AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Fixing the Date for Beginning the Collection of City Taxes Each Year in the City of Matador, the Date Such Taxes May Become Delinquent and Enforced Collection Begin, and Assessing Penalties on Such Delinquent Taxes and Providing for the Collection of Existing Delinquent City Taxes.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR:

Section 1.—It shall be the duty of the City Tax Assessor or the official charged by law with the duty of assessing the taxes of the City of Matador, to assess such taxes each year as may be levied by ordinance of the City Council and to prepare tax rolls for such city in the manner provided by law, which rolls shall be completed on or before the first day of October in each year; and it shall be the duty of the Tax Collector or the officer of said city who is now or shall hereafter be charged with the duty of collecting taxes, to begin such collections on the first day of October in each year, and any taxes so assessed or which may become due and owing by any taxpayer, which are not paid by the 31st day of January, succeeding the year for which

such taxes are due, shall become delinquent and a penalty of Ten Percent (10%) is hereby declared and levied against all such delinquent taxpayers, and the Tax Collector is hereby authorized and the enforced collection of taxes on the first day of February in each year succeeding the year such taxes are levied.

Section 2.—And whereas there is now due to the City of Matador large sums of delinquent taxes that have accrued during the past years, together with the costs and penalties provided by law, which taxes, costs and penalties are secured by the Statutory tax lien on property belonging to such delinquent tax payers; it is therefore further ordained and directed that the City Secretary make

up a list of such delinquent taxes in the manner provided by law, and that such delinquent taxes, penalties and costs be collected promptly and that such suits be brought and such other measures taken for the collection thereof as may be found necessary under the terms of the law to effect a speedy collection of such delinquent taxes, with interest, penalties and costs.

Done this 25th day of May, A. D. 1934.

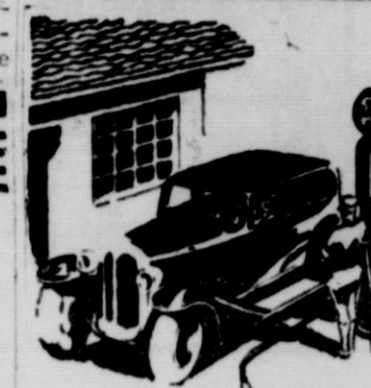
