### AFTON MAN SUCCUMBS FATAL HEART ATTACK SATURDAY AFTERNOON

CHARLES D. HOOKER IS STRICKEN AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Charles Hooker, well known farmer of the Afton community was stricken with a fatal heart attack Saturday afternoon. Death came almost immediately. Mr. Hooker had been suffering of a pneumonia attack for some two weeks but was believed to be out of danger.

Charles D. Hooker was born in Hill county, Texas, Jan. 10, 1889. He had spent the greater part of his life near Stephenville until moving to this country some seven years ago.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Maud Hooker, and five children, Neva, C. L., John Dennis and Charles D. of Afton, and Mrs. A. C. Vaughn of Roaring Springs, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Hooker of Stephenville, a sister, Mrs. Aline Burnett of Moran, Texas, a sister, Mrs. Henry Kennedy of Hico, a sister, Mrs. Williams also of Hico, and one brother, Rufus Hooker of Roswell, N. M.

### WEST TEXAS UTILITIES MANAGER HURT BY FALL AS POWER POLE BREAKS

FRACTURED VERTEBRA MAY REQUIRE THREE MONTHS FOR RECOVERY

John Owen, manager of the West Texas Utilities Co's. Matador office, suffered a fractured vertebra and was rendered unconscious Friday afternoon, when a 25-foot electric power pole on which he was working in the northern part of Matador, broke near the ground. Witnesses of the accident rushed the injured man to the Traweck Hospital, where, after a hasty examination, it was decided to move him to Plainview that the aid of an x-ray might be secured. X-ray pictures revealed a fractured vertebra which will necessitate 3 months time for recovery.

Mr. Owen is resting well and is believed out of any immediate danger.

### MANY SEE METEOR

Several people in this section witnessed the meteoric phenomenon, said to have been visible in five states early Friday morning. R. L. Benson, connected with Landers Store here, said, "I was suddenly aware of a light much like lightning, which lighted up my room. The light, however, did not pass for some three to five minutes. With exceptionally fair weather prevailing all roads leading into Roaring Springs were lined early Saturday morning with every conceivable means of transportation, including walking, as the crowd gathered to witness the county interscholastic track and field events held here. ### Heroic Life Saving Efforts Are Futile

### Funeral Services Held At Matador Methodist Church Monday Afternoon

The happy laughter of youngsters at play was chilled by the cold hand of tragedy and death late Sunday afternoon, when a horse ridden by Ray Moore, 11 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Moore of Matador, fell into a partly filled septic tank located on the Oscar Vinson place in northwest Matador, pinning the boy beneath the animal. Heroic efforts were to no avail in attempt to save the boy from drowning. Some 10 minutes are believed to elapsed before a rescue was finally effected. Rushed quickly to the Traweck Hospital, an examination disclosed that death had already visited the young body.

Ray Payton Moore was born in Matador, Nov. 23, 1921. Age 11 years, four months and three days.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church in Matador Monday afternoon conducted by Rev. Luker, and interment made in the East Mound Cemetery.

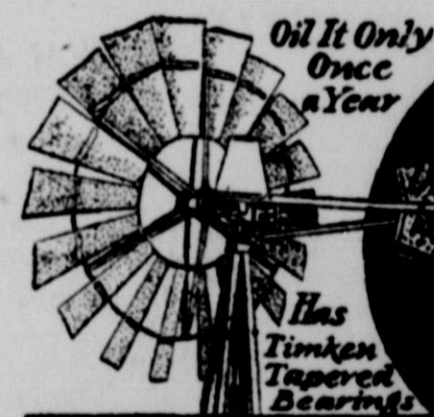

### Texas Wool Industry

By W. E. TALBOT

*Editor's Note.*—This is the tenth of a series of articles dealing with the possibilities of the wool industry in Texas. Colonel Edson, managing director of the Southwest Industrial Development Bureau, is an acknowledged authority on the subject of industrialization in Texas.

**STORY No. 10.**

In the manufacture of any product the thing that must be considered is the cost of distribution. Production costs can be comparable, but if the sales costs are excessive it is impossible to build up an industry. The question of price enters into the sale of any commodity, and the price, of course, consists of the cost of the raw material, labor costs and freight rates. We have shown that where the raw material is close to the manufacturing plant there is, of course, a saving in freight and where the finished product is distributed from some central location to spread out nationwide to a consuming public it is logical that their sales price would be less than to haul it to some far distant point in its raw state, then manufacture the finished product and bring it back to its point of origin.


Let us take, as an example, Dallas as a distributing point for the manufactured products of suits, overcoats and women's dresses, assuming that the finished product had been manufactured in Dallas. With the distinct advantage of freight rates alone, assuming that our production costs were in line, we would have an advantage over the New England market that would enable us to ship cheaper as far north as Wisconsin, as far east as Illinois, Kentucky and Tennessee and have a distinct advantage in all the Western States.

In these States where we have the distinct advantage due to less freight cost and based on consumption of woolen garments, we would have a potential sale of 15,569,000 garments per year. This does not take into consideration any markets to the south of us, but just the tributary territory where a lower price would command the business.

An industry of that size based on the number of employees and wages in New England would give employment to between 190,000 and 115,000 workers and a pay roll of around \$12,000,000 annually, which is within \$9,000,000 of the value of our total cotton crop last year. Of course, you realize and I realize that this would be the ultimate goal to be obtained, but there is nothing today to keep us from attempting to take a share of this volume of business that could be controlled under the favorable conditions that exist for us to manufacture these products.
