## Matador to Change Time with Nation

COME MONDAY MATADOR will set its clocks and watches ahead one hour in observance of Daylight Saving Time, which will go into effect over most of the nation. A check of most places of business indicates that the change will be general.

The churches, the school plants, bus line and other services will move operating time up one hour.

Television and radio networks will of course move to the new time. Offices that close at 5 p.m. this week will also close at 5 p.m. next week, but the time will be as 4 o'clock this week.

Billy Wason said his food store and Spot Cash Grocery will open at 8:30 Daylight Saving Time and close at 6:30, beginning Monday. At present the stores have been opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 6:30, which means in effect that employees will be on the job 30 minutes less each day.

To rural customers the change in time may result in some inconvenience until they become familiar with Daylight Saving Time.

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

Poison prevention is a year-round responsibility, and can't be relegated to a single day or week. I know that many of us say "It can't happen to me", but as we all sadly find out, it can.

If you have a child under age five, the chances of his being accidentally poisoned this year are one in 38. These are not good odds, particularly when your child's life is at stake. Before you say it is impossible for a child to be poisoned in your home, think about how many times you have known children to accomplish the impossible!

Most accidental poisonings can be related to patterns of storage, handling and disposal. Don't underestimate your children's ability to crawl, climb or reach almost anywhere. Allow for the impossible when handling, storing or disposing of medicines or household products.

What will a child do next? Who knows? What will poisons do? This we know only too well. This year, 500,000 children will be poisoned and over 500 will die from accidental poisoning in their own homes. Will yours be among these figures? Over 90% of all poisonings involve children under five years of age because these are the "curious years" when they get around fast, are fearless, will put anything into their mouths, and are too young to read labels and understand warnings. These young children are not the only ones that will be involved, but we can protect this group by putting things out of their reach, and not letting them play with poisons.

You know the dangers of insecticides and drain-cleaning crystals, but do you know that lemon scented furniture polish, sky-blue window cleaner, chocolate laxative and orange flavored aspirin are all potential killers? Your home is equipped with a variety of products which are designed to make life more pleasant and healthful, but just like many other modern conveniences, these household products must be used only for the purpose for which it was designed and then only in the proper way. Don't let your child be the victim of accidental poisoning by allowing such products to fall into his hands.

Would your child drink kerosene? eat rat poison? Don't think it can't happen in your home, as any time you put kerosene, gasoline, turpentine or any other potential killer into a cup or glass, you are increasing the chance that your youngster will make use of this so called convenience. Remember, you are the one who taught him to associate cups and glasses with milk, water and other drinks. Keep all poisonous materials in their original containers. Don't transfer poisonous material to glasses, cups,
