GASOLINE TAX "ARMY" COLLECT \$330,000 IN EXTRA JUNE REVENUES

COST IS ONLY \$15,600 TO BRING IN LARGE "MISSING" INCOME

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Aug. 8—Comptroller George Sheppard's gasoline tax enforcement "army" of detectives and auditors, created by the Legislature last March, recovered the record sum of \$330,000 in "missing" gasoline taxes during June, at an expense of but \$15,600. This is the gist of a summary of June activities released to the Texas Good Roads Association today by J. W. McReynolds, division chief at the request of the comptroller.

Comptroller Sheppard, elated, saw in the figures "proof" that if the people will help, Texas can save the predicted \$4,000,000 a year in gas taxes heretofore stolen.

Consider what this means to the taxpayers," the comptroller said. "It means that in February, the month before this new law was passed we were headed for a \$2,500,000 decrease in annual gas tax revenues; but now we have wiped that out and are moving at the rate of \$1,500,000 increase.

"Here's how: the state's gas income tax in February was \$207,514 short of the same month a year ago, or nearly 10 per cent. March was almost as bad. Thousands of cars were not being used and bootleggers were running wild.

Then this new law, making evasion a felony, went into effect March 21. Our staff went to work. In April the decrease over 1932 was very small, in May it had been turned into a small increase. These June figures show we collected \$122,370 more gas tax than in June 1932.

The motorist nearly always pays this tax at the filling station, whether it's passed on to the state or not; when it's not, the schools, the bond fund and the highways are being robbed. So is the taxpayer who must make up the difference. That's why we are asking the public to look for evaders.

Spot Cash Grocery To Open Cream Station Here

Arrangements were made this week whereby the Spot Cash Grocery will begin the purchase of cream, possibly by the latter part of the week.

George Springer, manager of the grocery store declared that the station operated under his management would pay shippers prices for cream which is usually 2 or 3 cents more than paid by the usual buying station.

TRUCK PURSUED AND THREE ARE ARRESTED AFTER ROBBERY HERE

LUBBOCK YOUTHS APPREHENDED ON ROAD BY NIGHT WATCHMAN AND STATION OWNER

Breaking a lock on a gas pump at the Thompson Grocery and Service Station about 4:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, three youths who gave their address as Lubbock and their names as Jack Nelson, 20; Joe Nelson, 19 and Howard Baine, 18, driving a six wheel truck, removed gasoline believed to amount to 15 gallons from the pump and started toward Matador over Highway 18.

John Shirley, local night watchman, noticed the robbery but was too far away to reach the truck before it started. He immediately awakened Press Thompson, owner of the gas station, and in Mr. Thompson's automobile they gave chase.

Driving alongside the speeding truck, Mr. Shirley stopped the three youths and returned them to Roaring Springs where they were placed in jail. They were later removed to Matador by Sheriff Skinner.

Sheriff Skinner declared that money amounting to \$40 was found on the youths during a search.

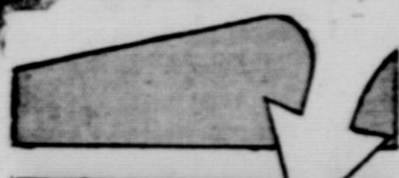

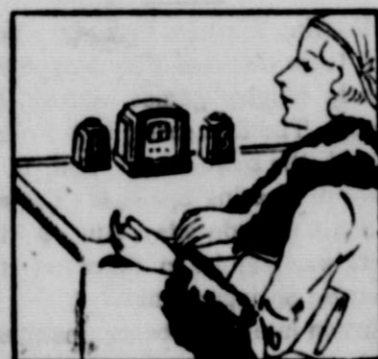

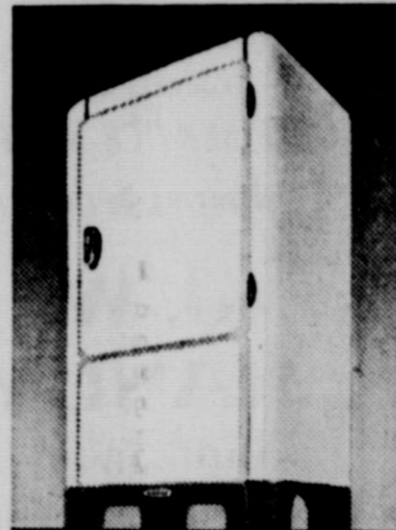
