College Station June 19—The cotton leafworm has already been reported from several parts of South Texas, and it may be assumed that it is generally distributed in small numbers over practically all counties of the Coast section.

The unusually early appearance of the leaf worm this season creates a serious menace. Cotton is late, and even with favorable weather conditions the cotton plant must remain free from insect damage for practically the entire growing season to produce a fair yield; whereas in normal years, infestation by the leaf worm is of small importance and sometimes is a direct benefit.

Showers over Texas are almost sure to be followed by severe damage. Already these have occurred over south Texas. What may result over the drought stricken area is problematical. It is rather expected that the leaf worm, whatever the weather conditions, will become generally distributed over Texas and that damage will become severe in some sections at least, during the latter half of June. Farmers should be on the lookout for its first appearance, and be prepared with materials and otherwise, to apply measures of control.

This insect can be controlled by dusting with arsenicals, preferably while the plants are wet with dew. Calcium arsenate thus applied is effective, and ordinarily is cheaper than any other poison. It should be used undiluted. If arsenate of lead is used, it should be mixed with one fourth its weight of hydrated lime. Paris green should be mixed with five or six parts of hydrated lime. The addition of the lime is partly for the purpose of dilution and cheap flour may be substituted in its place. With Paris green however, at least an equal part of hydrated lime should be included.

The dry poison may be applied in any manner that will create a slight dust cloud. Not a great deal of the poison is required. It is not necessary to have a thick covering of it on the foliage. A dusting machine is advised for making the application of the poison, as soon as the damage from the worm becomes noticeable, will suffice for the control of that brood, though another application may be necessary to control the next brood to appear three or four weeks later.

Where spraying is preferred, the respective poisons may be used in the proportions of one to one and a half pounds of either lead arsenate or calcium arsenate, or one pound of Paris green, in fifty gallons of water. If Paris

slacked and the milk of lime thus obtained, added to the spray liquid after straining.

Spraying with stock dip, or prepared mixtures of white arsenic and sal soda, is apt to result in burning the foliage, and is not recommended.

The burning of lights to trap the moths is not recommended.

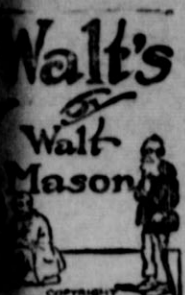

TEXAS NEXT IS CRY

Dallas, Texas, June 15— "Will Texas be next?" That question was asked today by Mark McGee, commander, when information reached headquarters of the state department of the Legion that five additional states have gone "over the top" in The American Legion national \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund campaign for disabled veterans and World war orphans. Since the campaign for the Texas part in the Legion soldier and orphan relief movement began the following states have been added to the national honor roll of states: New Mexico, Delaware, Florida, Nebraska, and New Hampshire. Other states which have reached their quotas include Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas, North Dakota, North Carolina, Utah and Nevada. Several other states, reports indicate, are on the verge of reaching their apportionment of the fund for American war sufferers. According to Commander McGee the endowment fund campaign is progressing satisfactorily throughout the state although much time has been devoted by necessity to organization work. "No Texas will fail to respond to this undertaking when acquainted with the needs and purposes of the fund," Commander McGee said. "Before seeking subscriptions, it was necessary to devote me time to explanation of what the endowment fund means. "The Endowment Fund means above everything else a permanent square deal for two classes in America who suffer most by the war. Those two classes are the men from whom the war has had no armistice and the children who were deprived of paternal care by the deaths of their fathers in and since the war. "The Endowment fund means the guarantee of rehabilitation to disabled men as long as there are disabled veterans of the war and as long as rehabilitation is within the pale of possibility. The endowment fund means homes for orphans, homes for every destitute waif of the 35,000 who survive dead ex-service men. Could anything be more worthy? Almost every day sees some additional state respond in full with payment of this debt of honor. Will Texas be next?"

The calves fifty-one pounds apiece at one day old. Two months later, on April 62, Mildred of Thorndale 69472 reversed the decision of Nora, and increased the herd of Norman B. Chandler, Unionville, Penn., by three heifer calves, sired by Itchen Gold Raider of Pleasant View 87682. Nora of Tomah 64233 was born December 9, 1915, and has had nine registered calves, including the triplets, in nine years and seventy-nine days. Mildred of Thorndale 69472 was born April 23, 1916, and has had eight registered calves, including the triplets, in nine years and three days, besides another calf that was not registered.

