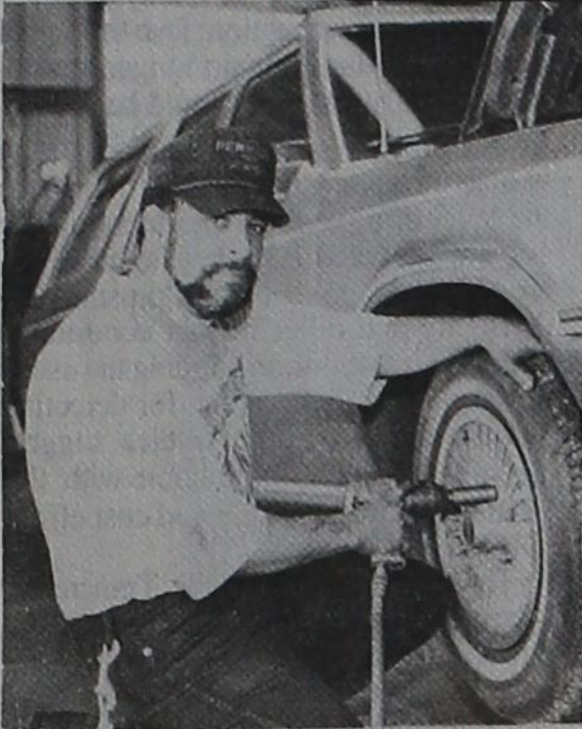

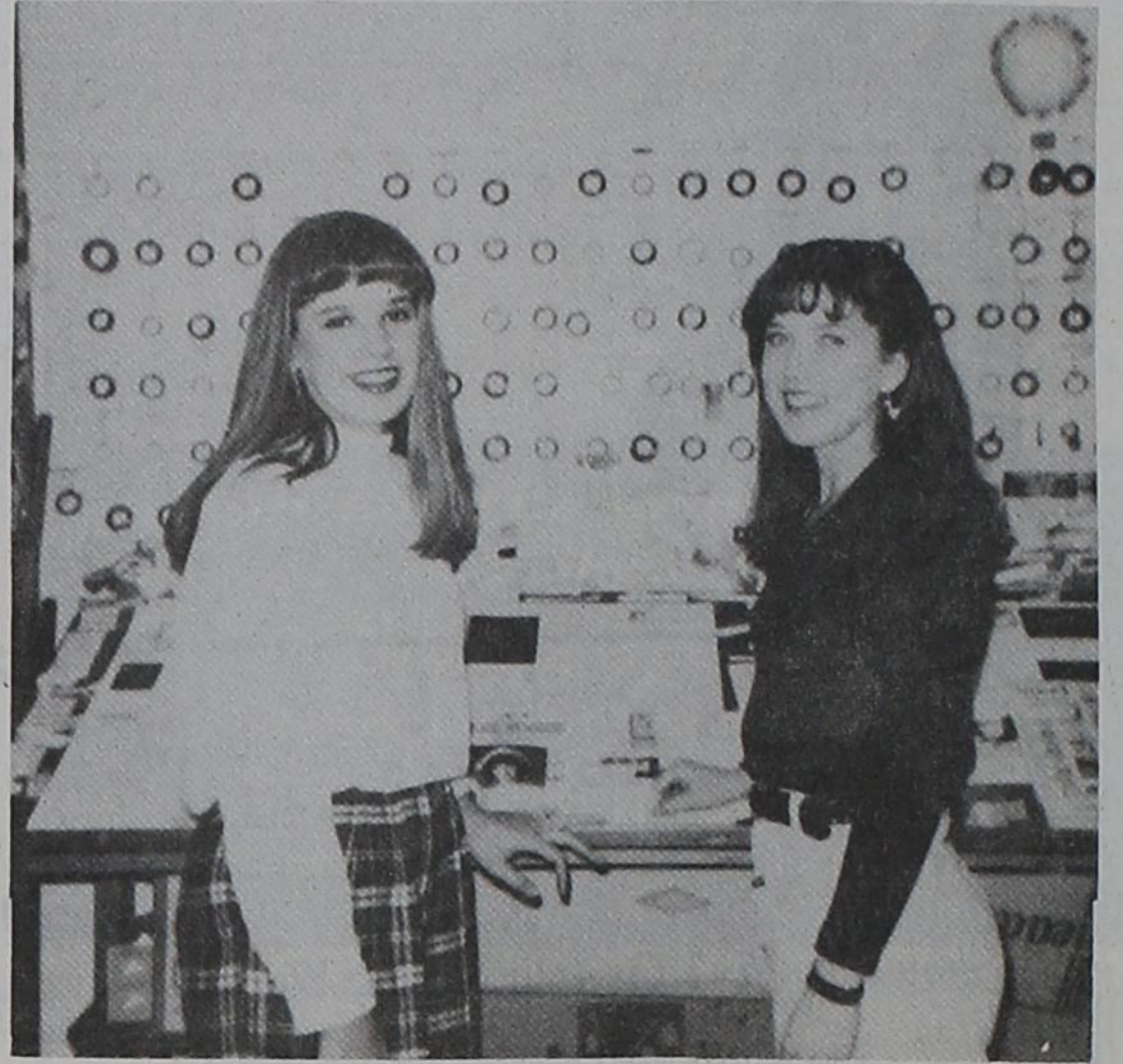

Matador Couple Reminisce Of Longtime Catering Business

Although the fire in the barbecue pit is no longer burning, there is nothing cold about Walter and Algaree Jones. They have long been a part of the community throughout Motley County. Most people know Jones for his cooking, and his wife has cleaned houses for many families in addition to helping out at whatever function Jones might have been cooking for.

Jones no longer cooks, as a result of a major stroke on Oct. 1, 1992, and his wife spends much of her time at home. However, they are remembered by many people for the time and energy they have invested in Motley County and surrounding communities.

Jones says he likes helping children

and being involved in his community - and involved he has been. Jones has cooked at 4-H and school banquets, Lions Club events, Old Settlers' Reunion, and even prepared meals for ranchers to take to their cowboys at brandings.

The evidence of some of his service hangs on his living room wall. He has been awarded the 4-H Honorary Chapter Farmer Award, and the Lions Club Lion of the Year Award.

The Joneses were both raised in Matador, and Mrs. Jones' parents were the first black couple to have a public wedding in Matador. Oressie Cummings and Lee Harris were married in front of the bank building on June 4, 1927, Mrs. Jones said.

