## Motley Singers Meet Scheduled

NEW OFFICERS will be elected here Sunday when the Motley County Singing Convention holds its second 1959 semi-annual meeting, it was announced this week by President Bruce Martin. The meeting will be held in the American Legion building, starting at 10 a. m. and continuing until 4 p. m.

Traditional basket lunch will be served at noon, Martin said, with residents of the Matador area being hosts to the record crowd of visitors expected to attend.

The oldest organization in the county, the Motley County Singing Convention met for half a century in various communities. The advent of automobiles and hard-surfaced roads were a factor in causing the organization to accept the Legion's offer of a permanent "home" and use of facilities, several years ago.

Other functions of the singers' organization remain about the same as when it was founded more than three score years ago.

Big event of the "singing convention" in old days was "dinner on the ground" which meant that a tablecloth (or other material) was spread on the ground in picnic style, and the food placed on it.

At the Legion building tables are used on which to spread the noonday food. Martin urges all friends and patrons of the singers to bring well-filled baskets that ample food will be provided for all the visitors.

Well-known quartets, such as the Stamps and others have attended on previous occasions and many outstanding singers are expected here Sunday, in response to invitations sent out by Mrs. Martin, who has been serving as secretary of the organization.

### Flomot Lions Net \$200 On Carnival

Net proceeds of the street carnival held last week end by the Flomot Lions Club were approximately \$200 according to club secretary Wilburn Martin.

The carnival was well attended with eight booths operating. An electric blanket donated by C. M. Barton of Salem Dry Goods in Matador was received by Bill Woods of Quitaque.

Proceeds of the carnival will be used in acquiring the use of a rural fire fighting truck, (which will be placed at the community's disposal,) through the Motley County Civil Defence.

Newest project of the Flomot Lions Club is providing the community and northwestern Motley County with suitable trash disposal ground.

Lion Malcolm Turner has granted the use of approximately three acres for the purpose. A trench for the dumping of refuse has been opened on the land. The ground is located on the north bank of North Peace River on Farm Road 2099. The dump ground is three miles from Flomot and reached over a dry weather road about 100 yards off the highway, north of the river bridge. An all weather road will be provided later.

Trench for dumping is six feet deep, eight feet wide and 75 feet long. Commissioner Turner has explained that when the trench is filled, another will be opened.

A sign locating the dump pit will be erected in the near future.

### Unusual Date Tree Growing In Matador

An unusual fruit-bearing tree is growing in Matador, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Day. When they were given the tree about five years ago by Mason Harwell of Quanah, it was thought that it was an olive tree. In fact, the fruit bears a marked resemblance to an olive.

Through the cooperation of County Agent Bill Palmeyer, the Days have recently learned that the correct name for this particular plant is Chinese Jubube, sometimes referred to as a Chinese Date. The information came from B. G. Hancock, Extension Horticulturist of College Station, who examined a plant specimen sent him for identification.

According to Mr. Hancock, this plant was imported from Asia and has been grown over a pretty wide area of Texas since the early 1920's. It is high in Vitamin C, he said.

"The jubube is not often relished as a fresh fruit but can be preserved in a number of different fashions," Mr. Hancock's report to Palmeyer stated. "The tree is very hardy, has very few insect and disease pests and seldom, if ever, misses a fruit crop. It is grown up into the Panhandle area of the State."

Mrs. Day has preserved several jars of the fruit and plans to use them in a date-loaf recipe.

## Matadors Trounce Lorenzo Hornets

IT HAPPENED in Lorenzo Friday evening. The Matador Matadors swatted down their hosts, the Lorenzo Hornets with a 46-0 score. Guy Campbell led the Matadors scoring attack with three touchdowns and two 2-point conversions. Coach Charlie Johnson and Assistant Coach Don Macon had prepared the Matadors in tight defense playing. When-

ever the Hornets showed signs of gaining yardage, the Matadors put up a wall to hold them. Dale Dixon and Clem Edwards were outstanding defensive players.

Lorenzo took the opening kickoff and was forced to punt. The Matadors took over on their 47 yard line and moved for a touchdown. Campbell climaxed the drive with a 35 yard sprint around right end for the extra points and an 8-0 lead.

