Oct. 31 after almost 31 years in law enforcement, 19 of those as Ralls police chief.

The 61 year old Starkey said before he graduated from high school in Flomot, he knew he wanted to become a police officer. The Ralls sheriff caught wind of his career goal and called Starkey in for an interview. Starkey worked 12 years as a sheriff's deputy.

Starkey then worked five years for Energas and spent two years working for a church retreat camp in Floydada. "Once you hang a gun and badge on, it gets in your blood," he said. When the Ralls council offered him the chief's job, he took it.

Law enforcement has changed a lot during the past three decades, Starkey said. The bootlegger problem all but dried up, but incidents of family violence skyrocketed. The legal system, which seems to favor criminals, represents another unwelcome change. "If I had only kept a diary," he said.

Dewain Collins, supervisor with the Texas Dept. of Public Safety and James Hale, Floydada police chief, agree that Starkey's work is his bond and he treats everyone fairly. He makes law enforcement profession look good. He has done so much in the area, people will never forget him.

Mr. Starkey plans to work part time as a carpenter. During his free time, he and wife, Roddie will travel.

The Danger of Self-Sufficiency



And Jesus said to them: "Take heed, and beware of all covetousness; for a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." And he told them a parable, saying, "The land of a rich man brought forth plentifully, and he thought to himself, 'What shall I do, for I have nowhere to store my crops?' And he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns, and build larger ones; and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; take your ease, eat, drink, be merry.' But God said to him, 'Fool! 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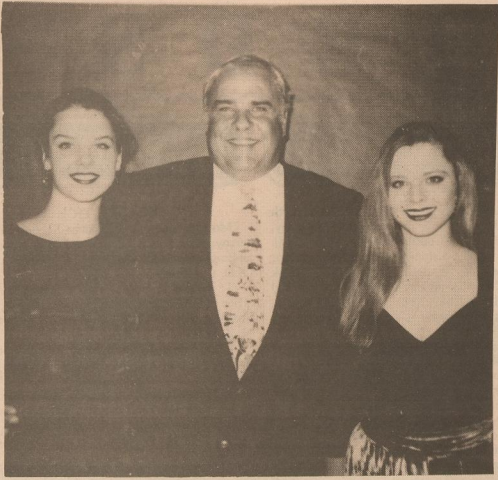

Field Day To Be Held At Y Experimental Ranch

Research that can help Texas ranchers make the most of their ranching operations will be presented on Thursday, October 27th at the Texas A&M University's Y Experimental Ranch. The Y Ranch is located southeast of Paducah.

The Field Day, which begins with registration at 9:15 a.m. and continues until 3:30 p.m., will be presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Experiment Station. There will be a \$10.00 registration fee to cover lunch and educational materials.

During the morning, participants will rotate among three concurrent sessions. In one, Dr. Ron Gill, Extension Livestock Specialist, will provide hands-on training in body condition scoring in female cattle and discuss effects on rebreeding. At another, Dr. William Pinchak, Profes-

or of Range Nutrition with the Experiment Station in Vernon, will discuss shipping stress and effects of pasture condition of gain performance.

The third session will include Dr. Richard Teague, Professor of Range Ecology with the Experiment Station in Vernon, will discuss Old World Bluestem grazing and grazing pressure.

After lunch, the group will tour the 40,000 acre ranch and observe several research projects being conducted. On the tour, Dr. Jim Ansley, Professor of Ranch Plant Physiology with the Experiment Station in Vernon, will discuss brush management alternatives.

TxDOT To Unveil Innovative Project: "Real Texans" Aviation Honored With Project's First Roadside Sign

The Texas Department of Transportation is launching a new program with a kickoff ceremony in the Childress District. The new program, "Real Texans" is a multi-faceted pilot program that is intended to encourage motorists to avoid driver fatigue by taking frequent breaks during long trips, reduce litter on Texas highways and encourage recycling. Signs that provide informative historical notes about "Real Texans", will be placed at roadside stops to encourage a 5-minute break from driving as well as provide an opportunity to appropriately dispose of trash.

The Childress District will unveil the first of these signs in a roadside ceremony at 10:55 a.m., Saturday, October 22, 1994, at U.S. Highway 287, approximately two miles west of Estelline, south side of the highway, near Red River Bridge. The program's first sign honors the Women's Airforce Service Pilots of World War II. Special events will occur at the Childress Municipal Airport because it is the former location of a WWII bomber training site, where a WASP detachment was based in the 1940's. A regional "Young

Eagles" fly-in will be one of the main attractions at the Childress Municipal Airport, Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Pilots from the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), will donate their time and aircraft to provide children ages eight to seventeen with a flight experience free-of-charge.

Following the morning roadside ceremony, a special noon luncheon at K's Steakhouse will be sponsored by the Women's Council of Childress Chamber of Commerce. Florene Miller Watson, a former commander of these women pilots, and Dave Fulton, Director of the Aviation Division, Texas Department of Transportation, will be guest speakers. Mr. Fulton will discuss the benefits that a general aviation airport can bring to a community, and the future outlook for general aviation in Texas.

Prior to the luncheon, Mr. Fulton will be at the Childress Municipal Airport from 11:25 a.m. until 11:55 a.m., to meet informally with pilots from the EAA, and with the news media to answer questions and discuss area airport needs and projects.

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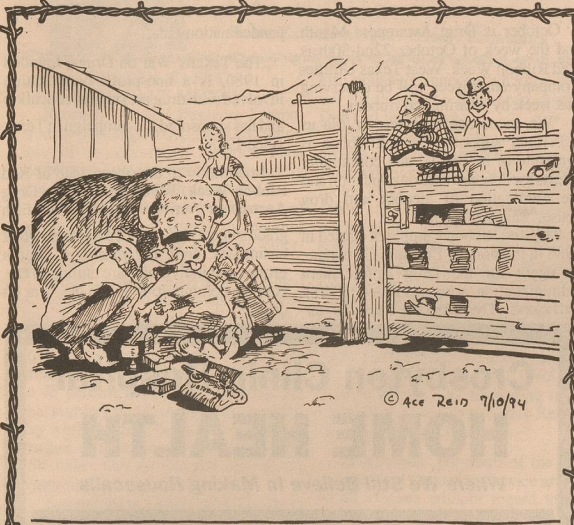
