benefits of 55% of the first \$100 of the wage earner's average monthly wage and 15% on all over that up to the maximum of \$300. A wage earner with an average monthly wage of \$160 after 1950 would be entitled to 55% of the first \$100, or \$55, and 15% of the remaining \$60, or \$9, making a total monthly benefit of \$64. His wife, if she is 65, would also be entitled to one-half of this amount.

### Representative Of Social Security Coming To Matador

The new benefit formula that is now used to figure social security payments will mean higher old-age and survivors insurance benefits to many wage earners who are filing claims. John G. Hutton, manager of the social security field office said today.

The social security amendments of 1950 provided that wage earners who are now 65 or over, and who retire after they have worked for at least a year and a half after 1950 in a job covered by social security, can take advantage of this new formula. Mr. Hutton pointed out. Benefits are based on the average monthly wage that the worker earned during this time. The new formula provides for

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## Farm Bureau Saves Vast Sum To Build More Rural Roads

Working in cooperation with other groups, including County Judge and Commissioners Association and Rural Letter Carriers, the Texas Farm Bureau Federation "saved" millions of dollars for rural road building purposes in Texas for the years 1951 and 1953. The farm group made a vigilant and active fight while the State legislature was in session according to John Hunter of Roaring Springs, president of Motley county Farm Bureau.

Legislation was introduced, Mr. Hunter declared, that would have taken from the counties every penny of road bond assumption money, which is expended by the commissioners courts in the counties and would have discontinued the appropriations provided under the Colson-Briscoe Act, which is used by the State Highway Department to build farm-to-market roads. The movement led by the Farm Bureau specifically saved \$7,300,000 in road bond assumption money for the State of Texas each year, and \$15,000,000 Colson-Briscoe funds.

County Gains About \$30,000. Let's see what this means to Motley county, the farm leader said. "We will get \$14,625.04 road bond assumption money in 1952 and again in 1953. We will get 3 miles of farm-to-market roads each of these years, built with Colson-Briscoe funds. Conservatively speaking it costs about \$10,000 a mile to build these farm-to-market roads, and this will mean about \$29,835.08 a year that this county will receive from this source.

"If these groups had not fought the battle that saved this road money, it would have been necessary to raise taxes in Motley county to build the roads, if

we had any roads built," Mr. Hunter declared. Certain groups have an eye on this road money and another fight will be waged in the next legislature if this money is retained for rural roads, Mr. Hunter predicted.

