Time flicks off the days as ashes from a burning cigarette and there is no reconstruction of the past. The opportunity to speak an encouraging word or lighten the load of another rests with the transient minute. Shining as the eyes of a cat in the dark, are the human thoughtful things we might have done yesterday.

### Washington Delegate from Texas Impressed by National Shrines

"The thing that impressed me most about the whole trip was that Washington, D. C. is so much like stories of ancient Rome," Larry Elliott said after returning from a 12-day all expense paid trip to the capital of the nation on June 20.

Elliott was one of 87 delegates from Texas who joined over 900 other young people from all over the United States in Washington, D. C., for National Youth Day activities, June 14.

Highlighting National Youth Day was a speech on the White House lawn by President Johnson, who then shook hands and visited with the Texas delegation. The President asked the group to "leave your land in better condition than you found it."

Evangelist Billy Graham, who was in Washington for talks with the President, also addressed the group.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Elliott, Larry represented the Hall County Electric Cooperative. While in Washington, the group visited REA national headquarters.

The next day the group moved in on the city which they toured for a week, visiting Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, Jefferson Memorial, the Capitol, Arlington Cemetery, Iwo Jima Monument, Smithsonian Institute, the Wax Museum, the White House, and viewing the Pentagon, across the street from their hotel, the Marriott Motor Hotel, largest in the world.

During his Washington visit, Larry toured the capitol, a 164 year old edifice of stately beauty. The Rotunda, which once served as a hospital for Northern soldiers in 1861, is capped by "Apotheosis of Washington" a painting around the dome. The fresco features President George Washington sitting between Liberty and Victory.

Comploting the innermost circle of figures are forms representing the 13 original states.

Inside the capitol, epitome of a free nation, Andrew Johnson was impeached, woman suffrage was granted and wars have been declared. These and other poignant memories are all built into the capitol and are what one senses to supplement what he sees.

**Hears Dodd Trial**  
Larry sat in the Senate gallery as another passage of history was being transcribed. Senator Thomas Dodd was pleading with his fellow senators to acquit him on three charges, including mis-use of campaign funds. "Everett Dirksen was there but he didn't say anything," Larry remarked. He added, "Edward Kennedy walked in and put the gallery in an uproar."

After visiting Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials and Washington Monument, Larry found the 555' Washington Monument most resplendent. "All of us climbed up and down on foot and stopped to enjoy a beautiful view of all of Washington," he said. From the monument one can see the capitol which is completely lighted at night by a circle of spotlights.

Larry recalled the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier as one of his most memorable moments. While in Arlington National Cemetery, the group also laid a wreath on the grave of the late President John F. Kennedy. Robert Lee Manson, modelled after the temple of Theus in Athens, is on the hill above the cemetery just a short distance from the late president's grave. It was Lee who once owned the

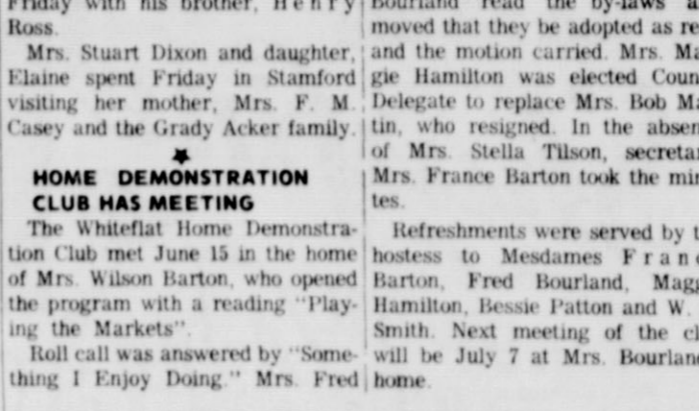
