Cotton Harvest is Showing Increase

Slight Relief Here In Picker Shortage

SOME RELIEF in the acute cotton-picker shortage here during the past week has been reflected in the county's total 52 ginning. County Agent Rufus Emmons said a survey yesterday showed a total of 717 bales ginned by the three communities. Matador ginned 255 bales, Roaring Springs 306 bales and Flomot 248 bales.

During the banner year of 1949 in which Motley county harvested a total of 33,000 bales, 1,449 bales had been harvested on Oct. 19. Matador had ginned 488 bales, Roaring Springs 386 and Flomot 375.

Death Claims U. L. Wilie

A man who came to Matador in 1915 to stay three days and remained 38 years, is dead. U. L. Wilie, prominent rancher and leading citizen died in Lubbock Memorial hospital about 1 a. m. Tuesday. He was 63.

Mr. Wilie had gone to the hospital about two weeks ago where he was treated for a blood deficiency. He received blood transfusions and his condition had so improved last week that he was released Thursday from the hospital.

Friday afternoon his condition suddenly changed and he was rushed back to the hospital in a study-Seale ambulance. Slight hope was held for his recovery over the week-end and he was placed in an oxygen tent a few hours before his death.

Uell L. Wilie was born May 14, 1889, at West, Texas. He came to Matador in September, 1915, as an auditor for Wm. Cameron Lumber company. He was married to Virginia Walton of Matador, April 24, 1916. A ceremony performed in Plainview.

Flomot Longhorns tonight will dedicate their new lighted field in a contest with the Grid Cardinals. The Longhorns will be in full uniform. Grid fans expect one of the top games of the season since the Cardinals are undefeated this season and have more reserve power than the Longhorns.

Defeating Dickens last week to the tune of 52-12, the Longhorns are also undefeated. The game will be called at 7:30. Admission will be 25c and 50c.

SCHEDULE GIVEN FOR FLOWER SHOW

Annual Flower Show, sponsored by Matador Garden club, will be held Saturday, Oct. 4, from 2 to 5 p. m. it was announced this week by officers of the organization.

The show will be held in the American Legion hall, and four types of arrangements will be considered for judging: Table, miniature, unusual and domestic.

The following rules of exhibitors have been released:

1. All materials used in exhibits must be grown in Motley county.
2. All entries for judging must be checked in by 11 a. m. Oct. 4. Any entry after this hour will be disqualified for judging.
3. Anyone living in Motley county is eligible to place an entry in this show.
4. Judges will disqualify any entry not conforming to schedule.
5. The standard system for judging will be used in this flower show.
6. Contestants may enter only one arrangement in each group for judging.

Everyone in this and adjoining communities is invited and urged to enter an arrangement in the show, as the club wishes to have as large an exhibit as possible. Suggestive entries include: Formal table, formal dinner, and special occasions, such as Christmas, Halloween, Thanksgiving, etc.; for group 2, (miniature) entries must not exceed 6 inches in height, including container. Any materials available, but garden group 3, cultivated flowers are suggested for group 4, (domestic) arrangements.

CAR DEMOLISHED, SLEEPY DRIVER ESCAPES UNHURT

Henry Floyd, 24, a Negro of Plainview, had a rude awakening about 2:30 Tuesday morning. He went to sleep while driving his 1946 Ford west on Highway 70 about a mile east of Matador.

The car left the road, uprooted a tree and landed with its wheels in the air against another tree. Floyd was awakened but suffered only a slight injury on his hand. He caught a ride with another motorist going west and it was several hours before officers could locate the owner of the car involved in the accident. Sheriff John Stotts said the car was almost completely demolished.

County Churches Collecting Calves For Orphans' Home

The Whiteflat, Flomot and Matador Methodist churches are collecting calves for the Methodist Orphans' home at Waco again this year, pastors of these churches have announced.

