W. Weatherall was employed by the school board to serve as a teacher and Superintendent Grissom's classes divided in an arrangement to last until the expiration of the present school term. A disagreement arising from the amount of cash the school board is able to pay is declared to be the cause of Mr. Grissom's resignation.

FLAMING TRUCK RACES SEVEN MILES HIGHWAY TO GET AID OF WATER

RAGING SANDSTORM INCREASES PERIL IN DASH FOR SAFETY

Discovering the trailer of their large cattle transporting truck in flames and being fanned by a terrific sand storm last week while seven miles west of Matador on Highway 28, W. E. Winstead and Jess Baker, quickly found all efforts to halt the fire futile and decided to drive to Matador where the assistance of water might be obtained. Driving into a filling station the fire was quickly extinguished resulting in no more damage than loss of the floor in the trailer bed. The fire was believed to have originated at the Harry Campbell Ranch, from which they were returning, when a lighted pipe was placed on the edge of the trailer, possibly igniting inflammable material on the truck floor.

ANNOUNCEMENT RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Roaring Springs, Texas, the examination to be held at Floydada, the receipt of applications to close on April 28, 1933. The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to the applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above. This rural route is 18.4 miles in length and pays \$1440 per annum.

CENSUS SHOW 300 OUTSIDE CARS CROSS COUNTRY EACH DAY

OVER \$100,000 SPENT ANNUALLY BY ESTIMATE

Traffic Divided Evenly On Two Major State Highways

Austin, Texas, April 20—Motley county's state highways bring \$108,000 a year in extra business to the county in the form of tourist trade, the Texas Good Roads Association has estimated from a survey of the state's last official traffic census.

This business, the survey points out, does not include "natural" trade from local cars or those of adjoining counties, which obviously would increase with improved roads.

State checkers from four days' actual count, found the average daily traffic to be: 300 motor vehicles on Highway 28; and 300 on Highway 18.

Motor traffic in Texas is divided, the experts have found, in two almost equal classes. Roughly, half are local cars or from adjoining counties. The other half are from beyond the state, or from Texas points at least two counties distant. The latter are genuine tourists.

On this basis, some 300 outside cars cross Motley county each day," the Association's survey said, "scattering their good American dollars among the restaurants, hotels, tourist camps, hot dog stands, garages, filling stations and stores along the important highways.

"If they spend as little as \$1 per vehicle within the borders of the county, then Motley county's trunk roads mean \$9,000 a month in added business, or \$108,000 a year, exclusive of their convenience and saving to her own 7,000 people, who operate some 1,000 cars themselves."

The survey conducted by the Association for every county in Texas, was designed to show importance of roads to each community, and thus arouse public opinion against any further diversion of gas tax money, which would cripple the highway program.

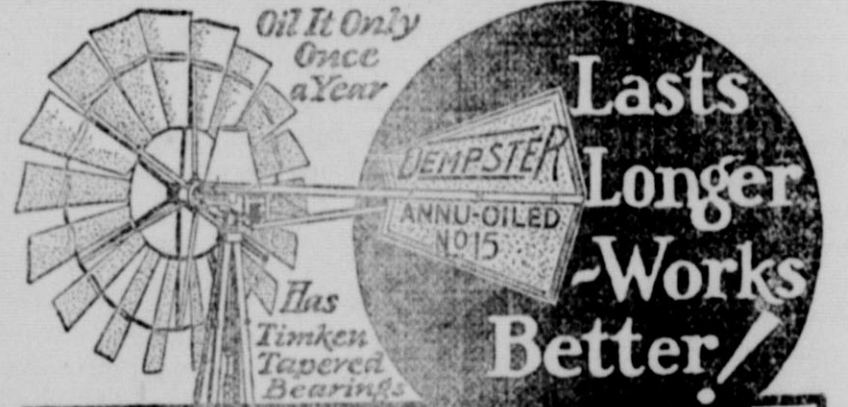

 What made it particularly hard to bear were the after shakes of which we have had, perhaps, 155. We would just get comfortably seated when everyone would jump up and run for the street. The next night they came almost regularly every fifteen minutes by the look. After three days of that everybody was very much on edge sleeping was a very difficult thing to do. That second night we

slept with our clothes on, the lamp burning and the door open. There seems to be something instinctive in the fear of earthquakes. Dogs, cats and small children were just as frightened as the grownups, and the men were as bad and in many cases, I personally observed, worse than the women. I know two men who ran away from their wives. One of these men laughingly said, "I thought it was every man for himself."

It was sometime before we got anything to eat. As I said we did not get to eat our dinner (tomato soup was splashed on the walls, floors and even ceiling in our kitchen). The next day we came home, got possession of an electric plate (we still haven't any gas) prepared a lunch and were just sitting down when the police came around and ordered everybody out of the house stating another big quake and tidal wave was coming. We returned to town about dark and I prepared another quick meal and said we were going to eat, earthquake, tidal wave, cyclone notwithstanding and we did alto we made several wild dashes for the door in the interim.

The banks had been closed for over a week and we had only \$6 among us. We got by all right, however, without joining the soup line. I guess everybody was taken care of as tents, mattresses, clothes, food were piling in here an hour after the quake. For one solid week I heard no one mention the depression or ask "When are the banks going to open?" There is some balm in Gilead. There are worse things than financial depressions.

The first thing I thought of when the shake started was my house—

no insurance and no money for repairs. Thirty minutes afterwards I commandeered a car and drove out there and imagine my relief to find no damage except a crack in the cement steps and dishes broken. That section which is built on sand dredged from the ocean withstood the shock with very little damage, the sand apparently acting as a cushion.

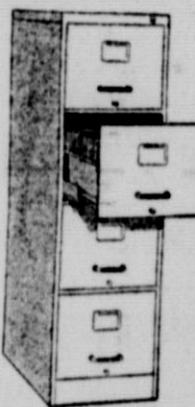

Although there are still some unadorned blocks in the forecourt soon they will all be similarly impressed by those whom Fate has raised to Cinematic eminence.
