FORMBY PLANS TO BOW OUT AS STATE HIGHWAY CHIEF

AUSTIN (UPI) — Chairman Marshall Formby of the Texas Highway Commission, who has said he plans to run for governor in 1960, officially advised Gov. Price Daniel Thursday he does not seek reappointment to the highway commission.

Formby, of Plainview, said in a telegram to Daniel: "In view of the fact that I have definite plans in mind for 1960, I do not feel that I am in position to be considered for reappointment to the highway commission and therefore take this means of informing you that I do not seek reappointment."

Formby's term on the highway commission expires Feb. 15. "My six years as highway commissioner," Formby wired the governor, "have been happy and interesting years. Thank you for the splendid cooperation of the highway department has received from your administration in building better and safer highways for our Texas citizens."

Deputy Jody Graham said the trunk compartment contained, besides the bound Mexican, many items, including part of a pitchfork, tire tools, jacks, etc. The back of the car had also been recently used to haul a freshly butchered hog.

"Doctor" Is Delivered
The father brought his prisoner here. At the jail he opened the car trunk lid and told Deputy Graham.

"There he is, I didn't want to kill him and go to the penitentiary. I want the law to send him to the penitentiary."

What officers saw was not pretty. The "doctor" was in very bad condition. One eye was completely shut. He was thought he was dead. He was taken to Stanley Hospital for treatment and later lodged in jail.

Officers said it would be necessary to file juvenile charges against the man in San Antonio. He is charged here with practicing medicine without a license.
