enformation of our readers: "Section 51a. The Legislature whe power to authorize by nds of the State of Texas, NOT EXCEED the sum of Twenty ing interest at a rate not to exceed Vour and a half (4 1-2) per centum
per annum; and payable serially or otherwise not more than Ten (10)
years from their date, and said bears rom their date, and said
bonds SHALL BE SOLD FOR NOT LESS THAN PAR and ac crued interest, and NO FORM OF
COMMISSION SHALL BE AL LOWED in any transaction involv-
ing said bonds. The proceeds of the sale of such bonda to be used in
furnishing relief and work relief to needy and distressed people and in relieving the hardships resulting
from unemployment, but to be from unemployment, but to be
FAIRLY DISTRIBUTED OVER THE STATE and upon such terms and conditions as may be provide
