Rep. Elbert Reeves Is Guest Speaker At El Progreso Study Club Meeting

State Representative Elbert Reeves was guest speaker for a program on Texas, Thursday before El Progreso Study Club. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. Albert Traweck, Jr.

Mrs. L. B. Campbell introduced Mr. Reeves, who spoke on "The State of Education in Texas." He mentioned the wisdom of our forefathers in setting up the educational system and stressed the fact that all children were given an equal opportunity for learning. He discussed the increase in pupils and the need for new class rooms and more teachers.

"Children not only attend classes more regularly, they stay longer," he pointed out. "Part of our schools are now operating on a half day basis because of inadequate facilities. Texas has a great problem at present, in taking care of the educational situation."

At the conclusion of his talk, Rep. Reeves invited questions for further discussion, with several responding.

Miss Amy Glenn brought a report of District 7, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs convention in Plainview, and Mrs. C. M. Barton was presented by Mrs. Free-

man Thacker, for a discussion of polio. Mrs. Barton distributed leaflets on polio and urged parents to have their children given the polio shots, which she said could be obtained now for children from 6 months of age, through 20 years.

Mrs. W. N. Pipkin led the group in singing, "Beautiful Texas" and closing prayer was by Mrs. G. E. Hamilton.

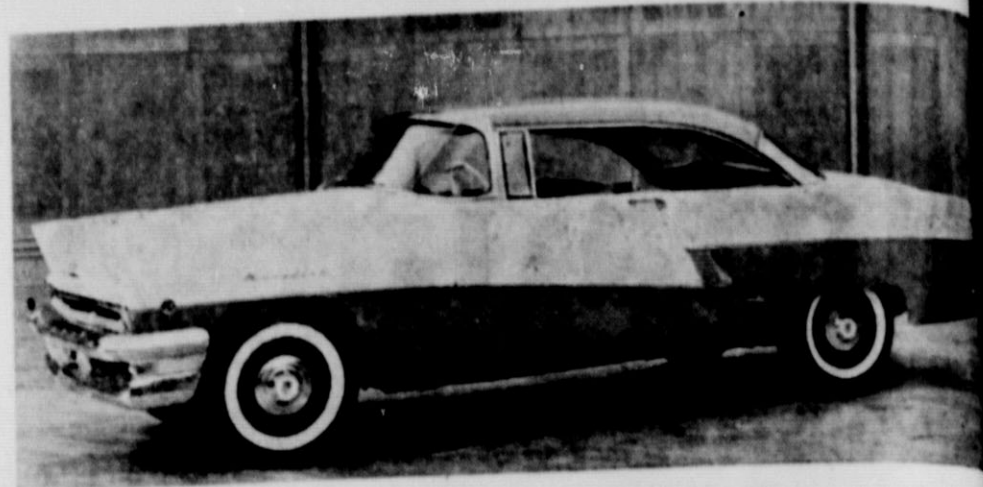

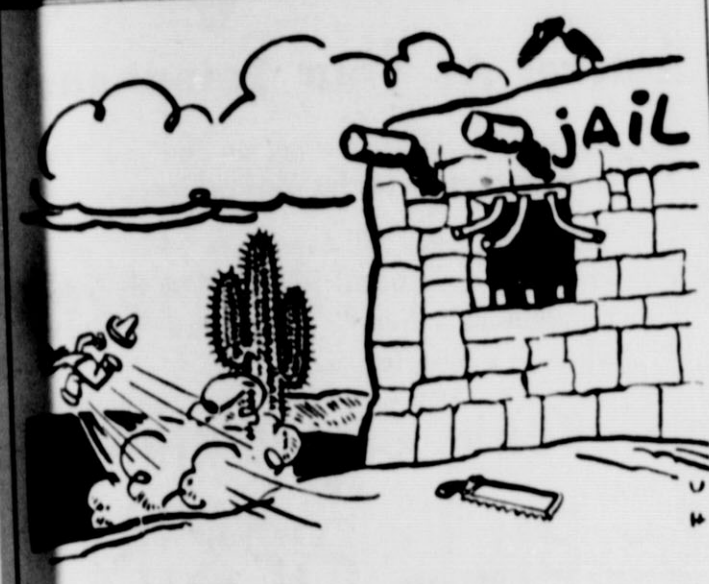

Watch your pruning technique. Make cuts clean, flat or flush with the main limb or trunk. Stubs left by improper cutting may cause rotting of the heart wood. You may need to treat cuts on large limbs by painting with a pruning compound, such as orange shellac, to hasten healing. Most trees make oils to cover small cuts. Generally it is best to put nothing on cuts of 2 inches in diameter or less.