Jones was raised by his aunt, who taught him how to cook, Mrs. Jones said. When he joined the army, he went to basic training in Fort Sill, and then moved on to a cooking school where it took only two weeks for him to be placed at the officers school at Fort Benning, GA, she said.

Jones stayed in the army until 1945, when he returned to Matador and began a long career as the area caterer. Mrs. Jones says he could cook anything, but mostly cooked barbecue. Jones sometimes cooked for free, especially for children.

Jones raised his own hogs and cattle until his stroke in 1992. He also butchered his own hogs, cattle for area ranchers, and for Billy Wason's grocery store.

Vann Francis, who has been a Lions Club member for about 20 years, said Jones used to cook for the annual father and son banquet.

"He's been cooking there as long as I can remember," Francis said. He also remembers Jones cooking for the VFW, at Wayburn's Cafe and the Horse and Colt Show in Paducah.

"We remember him for his cooking," Joyce Campbell said. She recalls giving the Jones 4-H jackets, and that they were always supporters of 4-H, and also cooked for the baseball barbecue every year.

"He always seemed happy and in a good mood," Billy Paul Campbell, Campbell's son said.

The Joneses have two daughters, two grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren, who all live in Lubbock. One of their great-granddaughters, Ashley, has been in various beauty pageants in the West Texas, and has also competed in Miss Black Texas in Dallas, Mrs. Jones said.