The Matadors next touchdown was set up by recovering a Lorenzo fumble on the Matador 38 yard line. Campbell scored on a 2 yard plunge over right guard. Ros Bearden scored the extra points.

Bearden marked up the next entry in the scoring column with a 57 yard jaunt into scoring territory. Bearden raced around left end, moved down the sidelines and broke into the open with the aid of sharp Matador blocking. Campbell blasted over for the extra points that closed out the first half scoring with the Matadors leading 24-0.

Third Touchdown  
Campbell scored his third touchdown of the night on a 55 yard run in the third quarter. The extra points failed leaving the score 30-0.

Crenshaw scored the next touchdown with a 4 yard plunge in the final quarter. Quarterback Dunk Wilson passed to Campbell for the extra points.

The Matadors final tally came on a 48 yard pass and run play from Gary Lancaster to Jimmy Welling. Loyd Martin plunged for the extra points to make the final score 46-0.

The Matadors next opponent will be the Estelline Cubs. The game will open district action for both teams. The outcome is expected to have a strong effect on the outcome of the District race. The game will be played Friday night in Matador on Burleson Field at 8:00.

### Ralls Publisher On Nationwide Television Show

A nationwide television audience Thursday morning experienced an outstanding event in hearing and seeing one of the most sincere men in the United States when Ernest Joiner, publisher of the Ralls Banner, appeared on the Dave Garroway show, entitled "Today" roway show, entitled "Today."

Joiner, well-known in Texas, received nationwide recognition recently when Time magazine devoted a feature article to his salty, but honest writings, and to his fearless journalism.

Hypocrisy has no greater foe than the outspoken editor of the small town West Texas newspaper. He has bluntly attacked politics at every level, and openly accused officials by name of their breach of office oaths. Churches also get their share of his vitriolic typewriter, yet some of his most staunch supporters are preachers, law enforcement officers and men in other public offices.

He said on the television show that he had been shot at and "invited outside" on more than one occasion.

After his article appeared in Time magazine the Ralls Banner received approximately 1,000 new subscribers from all over the United States and many foreign countries.

In person Ernest Joiner is a large man, mild mannered and easy going. As might be expected, he has enemies, but his friends are legion. In his own community of Ralls, he is perhaps best known and liked.

**Money Differences**  
When asked on the Dave Garroway show why his kind of an editor is so rare, his reply was "Economics. When a man ties up money in a newspaper and revenue depends on his advertisers, he contemplates a long time before he says what he thinks."

### Marriage Waiting Period In Effect

A new law passed by the last session of the legislature goes into effect today requiring a three-day waiting period after the application for a marriage license.

County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan said also that proof of age must be supplied in the application for a license. If the woman is less than 18 years of age or the man less than 21 years of age, one parent of the applicant less than legal age, must appear in person at the time application is made.

Mr. Sheridan said it is impossible now to issue the license until after the three-day period, after the application is made with him.

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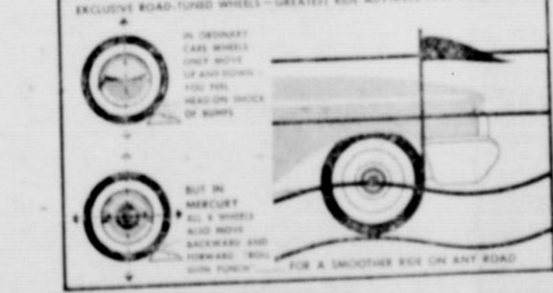

accent. Recent government action has set normal integration back 20 years. Integration is a social issue and can only be resolved through human decency, not by law."

Joiner said his opinion of modern education embraced more actual teaching and less "driver education" and "how to get along in society" courses. He said he studied mathematics and foreign languages and that he studied at night.

It was his opinion that parents are partly to blame for the absence of study at night by students "simply because parents do not wish to disturb an evening's activities by helping their children to learn."

When the interview closed, Garroway said:

"He is a member of a dying minority—a man who is not afraid to say what he thinks—to anybody."
