Charlie Johnson Is Named Coach

PROBLEM of a football coach was brought to a logical conclusion at a recent meeting of the Matador school board. Charles Johnson, assistant coach and history teacher for three years here was elected to fill the coaching vacancy.

Previous to coming to Matador, Johnson was head coach at Sunray for four years. He was born at Hedley, where his father, Neil Johnson, is president of a bank. He graduated from Texas Technological College and received his master's degree at

West Texas College, Canyon. He also served a period in the U. S. Navy.

Johnson has been a popular member of the Matador High School faculty since coming here. He is familiar with the football squad, the system used and played as individuals. He has been closely associated with football, helping the coaching work and scouting other teams.

Coach Johnson is married and has two children, Charlotte, 2, and boy, Grant, seven months of age. Currently, Mr and Mrs. Johnson are in Hedley where he has been employed during the summer vacation period.

Supt. Bert Ezzell said he is well pleased with Coach Johnson's election. "There will be some absence from his administrative duties in the school faculty during the football season," he said, "but that will only last for 90 days."

County Residents "Eat High on the Hog" As Grocery Bill Tops Nation's Average

NEW YORK, July 18—With incomes running at a high level in Motley County, the questions being asked are: How much of this money are local residents spending? Where are they spending it and for what?

Answers to the questions are provided in a comprehensive study made by the Standard Rate and Data Service of the buying habits of people locally and in other parts of the United States. It puts under the spotlight each community's outlays for food, cars, apparel, furniture and the like.

In Motley County, it shows food gets top billing. Some \$925,000, or approximately 31 cents of every dollar spent in local retail stores in 1958, were gathered in by grocery stores, bakeries, meat markets and other places selling food for home preparation and consumption. It compares with \$870,000 in 1957.

This was exclusive of what was spent in restaurants, at refreshment stands at lunch counters and elsewhere for on-the-premise use.

The food store purchases, if divided equally among the local population, would come to \$1,005 per household. In the United States the average was \$982 per household and, in the State of Texas, \$960.

The local ability to indulge in more and better food is but one facet of a gradual improvement in the standard of living. It extends to other areas as well. Today's typical family, after paying the bills for the necessities, has more money left than it ever had for the luxuries of life, despite bigger taxes and higher prices.

Even though the past year was one of recession, sales of automotive equipment in Motley County amounted to \$418,000, equivalent to 14 cents of the retail dollar. This was for new and used autos, for tires and other accessories, and for motorcycles and boats.

Stores selling general merchandise had receipts totaling \$62,000, equal to 2 cents of the dollar.

Apparel stores accounted for \$100,000, representing 3 cents. Local sales of home furnishings came to \$277,000 in the year, for 9 cents additional.

Current reports from all over the country indicate that the American people are in a better spending mood than they were a year ago. It is sparking a boom for most retail lines.

Conservation Work Now In Major Role

SOIL AND WATER conservation played a major role in the operations of at least half of the farmers and ranchers in Motley County during the past 12 month period. In a report made by Grady J. Lane, Jr., head of the local Soil Conservation Service office, one out of every two farmers and ranchers in the Matador work unit area applied a reportable conservation practice.

These practices were applied with some degree of assistance in planning or application by the SCS technicians whose services are made available through the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District. The report covering the past fiscal year which ended June 30, points to the tremendous effort being made to conserve the soil, water and plant resources in this area of work which embraces Motley County.

Abundant spring rains accentuated the practice of deferred grazing and has resulted in the best conditioned grassland this area has seen in a decade. This practice was carried out on 128,311 acres. Cattle raisers used their grassland properly this past year on 181,819 acres thus insuring them good forage resources for the future by not overgrazing present supplies.

80 Miles Of Terraces Technicians of the SCS staked and checked out 25 stock ponds during this period. Five miles of diversion terraces were constructed and 80 miles of level terraces were built. A total of 13,479 acres of cropland had a conservation cropping system initiated on them this year which will maintain or improve the fertility level of the soil.

