Johnson Pledges Support


Congressman Lyndon Johnson opened his campaign for the United States Senate in San Marcos Saturday night, May 3. He declared the first problem of the nation is to prepare to meet the crisis with which we are confronted. He pledged his continued cooperation with President Roosevelt in the defense program and made an urgent plea for unity. Outstanding features of the platform which he announced

were. 1. Definite legislation which would prevent further strikes in defense industries. national "Strikes must cease now", and a definite legislative program which would prevent further strikes in national defense industries must be adopted immediately.

2. A national old age pension law which would give to every person in Texas, over the age of sixty, the same pension as paid by other states.

3. Full parity payments to farmers. He declared that the farmer is the first real victim of the war and declared that parity payments are absolutely necessary in order to maintain a balanced standrd of living in face of rising prices during this national emergency.

4. Opposition to any federal contol of the Texas oil industry. Johnson said, "It is later than you think," and declared it imperative that the American people unite behind the leadership of President Roosevelt in these days of national crisis.

AUSTIN-No person under 14 years of age may legally drive any motor vehicle in Texas, it was pointed out by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., state police director.

In order for a person between the ages of 14 and 16 to obtain a license, he must secure a written recommendation from his county judge to the Department of Public Safety. No person under 16 may be licensed either as a commercial operator or chauffeur