Jones said that 72 years of hard work never hurt him, and expresses frustration at the limitations caused by his stroke. However, the Joneses still attend church every Sunday, travel to Lubbock once a week for doctor's appointments, and attend the yearly family reunion.

Jones says that he is doing better since his stroke, still drives some around Matador, and true to his West Texas heritage wears his boots everyday. He says he owns only one pair of shoes anyway, and wears them only long enough to get to church and back.

Ag Producers Encouraged To Attend Worker Protection Standard Training

Must I comply with Worker Protection Standards (WPS) Guidelines? The answer: Yes, if you utilize pesticides on your farm operation.

On Monday, February 27, 1995, ag producers will have the opportunity to hear from Texas Department of Agriculture representatives regarding the Worker Protection standard (WPS) and how it affects local farmers and ranchers. The training will start at 12:00 noon in the Matador Senior Citizens Building. Lunch will be provided courtesy of Zeneca Ag Company and Stockman's Supply.

The Worker Protection Standard, which came into effect on January 1, 1995, requires producers to take steps to reduce the risk of pesticide-related illness and injury. If a producer uses agricultural pesticides and/or employs agri-

cultural workers, the WPS requires them to provide employees with information about exposure to pesticides, protection against exposures to pesticides, and ways to mitigate exposures to pesticides.

The WPS Training on February 27th is designed to assist producers in understanding the WPS regulations. In addition, producers will have the opportunity to ask questions in order to assist them in complying with WPS. Two (2) CEU's will be offered for recertification of private applicator's license at the training.

February Sales Tax Rebates Total \$230.9 Million

(AUSTIN) — State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered a total of \$230.9 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,072 Texas cities and 111 counties, including a record \$30.3 million payment to the city of Houston.

The monthly sales tax rebates grew by an average of 4.8 percent over payments of \$220.2 million in February of last year.

Texas cities received \$210.6 million in sales tax rebates, 5.2 percent above the \$200.2 million delivered last February. Counties were delivered \$20.2 million for their February rebates, up 1 percent over the \$20 million for the same period last year.

County Total: current rate, 1.000%; net payments this period, 5,955.14; comparable payment prior year, 7,924.76; % change, -24.85%; 1995 payments to date, 8,028.96; 1994 payments to date, 10,089.77; % change, -20.42%

