## EARLY MATADOR RANCH HAND DIES IN NEW MEXICO

W. C. Fullingim, 88, of Tucumcari, N. M., a brother-in-law of J. T. McLain of Floydada, died Sept. 7, there.

A native Texan, born in Titus county on Feb. 29, 1864, Edward Coke Fullingim came to West Texas about 1883 and worked on the Matador ranch until April of 1890, when he was married to Miss Della McLain at old Della Plains. The couple made their home in Harmony and Sand Hill communities until 1906 when they moved to Terry county, thence to Plainview and lived there after a year until 1923. Near Vista and Albuquerque, N. M., were their homes successively until 1947, when they moved to Tucumcari. Mr. Fullingim had been ill for many months.

Mr. Fullingim was converted in the old Sand Hill school house in 1903. He joined the Nazarene church in 1909, and was a member of this church at the time of his death—Floyd County Hesperian.

## NEW INSTRUMENTS ARE INSTALLED BY STANLEY HOSPITAL

Three new instruments have been installed this week by Stanley Hospital-Clinic to further advancement of the institution's constantly expanding services.

One of the new instruments is the "Metabolizer," which is one of the most modern devices for making metabolism tests and registering the results on paper. The instrument is portable and can be taken to a patient's bedside.

The "Cardi-All" is another new portable instrument which makes an electro cardiographic tracing of the heart's action on a recording tape. Tests are made from various parts of the body and provides a modern method of examining the heart. Tests are painless and require but a brief period of time.

The third instrument installed this week is a new Bausch & Lomb microscope which is of the latest design and replaces the microscope formerly in use by the hospital.

# Labor Shortage Stymies Farmers

## BIG FIRST BALE TURNED OUT BY NEW FLOMOT GIN

First bale turned out by Goodwin-Crowell gin's new Hardwick-Etter plant in Flomot, was a "whopper." Ralph Stapleton, prominent pioneer farmer brought 2,030 pounds of cotton to the plant. The bale weighed 610 pounds.

A premium price of 40c per pound was paid for the cotton. The 900 pounds of cottonseed valued at current prices, further augmented the first bale revenue.

The new gin, under the management of Odie Crowell, has processed 18 bales this season. Pullers are arriving slowly.

Mr. Crowell declared, "despite the three weeks advanced maturity of our crop."

Mr. Crowell, former football star and later college athletic coach, resigned his place with the University of Arizona (Tucson), and returned to his native Flomot early this year to acquire partnership with Maurice Goodwin in the gin operation.

The gin was completely re-equipped with new Hardwick-Etter installation and placed in operation in time for the 1952 crop.

Drought conditions this summer have greatly reduced expected production from the rich Flomot farming area, but Mr. Crowell said a bid is being made to Plains irrigation farmers. Since the irrigated cotton on the Plains indicates an abundant crop, gins bordering the area (in the dry farming section) expect an "overflow" patronage, as experienced in recent years.

## Over 1,000 Pullers Needed To Relieve County's Situation

MORE cotton pullers are needed in every section of Motley county according to a survey completed yesterday by County Agent Rufus Emmons. Between 1,000 and 1,500 hands would be required to supply the need according to ginnings in various communities.

Mr. Emmons said that cotton-pullers are coming in from East and Northeast Texas but that they are absorbed rapidly by the demand. It is probable that 1,500 bales of cotton are now open in Motley county fields, estimates revealed.

At noon yesterday a total of 290 bales had been ginned from the 1952 crop in the county's seven gin plants, as compared with 301 on the same date last year. Roaring Springs is leading with 142 bales, Matador 80 and Flomot 68. Last year on this date Matador had ginned 123 bales, Roaring Springs 119 and Flomot 59. Mr. Emmons said the county has between 70 and 75,000 acres in cotton this year.

## Rain Capricious

Capricious rainfall over the past 25 years, averaging 21.70 inches, has greatly affected the rewards of cotton-growers, according to some figures Mr. Emmons has compiled.

For instance, in 1927, between January and October 1st, 10.59 inches of rain fell. By December 31 it had increased to a total of 11.65 inches. In 1931, between January and October 1st, only 9.05 inches had fallen. In the next 90 days 5.69 inches more were recorded.

The year 1948 was considered a "good year" with a total cotton production of 12,094 bales. The total rainfall was only 13.02 inches.

