## Commissioners Adopt Tax Rate

Motley County Commissioners met Monday, September 12 for regular session. Judge Laverna Price gave the invocation.

All minutes, bills, reports were read and approved by the Court. The J.P. Precinct 1 Place 1 collected \$2,360 with Place 2, none.

After a lengthy discussion over the different health insurance companies the Court elected to keep Time Insurance.

Mia Latham R.N. and Janie Williams R.N. of the Texas Department of Health were present to report on their services to Motley County and to answer any questions.

Latham stated they come three Wednesdays a month and do preventative medicine only. They work with the local Clinic. Part of their functions are immunizations, pap smears, screens and prenatal care. Flu shots are also one of the services, with Medicare and Senior Citizen patients getting their flu shots free. They charge on a sliding scale so most of their work is done for little or no cost.

Latham and Williams thanked the County for allowing them the space in the Courthouse.

Commissioner Russell asked the ladies if they would mind sharing their space with MHRM for counseling. They said they will be glad to share.

James Gillespie, District Conservationist of the SCS, informed the Court that the SCS could now help the County by providing technical assistance for any waterway problems.

Only one bid was received on the Courthouse building and contents insurance from Long Insurance of Roaring Springs. This bid was accepted.

The Judge, Clerk, and Sheriff explained the Texas Sheriff and Constable fees are comparable with other counties except the Writ of Execution needs to be raised.

The Court passed this.

Judge Price and Jim Meador, Sheriff/Tax Collector/Assessor, explained to the Court that by State law the Sheriff and the Tax Collector/Assessor jobs had to be separated in order to be legal. By law the Tax Assessor/Collector has to be certified. At this time Motley county is one of four counties left in the state that hasn't changed this. Elaine Hart is the Deputy Collector/Assessor and is certified.

The Judge stated that this has to be put on a ballot of a local election and be voted on by the public in the next local election.

After the election next year the Court will appoint a person to fill this position until the end of this term (1996), then the public will elect the Tax Collector/Assessor.

After lengthy study and discussion the court approved the proposed budget for the 1995 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994 and continuing through September 30, 1995.

Court adopted the tax rate of .79/100, same as last year.

Meeting adjourned.

## Matador City Council Meets

The Matador City Council met Thursday, September 8 for a lengthy agenda.

Jim Whitefield, representative for Cap Rock Telephone of Spur, informed the Council of the progress of Cap Rock/GTE sale transaction. Whitefield said they were hoping for a closing in March of 1995. They are already doing the engineering work for the upgrading of equipment to be installed as soon as possible after the closing. Part of the upgrading will be by adding speed dialing, call forwarding, call waiting and 3 way calls, etc. Also it will open up the choice of over 50 different long distance services to choose from.

Garland Cartwright, Road Maintenance Supervisor III in Motley County, came to ask the City to approve the installation of two handicap ramps on Spur 196. Cartwright showed a map of the placement of the ramps, one on the south side of the First State Bank and one on the North side of the old bank building. Cartwright stated it is required that each

block have access for the handicapped, the block with the City Hall has access at the post office. The Council passed this request.

City approved to keep the Health Insurance with TML.

Audit was approved.

The resignation of Gerald Pipkin from the Matador Water District Board and accepted and Councilman Don Warren was appointed to replace Pipkin.

Council discussed resetting payment of HUD for raised water rates until January when the new budget will be in set with the added water rates.

Council accepted a request for oil lease and nine month option for seismic on the City waterwell land.

Council made changes on city lot platte to square up lots on White Street in the Campbell edition, with landowner Lewis Bostick paying \$25 plus closing cost for adding one tenth of an acre to his property.