Motley County Heifer Show Open To Local Ranchers

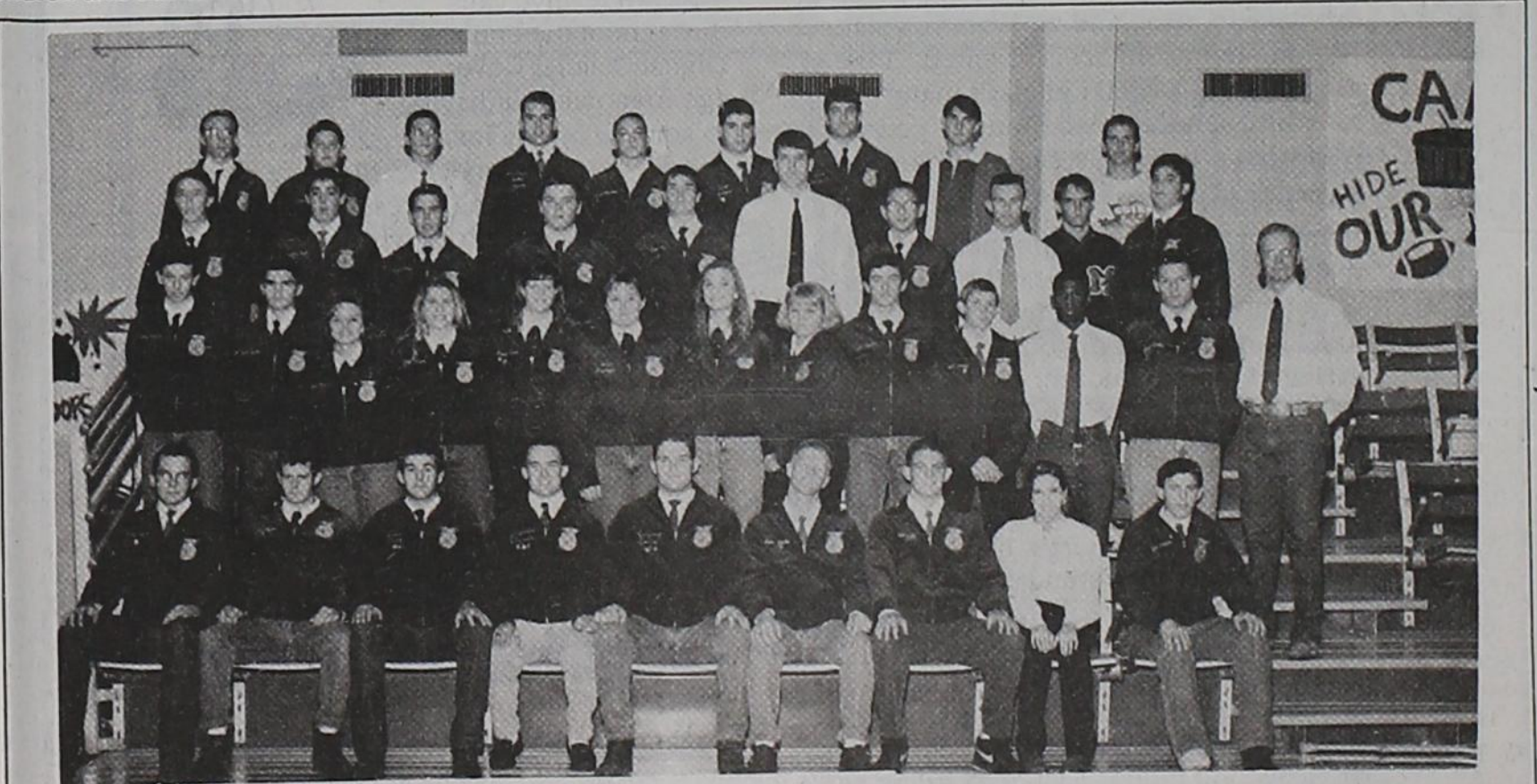

WHAT MEN NEED TO KNOW ABOUT PROSTATE CANCER BY AGE 40

American men are living longer, smoking less and experiencing lower rates of lung cancer. Unfortunately, longer life expectancy increases a person's chances of getting prostate cancer.

Rates have increased since 1973 by as much as 50 percent making prostate cancer the most common and second most deadly cancer among American men; approximately 1 in 10 men will get it. Experts point out however that these higher figures are due in part to better methods for detection.

The prostate is a walnut sized gland of the male reproductive system that produces some of the seminal fluid that transports sperm. For unknown reasons, the prostate grows as men age. By age 40 men may begin having prostate problems, swelling, non-cancerous tumors, inflammation that can be caused by infection and prostate cancer.

Although the average age at detection is 70, and occurrence before age 50 is rare, younger men are advised to be aware of their risk. Also, African-American males are particularly at risk, having the highest rates of prostate cancer worldwide. This alarming rate is not fully understood. Studies show rates are higher in Northern Europe and North American than in Eastern Europe, Asia and Central and South America. Some of this may be due to detection and reporting capabilities. Studies showing the increase in cancer rates among migrants from the low incidence to higher incidence countries suggest environmental as well as racial factors.

Other factors that studies suggest may increase a person's risk for this disease are: Having a blood relative with the disease (the risk for a man with a father or brother with the disease is at least doubled); a diet high in fat; changes in hormones; professions that expose workers to certain environmental conditions including farmers, mechanics, sheet metal workers and those working with cadmium; and sexually transmitted diseases.

Prostate cancer typically does not show symptoms in the early stages. Symptoms that may appear are difficulty or pain while urinating, blood in the urine, and at more advanced stages pain in the back, hips and pelvis. These same symptoms more often than not, however, indicate non-cancerous conditions such as benign prostate hypertrophy (BPH), non-malignant tumors or infection. Benign prostate hypertrophy, occurs in over 50 percent of men over 40, and like benign tumors can

cause pressure on nearby organs and result in urinary difficulty. Rarely are these conditions life threatening.

