Rites Held Here For J. P. Truett

Masonic graveside rites were held here at 4 p.m. Tuesday, for John Peeler Truett, 74, who died at 12:40 p.m. Sunday in Lockney General Hospital after an illness of about a year. He had been a resident of Lockney for the past 25 years.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church, Lockney, with the pastor, the Rev. Gene Hawkins officiating. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery, Matador.

Mr. Truett was born October 15, 1892, in Dale County, Alabama, and came to this area with his parents and other family members, in 1908. They lived in the Flomot community for a number of years. He later went to Washington, where he engaged in the logging business.

He returned to Texas in 1939 and was married to Miss Julia Rebecca Fulkerson, at Matador on September 23 of that year. They made their home in Washington until 1942 when they bought a variety store in Lockney and continued to make that their home. They sold their business about a year ago, due to Mr. Truett's health.

He was a member of the Lockney Masonic Lodge, and the First Baptist Church.

Livestock Team Competes at A&M

The Matador Chapter Future Farmers of America Livestock Judging team composed of Larry Bostick, Joey Meador and Glen Moss, participated in the State Livestock Judging contest at A&M University, Saturday, May 6.

The top 96 teams in the state took part in the contest, which was won by Winters with a score of 1647. The Matador team scored 1587, out of a possible 1800, to place 15th in the contest.

Six classes of four animals were judged according to type. One class of gilts were placed according to type and production; one class of ten feeder calves were classified; and one class of slaughter animals were classified.

"Although the boys had hoped to win, I feel that this is a respectable showing for two juniors and a freshman. Had they scored 21 more points, they would have been in the top ten and would not have been eligible to compete again in the same contest—so we are looking for a better showing next year from these boys," comments Bill Moss, Matador FFA Advisor.

Roaring Springs Future Farmers of America grass judging contest team won Area and District honors at the Texas Tech Judging contest held April 29 in Lubbock.

The team, composed of Chester Dye, Kelly Hand and Johnny Thacker, won 1st in grass classification, 2nd in over-all grass judging, 1st in Area 1 grass judging and 1st in Plainview District grass judging.



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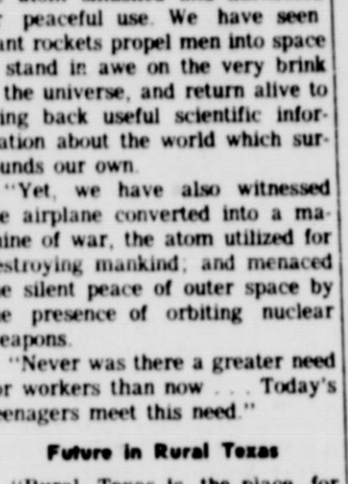

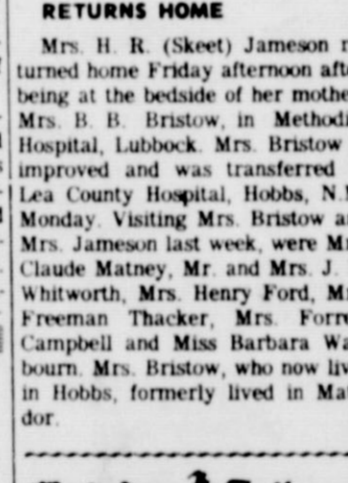
