### MATADOR COWBOYS TO VIE FOR PRIZE MONEY AT STAMFORD REUNION

Cowboys from the Matador ranch, headed by Claude Jeffers, veteran employee, will attend the Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford, July 3, 4, and 5, to participate in the cowboy contests held in connection with the Reunion. Of the Matador's wagon force, Jeffers sons go to make up a large part of the crew, four of them being employed on the ranch. Jeffers and the Matador cowboys visit the Reunion each year and usually come away with a fair portion of the prize money.

### WORLD WAR VETERANS WILL RECEIVE HUMANE DISABILITY PAYMENT

As a result of conferences between the President, the National Commander of the American Legion, Louis Johnson, and the Director of the Budget, the following conclusions have been reached.

As a result of the application of the veterans' regulations, it now seems that the cut in compensation of service-connected world war veterans with specific injuries has been deeper than was originally intended. The regulation and schedules in this respect will, therefore, be reviewed so as to effect more equitable levels of payment. Careful study also will be made of the other regulations and their effects.

By reason of the burden incident to rating and in order that undue hardship will not be imposed upon veterans in their application for adjudication of their cases, regional offices of the Veterans' Administration will not be closed as has been reported, except where it has been clearly demonstrated that regional facilities are not necessary.

It is not contemplated that Government hospitals will be closed pending a careful, studious survey of the entire hospital situation. This, of necessity, will require considerable time.

These conclusions are in line with the President's original statement that the regulations and schedules would be drafted so as to effect the most humane possible treatment of veterans truly disabled in war service.

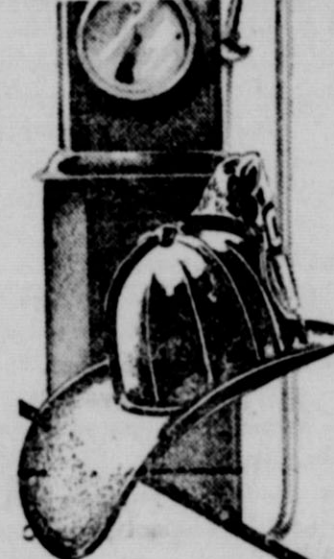

Studio it was to be a winter scene and be sure that he brought his heavy winter overcoat along, muffler, etc. Its the unexpected that happens. Sometimes we are put to the test before succor comes. But the time for pawning his last available article is only being postponed and then—

It's now the close of day, these extra players are standing in a long line waiting to get their daily vouchers cashed. And watching this line are many who have not worked for many a day, and hoping that they may spy some of their more fortunate friends who will 'stake them to a meal' or perhaps 'lend them a buck'. Wistfully they look through the iron gates—cold, down-cast, hungry they too, have discovered the brass beneath the Magic City.

Did you know, perhaps that—  
Wallace Beery's two greatest passions are his adopted daughter and his aeroplanes. Mentioned in the order of their importance.

That one of our famous directors—Mr. Dieterle—when he directs always wears a pair of white gloves?  
That another director, Bacon by name, wears a funny looking felt hat which he punches from time to time into more and more grotesque shapes? Is this genuine, perhaps? If so, will start right away and punch mine and see what happens, perhaps I may be able to get out a really interesting column.

Another director, perhaps also an erratic genius, rolls up his hat and chief into a ball, then he unrolls it bites it several times, blinks his eyes and jerks his head about. Maybe what I mistake for genius is just St. Vitus dance?

Cecil (the e is pronounced like the e in egg, never, like in see (if you should make the mistake and pronounce it the wrong way, I would shudder to think what might happen to you—in any case I would notify your relatives. Well, as I was saying—Cecil De Mille never wears the same suit on two consecutive days. On Monday, let us say, he might appear in cream colored kidney-bean pants and dark brown coat, on Tuesday, a whole

That Mr. Lubitsch, perhaps our greatest director, never wears while directing, golf clothes, riding breech-

es, just a well-tailored business suit, conservative, generally grey, with it Herr Lubitsch wears a very unostentatious tie, and always he has a cigar in his mouth, unlit half the time—but never a cigarette. And he walks back and forth with quick short strides, head bent forward, it is then when he thinks the best—on his feet.

Excuse me, I think I'll emulate his example and start walking right
