Matador Ranch Set For Manager Change

A BACHELOR, Jim Cross, in his early 30's, will become manager of the Matador Ranch here Monday, and master of the 20-room headquarters house, about a mile southwest of the Matador city limits. Cross, formerly associated with the Beaverhead Ranch near Dillon, Montana, has been here for six weeks in order to become familiar with the 115,000-acre Matador operation.

Seth Sager, who has been manager of the ranch since 1952 when it was purchased by Fred Koch of Wichita, Kansas, is retiring on account of his health. Mr. and Mrs. Sager will return to their home at Chillicothe, Mrs. Sager said this week that moving vans have been contracted and that they will leave Monday.

When Mr. Koch purchased the ranch headquarters and more than 100,000 acres of the choice Foothill area range, he also purchased the ranch name and brand. The area comprises three of the "corporations" formed after the great ranch empire of more than 400,000 acres was acquired by American interests about ten years ago. The corporations in the present Matador Ranch are the Rodatam (headquarters), the Wolf Creek and Teepee Creek.

Line Camps under present operation are Wolf Creek, Russellville, Larquey (Larkey), Roaring Springs and Dutchman.

Steeped in Tradition

Spacious ranch headquarters is frequently mistaken for a country club. The massive house was built about 40 years ago of native limestone by the Scotch syndicate. It was original heated by steam but in recent years the system has been changed to butane gas.

The house is a stone's throw from Ballard Springs where a buffalo hunter named Ballard in 1876 established his camp.

Lions Governor To Visit Flomot

DIST. GOVERNOR of 60 Lions club, Don Zimmerman of Hereford, will make the principal address next week at the Ladies Night meeting of the Flomot Lions club. The meeting will be held Thursday evening (Nov. 5) in the Flomot gymnasium. Zimmerman is governor of District 2 T-1.

The District Governor has been a Lion since 1946. He is in the hardware business in Hereford. He graduated from Pampa High School in 1929, and took a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1933. He was retired from the Army Reserve Corps in 1956 with the rank of Lt. Colonel.

In addition to holding all the offices in the Hereford Lions Club, Zimmerman has served as zone chairman in 1957 and as Deputy Dist. Governor in 1958. He is also active in community affairs, having served on the school board, city commission, as a deacon in the First Presbyterian Church, and in 1958 was awarded the coveted plaque as Hereford's "Man of the Year," a selection made annually by the combined civic clubs of Hereford.

Man Injured When Small Car "Flips"

A Floydada man, E. P. Green, about 40, was injured shortly after sundown Monday when his small foreign made automobile went out of control and turned over twice.

The accident occurred on a straight section of U. S. Highway 70 about 12 miles east of Matador, a short distance east of the "Cunningham Corner."

The injured man was brought to Stanley Hospital by Sheriff Jinks Wilson. Sheriff Wilson said he was driving east on Highway 70 when he met a motorist driving at high speed toward Matador. When the driver saw the officer's car he stopped and told him of the accident. Leaving his own car, the motorist accompanied Sheriff Wilson to the scene of the accident.

BANK INSTALLS NEW TELEPHONES

First State Bank here has gone "fancy" with the installation of new telephones. The phones are known as the IA1 Key System (with six stations).

The telephones serve as an intercom system for bank employees who may call any of the stations without calling a telephone operator. A telephone call may be made from any of the six stations.

Another feature of the system is the use of buzzers instead of telephone bells. The system is so versatile that a call may be made from one desk to another six feet away, or to the other side of the world.

Date, Quota Set For Chest Drive

A meeting of directors of the Matador Community Chest held Tuesday afternoon in the Commissioners Court room here set November 20 as the date and \$3,000 at the quota for the drive this year. Another meeting is scheduled before final announcement of drive plans is made.

Paducah Man has Three Counties In Farm Census

Laurel L. West of Paducah has been appointed as a crew leader for the 1959 census of agriculture, according to an announcement made by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office in Dallas.

West will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Motley, Cottle and Dickens Counties. Before assuming his post, West will go to Lubbock where he will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting cen-

vis takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing his training, West will return to his district where he will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

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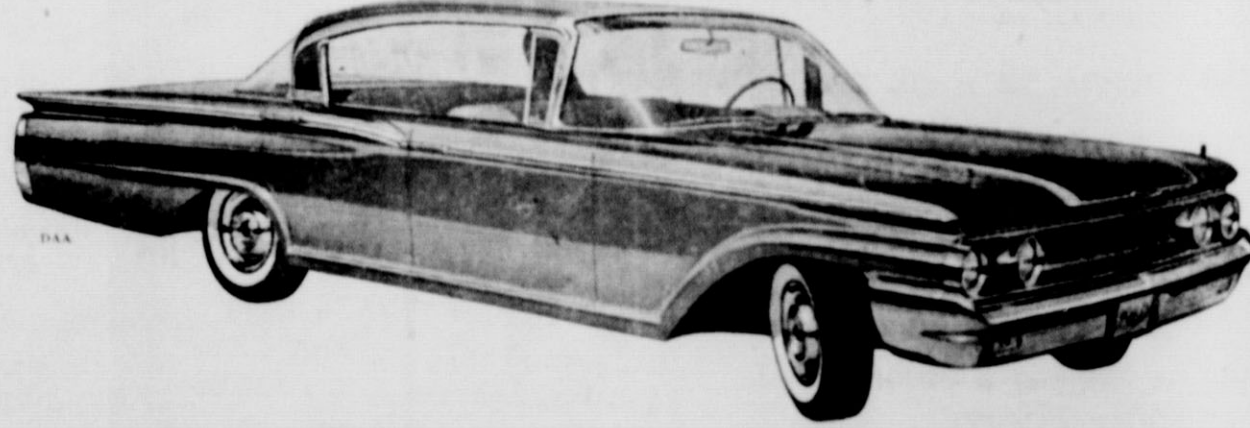
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Former Resident Claimed by Death