Because symptoms for early stage prostate cancer are rare, screenings for early detection are recommended. The American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute Cancer Society and the American Urological Association recommend a prostate screening antigen (PSA) in addition to the digital rectal exam (DRE) by age 50 and for men with a family history of prostate cancer, a PSA by age 40. At this time, the National Cancer Institute does not recommend the use of PSAs as a routine screening technique.

TESTS TO DETERMINE PROSTATE CANCER

Three types of tests have been used over the past to determine whether an individual has prostate cancer.

One test is a digital rectal exam (DRE), which is a manual exam performed by the doctor in his office. This exam allows the doctor to feel if there is a lump or swelling in the prostate. In the past this low cost/low risk exam was the only means of prostate cancer detection. Due to its poor predictive value, it is no longer considered the only test that should be used.

The prostate screening antigen (PSA) is a serum tumor marker that measures the level of a particular hormone in the system. Elevated PSA levels, however, are also the sign of benign prostate hypertrophy and other benign conditions. There is a question surrounding the use of this as a reliable screening for detecting prostate cancer. Some studies suggest that the PSA in combination with the DRE is the most reliable and cost effective screening.

There is a third test, the Transrectal Ultrasound (TRUS), that provides doctors with an internal view of the prostate. This test alone, however, does not have the capacity to distinguish malignant from benign tumors. Due to this inability to distinguish type of tumor and high cost, it is not recommended for routine screening. Thus, at the present time, the use of the DRE and the PSA has proven to be most cost effective, followed by the TRUS if either of the first two tests show any abnormality.

Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age, or national origin.

TAX NEWS

What Is Rendition?

A rendition is a form you may use to report the taxable property you own on January 1 to the appraisal district. The rendition identifies, describes and gives the location of your taxable property. You also may give your opinion of your property's value on the rendition form, but it is not required. Business owners must report a rendition of their personal property. If they choose, other property owners may submit a rendition.

*** Advantages** - 1. If you file a rendition, you are in a better position to exercise your rights as taxpayer.

2. Your correct mailing address will be on record so your tax bills will be sent to the right address.

3. Your opinion of your property's

value will be on record with the appraisal district.

*** Requirements** - If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must report this property on a rendition form every year. Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, equipment and machinery on a rendition.

*** Deadline** - File your rendition with the appraisal district after January 1 and no later than April 14.

Any income and expense information that you file about your property is kept confidential by the Appraisal District. (Texas Property Tax Code Sec. 22.27)

Education Of All Handicapped Children Act Guarantees Education For Disabled And Handicapped Children

The Education of All Handicapped Children Act of 1975 guarantees a free appropriate public education for students with disabilities between the ages of 3 and 21. Disabilities include students who are mentally retarded, hard of hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, orthopedically impaired, other health impaired, deaf-blind, multi-handicapped, or having specific learning disabilities, who because of these impairments need special education and related services.

The initial step in determining if a student qualifies as disabled is a referral for consideration for the need for special education services. The referral may be made either through the local school district or the Special Education Coop. After the referral is completed a comprehensive individual assessment must be completed. This is necessary to determine if the student has a disability that would or is causing a significant educational problem. This assessment will include standardized tests, observations, interviews with parent and student work samples.

Once the assessment is completed an Admission, Review, and Dismissal meeting will be held to review the results of the assessment and discuss whether the student qualifies for special education services. Members of this meeting will include parents, school principal, teacher and special education representatives. If the student qualifies this committee will determine how the student will be served in the students home school district.

If you know of a child you feel has a disability and is not receiving these services contact your local school district or Director of Special Education.