## World Traveler, Mrs. U. L. Willie, Speaks

"Poverty and hunger are everywhere. Disease, starvation and suffering. Hong-Kong is the most pitiful city in the world."

The speaker returned last month from the Orient.

Mrs. U. L. Willie, Motley county's private ambassador of goodwill, who has logged more than 200,000 miles of air travel and visited almost every land free country in the Japan in a of her recent trip to Japan in an address made here Tuesday evening.

She was principal speaker at a meeting of the Baptist Missionary Society, held in the Baptist church auditorium, of which the public was invited.

Mrs. Willie is a member of the Texas Good Neighbor delegation, which, through the auspices of the Federated Women's Club, has unfurled the Texas flag in most countries of the world.

"Japan is fighting communism with all her strength," Mrs. Willie declared, "and our recent enemy was not ready to ratify the Japan treaty, the Japanese people are making rapid strides in accepting democracy, they are thrifty, energetic, hearty and constructive. They are making a living with that which we have discarded and they imitate us at every opportunity. We must realize that the examples we set will largely be followed by the people of Japan."

"In my travels," Mrs. Willie said, "I have found there is no superior race, but superior individuals in every race."

Japan there is much evidence that Christianity is being accepted. The people no longer worship the emperor. The United Church plan is working

splendidly and conducting services twice daily, alternately by preachers of different denominations. I heard the Japanese Minister of Foreign Affairs quote the 23rd Psalm from memory."

Atomic Bomb Humane Although frightful in its destruction of life and property, the atomic bomb was perhaps one of the most humane acts of the war, Mrs. Willie declared. The Japanese people had fortified the island empire so thoroughly that many thousands of Americans fighting men would have died, had not the two bomb explosions brought about a quicker peace.

One of the problems which concerned Mrs. Willie was that of war-babies born to Japanese women, the love children of American soldiers. They are healthy, and there are thousands of them, she said. Immigration laws prohibit either the children or their mothers from coming to the United States.

Mrs. Willie visited Manila, where the people almost kill where you with kindness, and where you found Federated Women's clubs had been active for 40 years. She also visited the ghostly ruins of Corregidor, she stopped at Wake, Guam, Okinawa and was swept away by the beauty of the Hawaiian Islands. 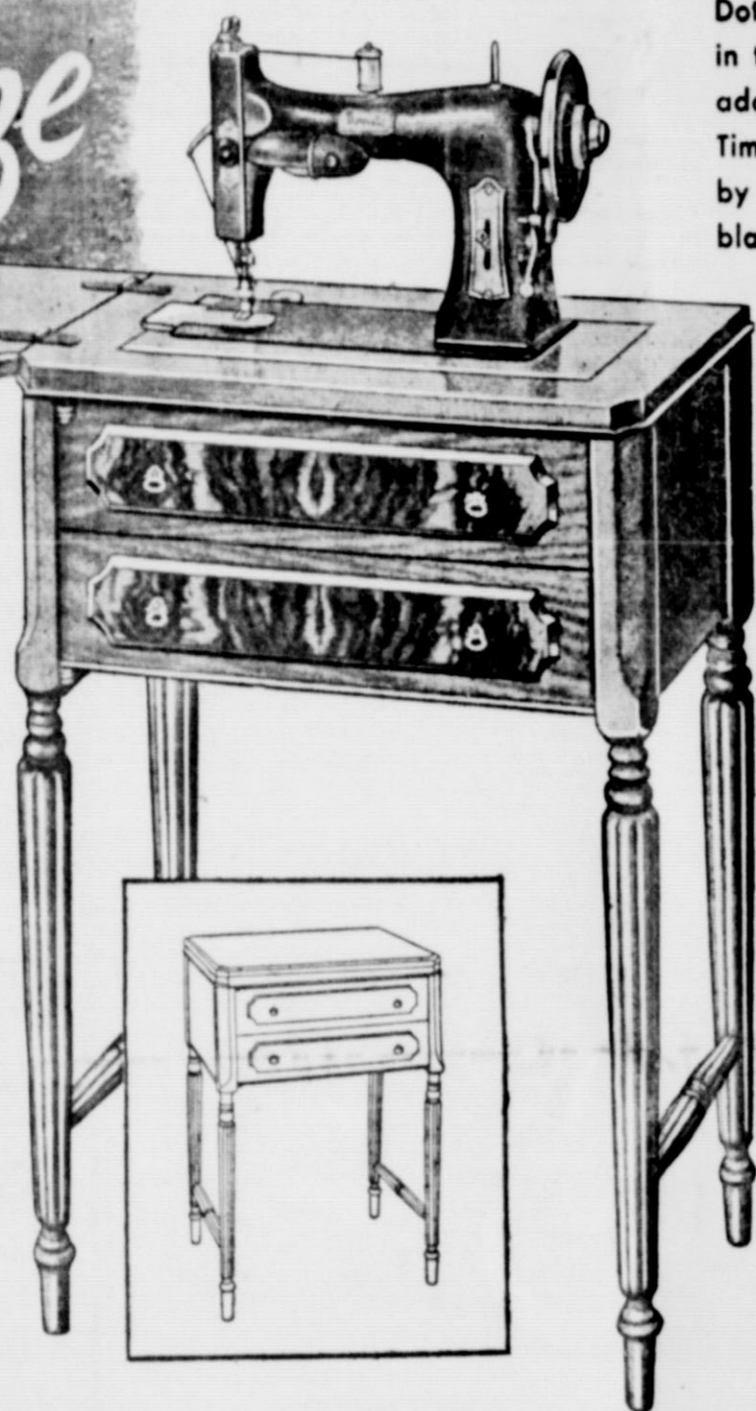