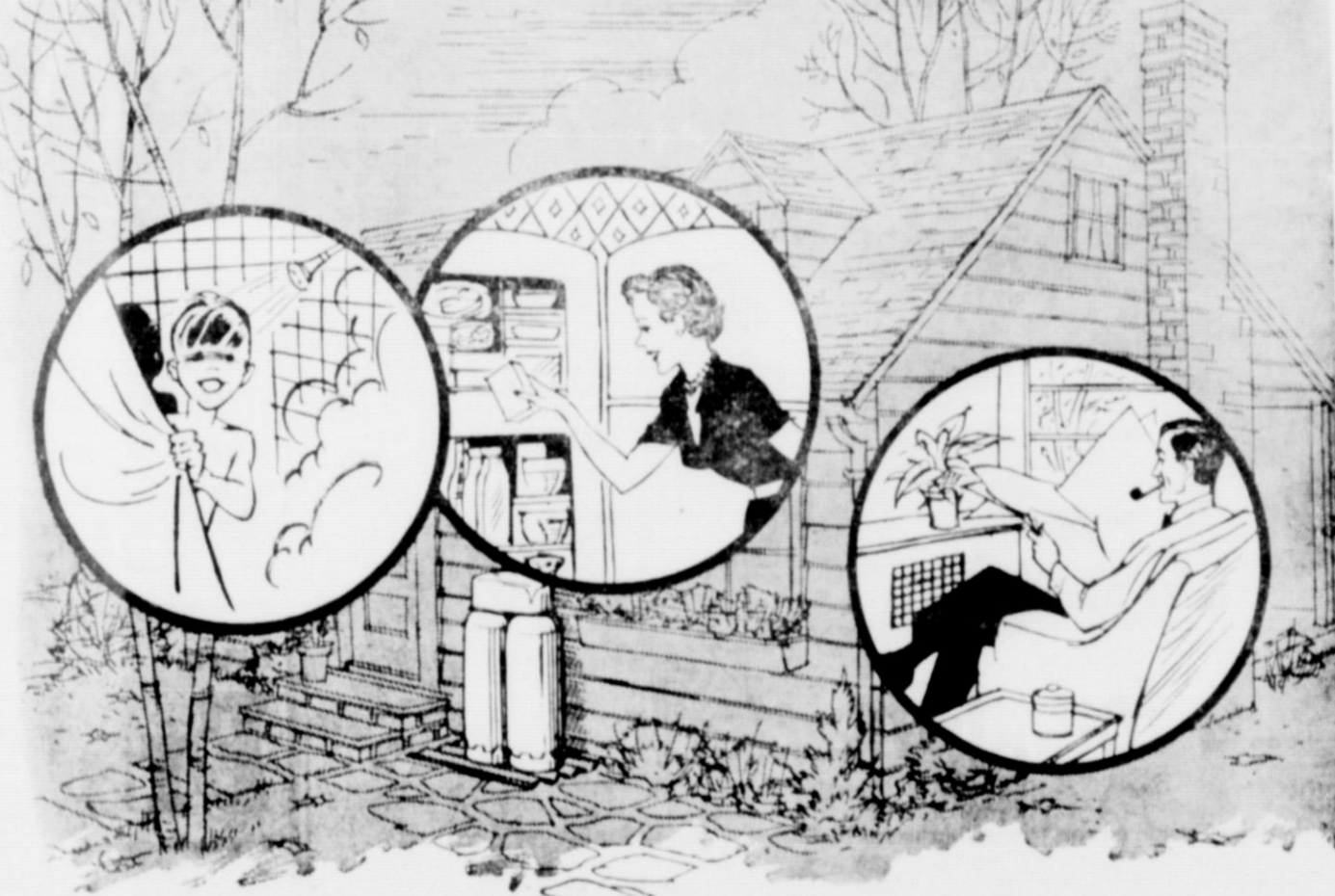

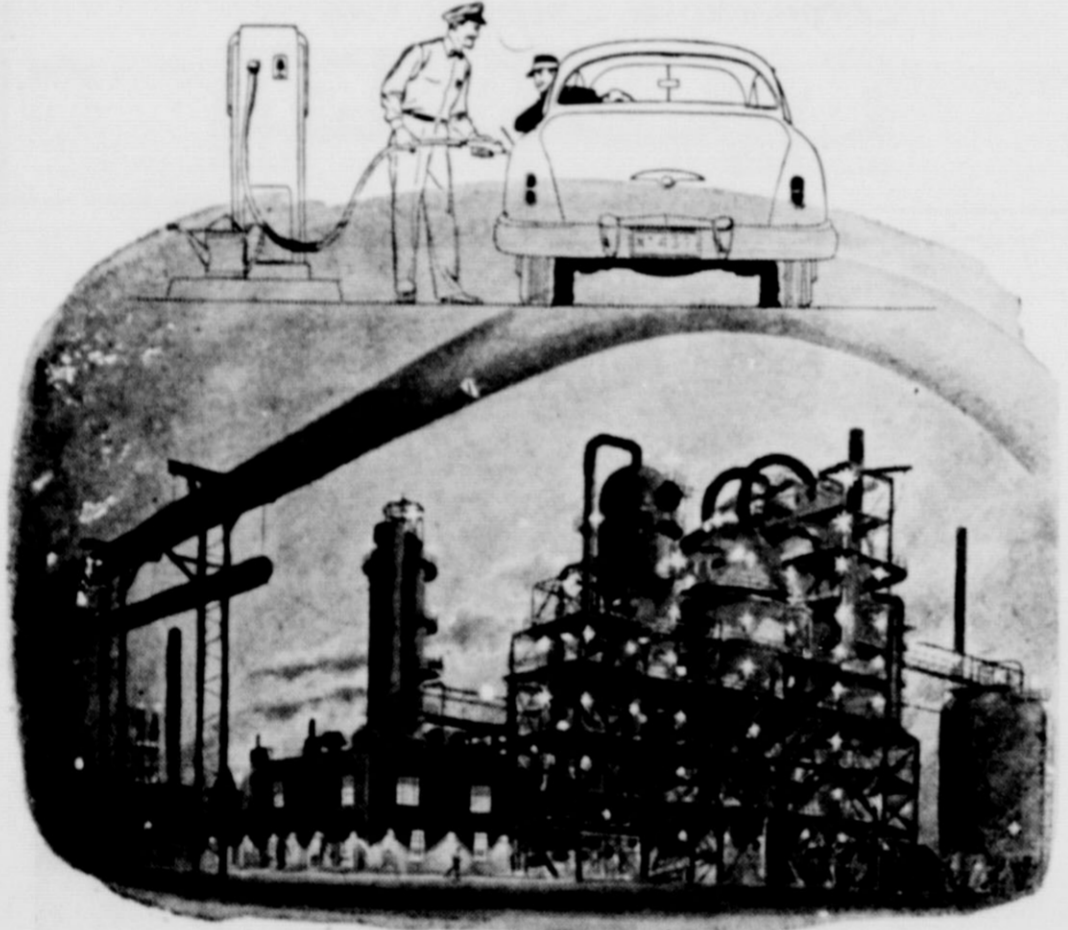