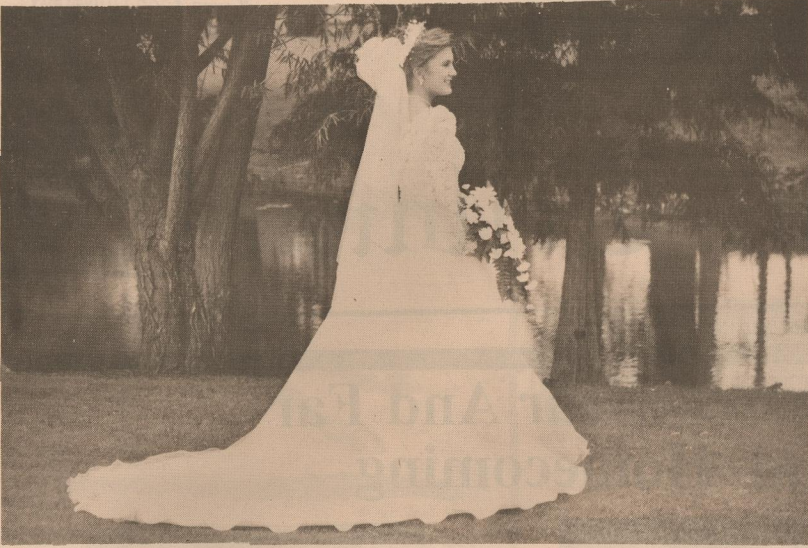

"I wish I had 10 more of James. He is so good with customers and the staff. He is a very caring, warm individual who takes the time to talk to people. He's been

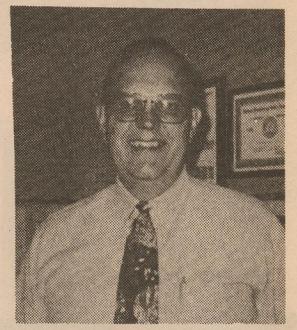
a great asset to the store ever since his arrival here last year, he's brought us a lot of business," stated Daniel Voss, manager at L&H #1. Daniel stated that James'

### Matadors Will Travel To Smyer This Week Suffer Upsetting Homecoming Loss To Groom

The Groom Tigers overcame a halftime deficit and spoiled the Motley County homecoming last Friday by defeating the Matadors 26-16.

The first quarter went back and forth with Motley County mounting the first serious scoring threat of the night. The Matadors drove to the Tiger 8 yard line before turning the ball over on downs. Groom took the ball on a 92 yard drive with Bart Britten carrying the final yard for the first touchdown of the game. Conway Clary blocked the extra point kick and the first quarter ended 6-0.

The Motley County offense took control in the second quarter scoring twice and tacking on both 2 point conversions. The first T.D. came on a bit of razzle dazzle by the Matadors. Facing a 4th down and 13 from the Groom 26 yard line, quarterback Brad Thacker threw a lateral pass to Jarrod Brooks. As the Groom defenders came in to make the tackle, Brooks threw to a wide open Kevin Keltz for the score. Brooks ran in the 2 point conversion to give the Matadors an 8-6 lead.

Two possessions later, the Matadors faced a 3rd down and 17 situation from their own 40 yard line. Quarterback Brooks dropped back to pass, but finding no receivers open, he set sail on a 60 yard touchdown run. Brandon Blanch's P.A.T. run made the score 16-6 late in the half.

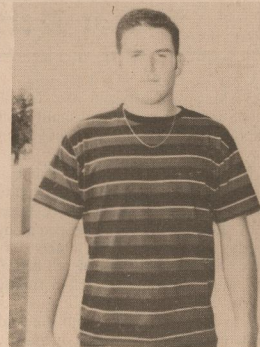

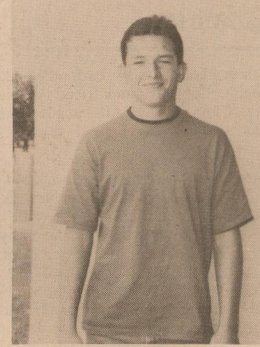

## Chillicothe Field Day to offer 3 CEU's on September 22nd

Motley County producers are invited to the annual Crops Field Day at the Chillicothe Research Farm on Thursday, September 22nd. The event, which is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will start at 8:30 a.m. and conclude around 2:30 p.m. with lunch being served. A total of three (3) CEU's will be available for recertification of private applicators license.

Field day visitors will ride trailers to four research stops. At one, Dr. Jeff Slosser with the Experiment Station and Emory Boring with the Extension Service will report on cotton aphid studies and discuss latest steps in insect management.

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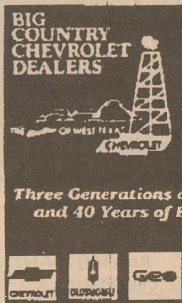