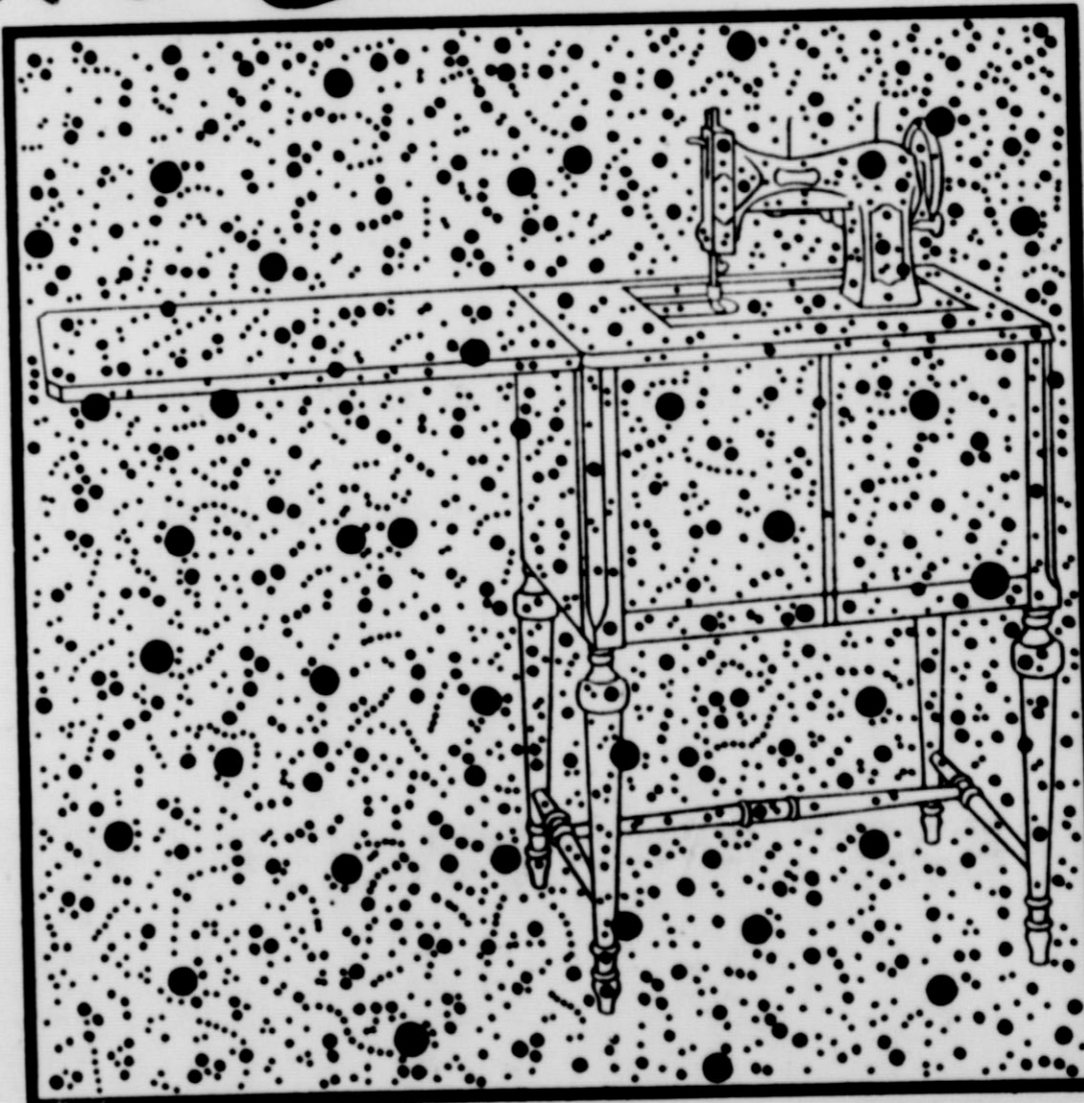

9. In his association with other children be on guard that your child does not become a "bully" over other