PIONEER AFTON CITI- ZEN PASSES AWAY

L. W. Stark, a pioneer citizen of the Afton community passed away Saturday afternoon. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church at Afton Sunday afternoon. Rev. C. W. Parmenter, assisted by Rev. H. T. Harris conducted the funeral rites. Interment was made in the Afton cemetery.

Mr. Stark was born in Van Buren county, Arkansas, March 24 1860. He came to Texas when 18 years of age and settled in Dallas county. In 1887 he was married to Miss Rosa Carberrie at Dallas and the same year moved to Fisher county. He came to Dickens county in 1895 to make his home at Cottonwood which was later named Afton, where he has resided continuously.

Altho professing to be a Christian earlier, he united with the Methodist church after moving to Cottonwood and lived a devoted Christian life.

Mr. Stark's death was attributed to a fall from a horse which he received July 4, which caused paralysis of the brain.

He is survived by his widow and three children: Mrs. L. J. Fullingen and Luther C. Stark of Afton and Raymond Stark of Roaring Springs.

FALL FROM AUTOMOBILE FATAL TO AFTON GIRL LATE SATURDAY NIGHT

Miss Grace Holly, 20, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Holly of Afton, was accidentally killed when she stepped from a moving automobile in front of the home of a friend located on the highway about two miles north of Elton late Saturday night.

Miss Holly is believed to have misjudged the speed of the automobile in stepping from the running board, resulting in a fall which caused the back of her head to strike the pavement. Being immediately hurried to a Spur sanitarium, medical examination disclosed that death had resulted from a fracture of the neck at the axis vertebra just below the head.