Mr. Fulkerson says of Nora of Tomah 64233: "She was the first and only foundation cow in our herd; was sired by Allenwood Prince 28147 and out of Imp. Maggie of Sarnia 35631. It does not take long for a beginner to build up a herd of Guernseys. Nora will be ten years old this December, and has to her credit ten descendants in my herd, besides six that have been sold, and three that are dead. I personally

feel that a good pure bred cow is one of the best investments a dairyman can make."

Mildred of Thorndale 69472 was one of the features of the Eastern Guernsey Breeders' Association Field Day, at Longwood Farm, Kennett Square, Penn., May 29th. She and her triplets attracted a lot of attention. In writing of her, Mr Chandler says: "Mildred was quite uneasy for about a week before calving, but had no

trouble. She has never been sick or off feed a day in her life, and I wish I had a herd like her. Her average herd production is around 8000 pounds of milk per year for her entire lifetime. Since the calves were born on April 23, she has given 300 pounds of milk, besides nursing the triplets. (This was during the first month after calving). She is a real dairy cow for a farmer-breeder, with that good old Glenwood type and ruggedness. I have been unable to find any record where three healthy, living heifer calves have even been registered before. I bought Mildred in dam, when purchasing a few females with the assistance of George Tallman and all of her bull calves have been sold into grade herds. The calves are all thrifty and uniform in size.

WOMEN STUDY NEW STYLE IN COOKING

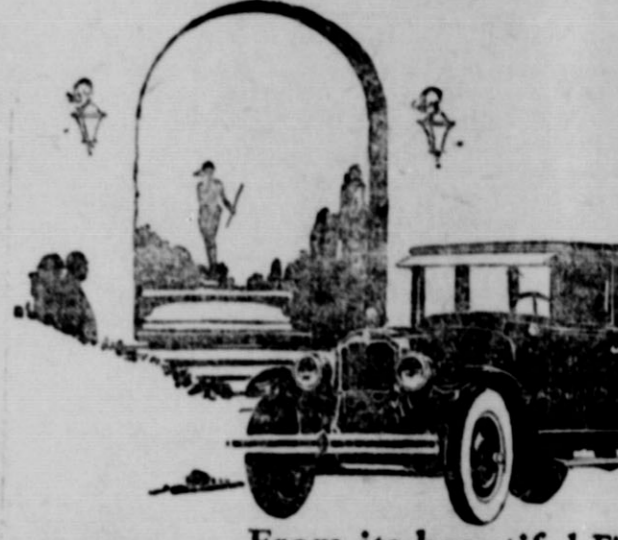

RAILROAD HEARING AT PLAINVIEW JULY 20

At the request of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Texas Railroad Commission will hold a hearing at Plainview, Hale county on the application for the construction of three railroads in the Panhandle of Texas on July 20. This announcement was made last Wednesday afternoon by C. V. Terrell, member of the Texas commission and acting chairman of that body. The applicants are the Fort Worth and Denver, South Plains Railway Company to construct a line from Carey to Demmitt and from Silverton to Lubbock; the Pecos and Santa Fe Railway Company to build a line from Plainview to Demmitt, and also an application by the latter named line from Linder to Silverton. Acting Chairman Terrell stated that the three applications will be heard at the same hearing. These applications were filed some time ago with the Interstate Commission and an examiner of the Interstate body is expected to sit with the Texas commission at the hearing.

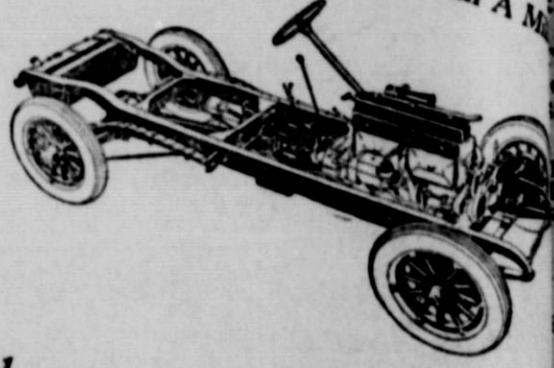
