



In honor of National Heart Month. the Motley County Heart Association, a community based organization, will have its annual Fund Drive during the month of February.

The heart is nestled behind the breastbone, between the lungs, in the middle of the rib cage and above the disphragm and considered the bodies most protected organ. However, this doesn't mean it is immuned to harm. It is the bodies little power house that pumps 200 gallons of blood through the circulatory system each day by expanding and contraction more than 100,000 times.

The take home message is to work hard to be healthy for the long haul. Fighting heart disease is team work and AHA research and educational programs have grown by leaps and

bounds. The use of new methods of detection, diagnosis and treatment, death from cardiovascular and cerebrovascular diseases is decreasing.


He is relied upon by all personnel involved in research at the Etter unit, according to NPRF superintendent, Thomas Marek, experiment station agricultural engineer.




