The mesquite eradication system is known as the Basal Treatment of brush. The treatment, sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service, is declared effective to about 85% kill. It can be used any time of the year without affecting crops. The treatment is applied to each tree individually about three or four feet from the ground. Mr. Bliznak has been using the system about ten years and estimates he has cleared mesquite from 250,000 acres of infestated grazing land. 

The meetings to be held at The Flomot Baptist Church, start at 8:30 p.m. and continue for one hour. Title of the series is "Breakthrough."