children, nor one who can be led about by the nose by others.

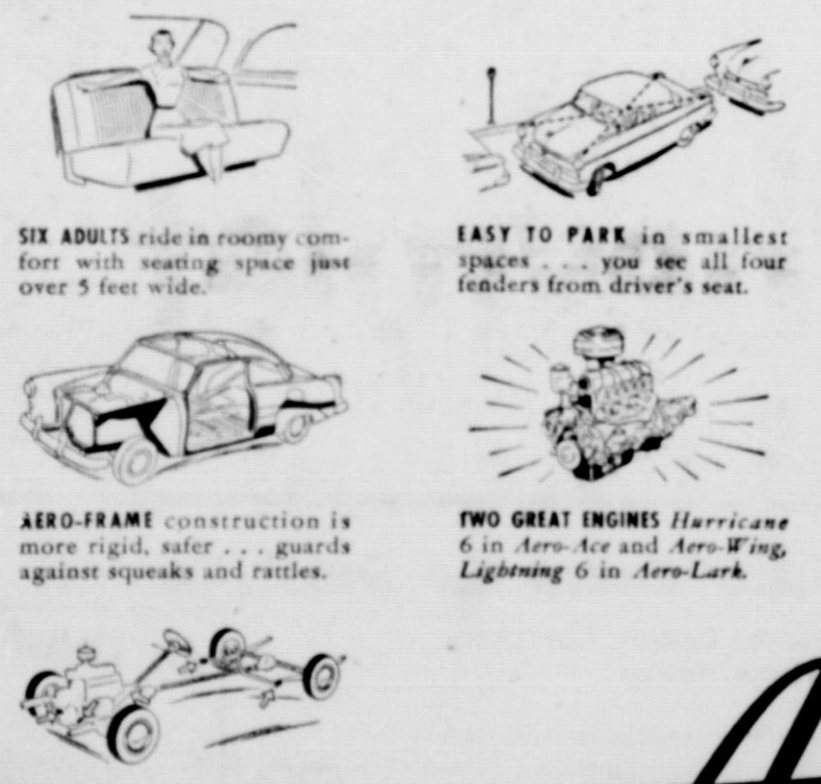

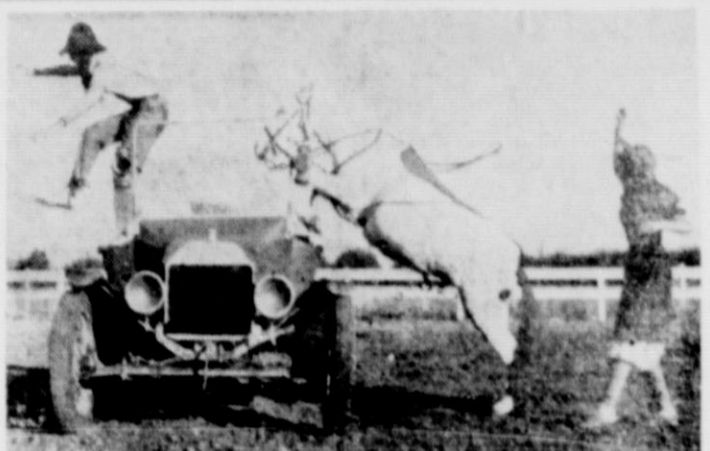
