

Young chickens should be fed from three to five times daily, depending and a dry or wet mash mixture. upon one's experience in feeding, say the poultry specialists of the United States department of agriculture. Undoubtedly chickens will grow faster when fed five times than when fed only three times daily, but it should be borne in mind that more harm can be done to the young chickens by overfeeding than underfeeding. Young chickens should be fed not more than barely enough to satisfy their appetites and to keep them exercising, except at the evening or last meal, when they should be given all they will eat Greater care must be exercised not to overfeed young chicks that are confined than those that have free range, as leg weakness is apt to result in those confined.

The young chicks may be fed any time after, they are 36 to 48 hours old, whether they are with a hen or in a prooder. The first feed may contain



> After the chicks are ten days old a good growing mash, composed of two parts by weight of bran, two parts middlings, one part cornmeal, one part low-grade wheat flour or red-dog middlings, and 10 per cent sifted beef scrap, may be placed in a hopper and left before them all the time. The mash may be fed either wet or dry; if wet, only enough moisture (either milk or water) should be added to make the feed crumbly, but in no sense sloppy. When this growing mash or mixture is not used, a hopper containing bran should be accessible to the chickens at all times.

> After the chickens are two months old they may be fed four times daily with good results. After they are three months old three feedings a day are







An outlook upon the world proves that man is not what he should be. Then, too, apart from gospel influence there is no sign of improvement. The only way of accounting for the discrepancy between what man is and what he should be is by the Fall. This is the way that the Bible accounts for it. The introduction of sin is the answer. I. The Temptation (Gen 3:1-6).

Man possessed a free will, in the exercise of which he turned away from God and his commandment. This was done at the instance of the devil working through the serpent. He did not appear as he really was, but in disguise. The method employed was (1) finding the woman while alone; (2) insinuating doubt into her mind as to God's word and love. At his suggestion she began to believe that God did not mean what he said, and that he was unkind in placing restrictions upon them. In this the devil slandered God, even accusing the Almighty of jealousy and fraud. (3) Appeal to innocent appetite. (4) She gazed upon the fruit which God had forbidden. Looking soon begat lust. (5) She lusted after that which God had forbidden. That which God has forbidden should not be looked at lest the flesh should lust for it.

2. The serpent was degraded and henceforth became a type of sin and Satan (v. 14; cf. Num. 21:9; John 3:14; Rev. 12:9). This doom was pronounced without trial. In the case of man it was not so.

3. The undying enmity between the two seeds (v. 15; cf. John 8:40-45; Matt. 23:33). The antagonism thus begun reached its climax in the crucifixion of Christ. Satan's seed has been ever since endeavoring to destroy the Lord's work and his workers.

4. The ultimate victory of the woman's seed (v. 15). Satan harassed the woman's seed; bruised his heel, but finally the stroke was made which crushed the serpent's head (John 12: 31; Heb. 2:14; 1 John 3:8). This was the first gleam of the glorious light of the gospel of Christ. The victory was marvelous, but the cost was infinite (Isa. 53; 2 Cor. 5:21).

5. Judgment upon the woman (v. 16). This relates to her as a wife and mother; also to her subordination to man. This is God's decree, and all efforts of freeing one's self from it are fightings against God.

IMPOSSIBLE TO TEST FEDERAL OWNERSHIP OF WIRES UNDER REPUBLICANS, HE SAYS.

Washington .- The burden of failure to prove the value of government ownership of the telephone and telegraph wires, and their operation as a part of the postal system, was placed at the door of the new congress, which is republican, in a satement issued by Postmaster General Burleson. The postmaster general reiterates his faith in the idea of government ownership of the wires, but says that it was an impossibility to give it a rational test under war conditions. Further, he declares that for some time it has been apparent that the new congress was not favorable to the plan, and only one course remained open, that being to return the properties to their owners as soon as appropriate legislation protecting the intérests and insuring proper service to the public is enacted,

The public has been no little confused by the statement of the postmaster general that conditions made it necessary to advance the rates for wire service, and the counter-statement of the former head of the Postal company that the increases were not necessary. Mr. Burleson claims that the advance in the price of everything ranging from 25 to 100 per cent. and an advance of the wages, made the increase for service imperative. Labor has accused the department of misrepresenting the extent of the wage advance, strikes have been threatened and called, and the public has bitterly complained about bad service. There can be no doubt, however, about the value of the postmaster general's position with reference to the increased cost of operation, both as to material and labor, but it remains to be shown whether any part of the increase has been due of itself to government control.

The statement is made at the department that the new policy would not affect the contemplated phone rate increases, which it has maintained were to meet the cost of government operation, due in a measure to the rentals which the government stipulated to pay the owners, and the conditions under which the rate increases were deemed necessary.





MAY DAY RIOTING AT CLEVELAND. OHIO

ONE MAN IS KILLED, ELEVEN PO-LICEMEN SHOT OR BEATEN AND MANY PERSONS HURT.

Cleveland, Ohio .- An unidentified man was killed by a detective's bullet, 11 policemen were shot or badly beaten and about 100 persons wounded, many seriously, in general rioting which brought a dramatic finale to a socialist May day demonstration here About 30 persons, seriously injured are in hospitals while scores of others including women, were trampled by rioters and clubbed by police.

Socialist headquarters was totally wrecked by angry civilians, bent on putting an end to the demonstration. The rioting was general in the puboughfares. Socialists and sympathizers at the public square were ridden down by mounted policemen and soldiers in army tanks and trucks aided in dispersing them.

Sixty of the rioters were arrested. A score were found to be armed, the police say.

Several hundred rioters threatened police headquarters when C. E. Ruth enberg, socialist candidate for mayor, was arrested and for more than an hour the entire downtown section of the city was a seething mass of socialist demonstrants, police, civilians and

Dozens of shots were fired in the public square, where more than 20,-090 socialists and sympathizers assembled for a May day rally and to proest against the conviction of Eugene V. Debs and Thomas J. Mooney.