Less wind erosion occurred this past spring due to an excellent job of residue management.

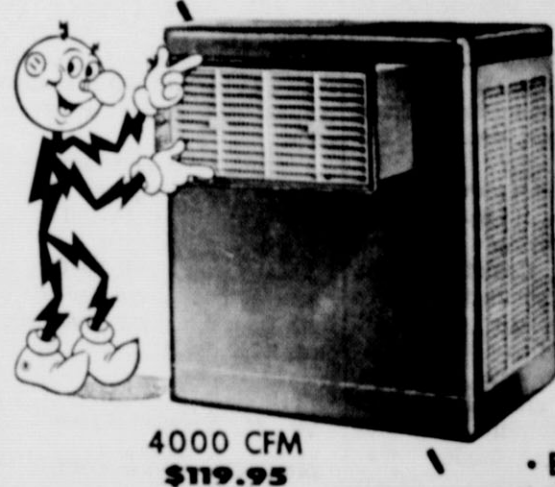

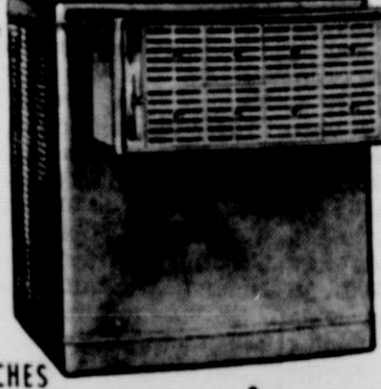

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

CROP DEMONSTRATIONS
Testing of new varieties continues in Motley County, with five variety demonstrations planted the current year. Gordie Washington, Flomot has planted a test consisting of 12 varieties, of which 10 lbs. of seed of each variety was furnished by the Dorman Seed Co., Lubbock, RS 610, 608, E-56a, C-44a, 7078, Martin, 435-S, 465-S, 515-S, 535-S, 625-S, and 665-S. Tests furnished by the DeKalb company were as follows: Grain sorghums, planted by Mutt Berryman, Matador and Allan Thomas, Northfield, C-44a, X-49, D-50a, E-62a, F-62a, and F-63. Forage sorghums, planted by Ray Webb, Matador, and James Ray Smith, Roaring Springs, FS-1, FS-22a, and SX-11. The public is encouraged to watch the tests, as it is the belief of the Extension Program Building Committee that it is better to try new varieties on a small scale to see if they are adapted to the area rather than buy a variety that is not meant for this area.

Cattle Disease Control Studied

Decision as to whether Motley County is designated a Brucellosis (Bang's disease) control area is up to Motley County cattle owners. A bill recently passed by the Texas Legislature provides that when 75% of the cattle owners as reflected by current tax rolls who own at least 51% of the cat-

tle on said tax roll petition the Livestock Sanitary Commission for the county to be designated as a brucellosis control area, a proclamation to that effect shall be issued, and a hearing held 90 days after issue.

Two types of control areas may be established. These are Plan I, which provides for all female calves between four and 12 months of age to be vaccinated, with cost paid the owner, and Plan II, which provides that all dairy cattle shall be blood tested, all purebred cattle shall be tested, and not less than 20% of the range and semi-range cows over three years of age in each herd shall be tested if the number of reactors does not exceed 1% of the area cattle population over six months of age; except steers and spayed heifers, and 5% of the herds. The first plan is designed for areas where there is a high degree of infestation of brucellosis. Testing is to be done by an authorized representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission, at no expense to the owner other than providing help to properly restrain and handle cattle under test. Petitions are being circulated by Motley County ranchers, and for those wanting to study the law as written, a copy is posted on the bulletin board in the courthouse, giving all details on the problem ranchers are facing, how the test will work, animals

to be tested, disposition of reactors, movement of cattle, and plans for re-testing for recertification after a three year period.
