


TRAFFIC SAFETY CAN SAVE MONEY

Recently, at the Lifesavers Sympo-sium in Washington D.C., the U.S. Secre-tary of Transportation Fredrico Pena Emphasized the fact that highway safety can help contain health care costs. Reduced drunk driving and increased safety belt use will benefit the nation's safety belt use will benefit the nation's health care system by reducing emer-gency and trauma costs.

Pena set national goals for 1997 aimed at reducing health care costs by \$1 bil-lion. This entails saving 3,000 lives annu-ally, decreasing alcohol-related fatalities from 45 percent to 43 percent and in-creasing safety belt use from 62 percent to 75 percent nationwide. Pointing out that murders snuffout about 70 lives each day while the daily death toll from traffic crashes is more than 100, Pena asked, "Shouldn't we find that statistic equally

alarming alarming?" You can make a major contribution in reducing injuries and fatalities associated with motor vehicle crashes by insisting that everyone in your vehicle buckle up. If you choose to drink, know how you are going to get back home safely. Individu-als must be responsible not only for them-ealves but for other. Impaired drivers selves but for others.