Anyone desiring to give any kind of cattle (calf or older) for the purpose of helping to provide food or other benefits for these more than 400 boys and girls, is requested to contact John Russell, Duke Lipscomb or Rev. Marvin Brotherton who will collect the animals for the Matador church and Rev. Luther Baker at Whiteflat, for donations from Whiteflat and Flomot churches.

"When we provide food and care for an orphan child that has no other means of support, we are helping to see Christianity applied, to save a life and build a noble character," Rev. Brotherton stated.

Span Across Red River To Link Major Highways

Dedication ceremonies Friday marked the opening of a new bridge which forges a link in two trans-continental highwayways. The \$193,000 concrete and steel span over Prairie Dog Town Fork of Red River is located 25 miles south of Clarendon on Highways 70 and 256. It replaces an old bridge washed out more than a year ago.

Highway 70 (which passes thru Matador) is a Canada-to-Mexico route and Highway 256 extends from Buffalo, N. Y. to the West Coast.

The bridge is located about 15 miles north of Turkey and when the project is finally completed, it will shorten the route from this area to Amarillo, Pampa and the North Panhandle.

Two Matador Delegates Albert Rattan and J. W. Cook represented Matador at the dedication ceremonies attended by over 250 persons representing 10 Panhandle cities. Clifford Farmer, manager of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies. Delegates were present from Perryton, Pampa, Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis, Silvertown, Turkey, Quitaque, Flomot and Matador.

In an address County Judge J. O. Goodpasture of Memphis reviewed the 30-year campaign by the Southeastern Panhandle civic groups which has resulted in construction of the bridge. He cited cooperative effort between citizens of Motley, Hall, Briscoe and Donley counties.

Special recognition was given W. S. Whaley of Ft. Worth, former manager of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, who did important preparatory work on the bridge-building project.

TIME LIMITED TO APPLY FOR AID IN FARM PRACTICES

Soil and water conservation practices planned for 1953 must be filed before Nov. 15, it was announced here this week by Walter Ray, PMA administrative officer.

Community committees are now in the process of making a survey of the county to determine the amount of assistance farmers will require and the deadline to file application is Nov. 15.

Tenants who desire to file applications must reach an agreement with their landlords and arrangements should be completed before requests are filed, Mr. Ray declared.

Aid is offered in deep plowing, sub-soiling, standard terracing, spreading and diversion terracing, earthen dams, water wells for livestock, summer legumes, mesquite eradication (mechanical and spraying), and seeding grass for permanent pasture.

The 1953 program is based on recommendations through the county's 15 community committees, who will work with farmers to achieve the maximum of benefit from their water and soil conservation practices.

The young Negro, who said he was born in Denver, Colo., was sentenced Nov. 16, 1950, from McLennan county for theft of over \$50. 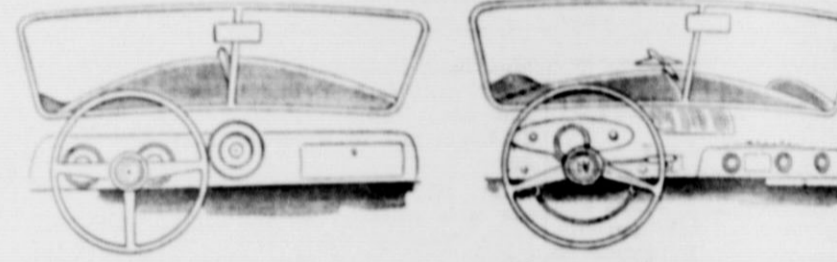

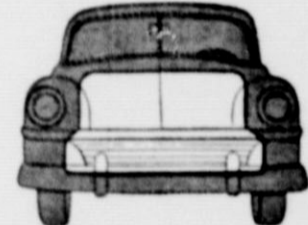

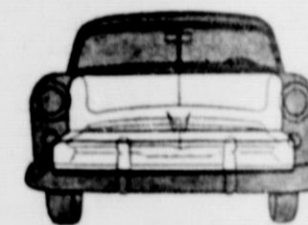
