## Friends Erect Monument at Grave of "Pitchfork Kid" in Amarillo Cemetery

Friends remembered "Pitchfork Kid" and have erected the above marker at his grave in Amarillo Llano Cemetery. The lonely cowboy who came to Texas as a homeless waif from the streets of Kansas City when he was a boy, never wanted for friends during his lifetime.

He was William E. Partlow, who was killed in 1919 and buried in Amarillo. His grave was finally located by Fred Hale (of Amarillo) who worked with "The Kid" around the

The Tribune started a fund to purchase a marker for his grave. Old friends (and many who never knew him) sent contributions. The funds were turned over to Hale who purchased the above marker and had it placed at the grave. The inscription is as follows: "A Cowboy, Pitchfork Kid, William E. Partlow, 1874 (Pitchfork Brand) 1919, An Humble Man Who Achieved Greatness Through Humility and Loyalty To His Friends. Erected in 1959 by His Friends."







## Saga of County History Began at Old Teepee City

BY CLYDE WALTER Staff Writer)

A gnarled cottonwood stands mutely over the burial ground of Teepee City-Motley County's first community. The tree is alone now.

Children no longer laugh under its spacious shadow or climb excitedly among its lower branches its behemoth trunk no longer provides convenient support for the head and shoulders of the villagge loafer, made barreled whiskey and summer

THERE IS NO village now. But it was not always so.

had its limbs climbed high to be up to the dugout . . . mother tortured by the wind when the was alone there too. first wagons crossed Teepee Creek in the early 1870's and came to a halt nearby.

A hundred strong, the wagons had come from Dodge City in Kansas. They were bound south toward the Texas Panhandle.

When the wagon train moved on, 15 or so families remained behind on the banks of the creek. They were the first settlers in Motley County. They found shelter by burrowing into the banks of the creek. Across the top of the open excavation they laid branches and brush. Over the top went earth.

IN THE NORTH END of the shelter the builder erected a rock chimney. The finished product was a "dugout." Those who preferred life above ground, went to a little more trouble. Walls were constructed of china poles set 4 to 6 inches apart. The cracks were plastered with

Brush and dirt formed a roof. The result was a "picket house." Both the dugout and picket house were crude, but in a country without heavy timber for planking, the first homes were makeshifts.
