71 MORE CHECKS RECEIVED IN MATADOR LAST MONDAY

TOTAL OF \$49,341 NOW RECEIVED FOR GROWER

\$142,261.96 In Cash Is Still Due; Option On 2088 Bales

Motley county cotton growers received another "shipment" of checks last Monday amounting to \$21,460 in the 71 checks received. A total of 158 checks have been received which represent \$49,341. A balance of \$142,261.96 is still due farmers of this county, which will be paid in cash. Besides this amount an option on 2088 bales of cotton is also owned by farmers in the county which, according to L. L. Ballard, Emergency Agriculture Assistant, at the present price the value of this cotton is approximately \$104,400.

Business is making a decided up- turn as a result of the checks and the crop which is now swinging into full harvest, according to business houses both in Roaring Springs and Matador. Many merchants report last Saturday's business as one of the best days for this time of year in several seasons.

ONE THOUSAND COTTON PICKERS TO RELIEVE LABOR SHORTAGE HERE

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF LABOR WILL ASSIST FARMERS TO GET HELP

One thousand cotton-pickers will be directed to Motley county within the next few days according to word received by J. R. Whitworth of Matador recently from C. W. Woodman, Director U. S. Department of Labor.

The direction of one thousand cotton-pickers to Motley county by the Department of Labor will result from estimates sent to the department as to the number of people required to gather the fast-opening cotton crop in this county. Several business places have requests for help posted. Monday morning the First State Bank had unfilled request for three crews capable of one bale each per day.

The assistance of the department of labor will consist of advice to cotton-pickers in search of employment at points east of Matador. When one thousand people have been directed here, the directors will advise the pickers to other territories.

DESPONEDNCY OVER III HEALTH DEEMED CAUSE

Grim tragedy strode ruthlessly into the Afton community Monday afternoon when Edgar Hilton, 22, secured a shot gun from the home of a neighbor, John Byrd, and then went to the home of another neighbor, Haskell Byrd, where he borrowed a cartridge which he placed in the gun that he pointed near his heart and pulled the trigger. The entire discharge passed through his body which caused instant death without his uttering a word.

Young Hilton, who had grown to manhood near Afton, was one of the outstanding youths of the community. Of brilliant intellect and quite, friendly character, he had many friends who were shocked to learn of his tragic death. Being in ill health for three or four years, he is believed to have become dependent over his physical condition.

Picture to yourself a young man in his late "teens" or early twenties, rather stoop-shouldered, of slight build, with a mop of tousled dark hair hanging over his forehead in careless abandon, blue-grey eyes with a homesick look in them, eyebrows very heavy and bushy and meeting above the nose—that is Gottfried Reinhardt, son of the famous Max Reinhardt, the greatest theatrical producer of Europe, formerly of Germany, but now seeking refuge in Paris on account of Hitler's drastic decree. Lubitsch, perhaps Hollywood's finest director was formerly trained by Max Reinhardt when the "Miracle" was produced; now the father is sending his son to America to learn the film business under Lubitsch. I interviewed young Reinhardt in his native tongue as he did not seem very conversant with ours. In this interview I learned that he had reached our shores last November after spending several months in New York he set out for the Coast. Reinhardt stopped en route one day for a bird's eye view of The Century of Progress—and he did not visit one of the worlds (if not the greatest) sights—The Grand Canyon. But he has already regretted this omission. His impression of California is very favorable, the climate, the diversified scenery, deserts, mountains and ocean, and as for our studios his admiration knew no bounds. Their size and the technical equipment especially impressed him. He adored Herr Lubitsch, which was only natural,

and young Reinhardt has already learned considerable about this many sided film business, thanks to his mentor. But whether he will follow in his illustrious father's footsteps remains to be seen, but the odds are generally against the sons of famous men—so much is expected of them. As the interview terminated and we shook hands his nostalgic eyes brightened and smiling, he said, "Auf Wiedersehen."