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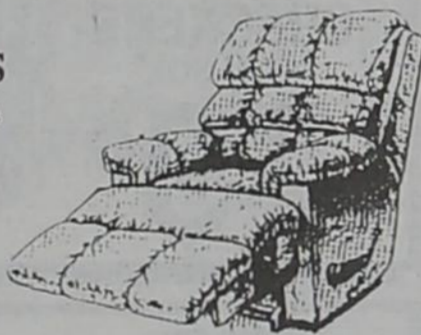
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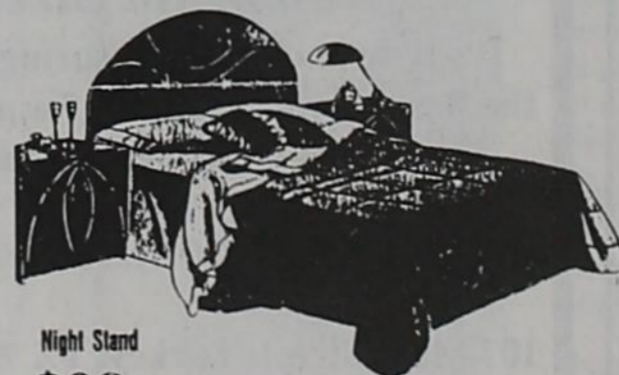

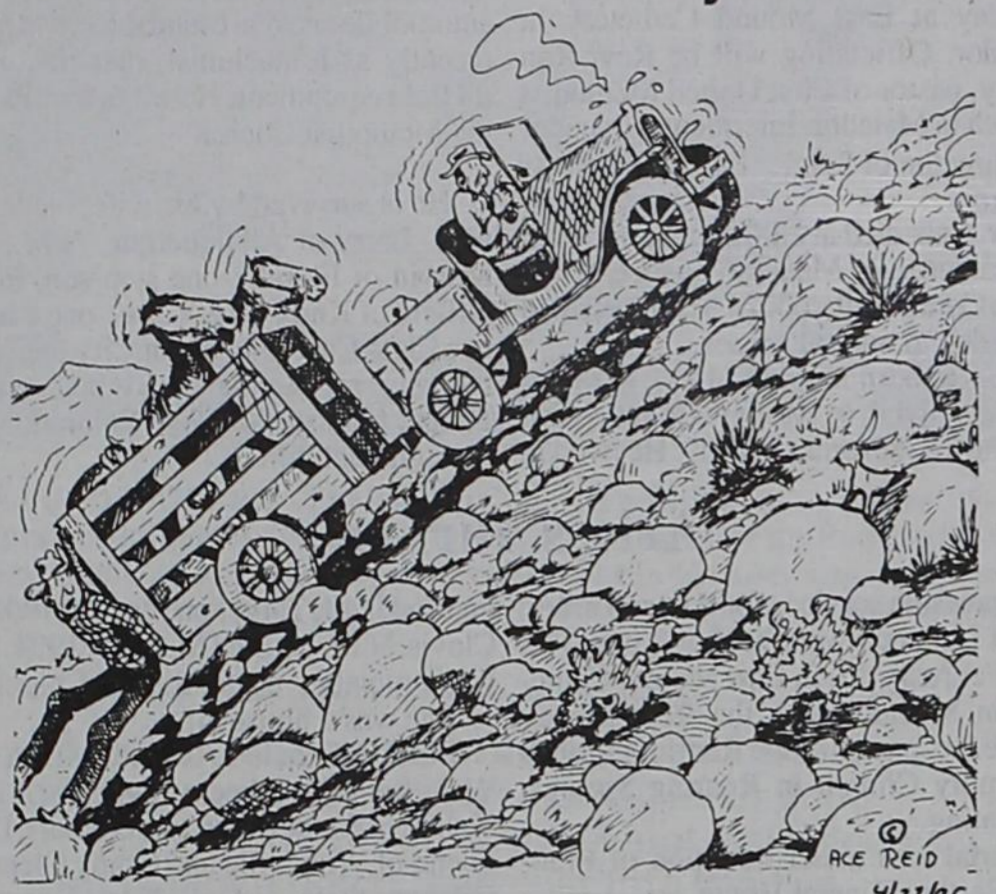
