## ATTENDING BOYS EDUCATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

Herbert Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Harris of Whiteflat left Monday for Dallas where he will attend the Boys Educational Encampment at the Dallas Fair for three days as the guest of the State Fair. Herbert won this trip by doing the best work this year in the Boys Agricultural Club in this county and the trip was furnished by the First State Bank of Matador as an expression of their appreciation of the work the boys are doing under County Agent T. P. Metcalf. The Boys Educational Encampment is held every year during the State Fair at Dallas under the auspices of the Extension Department of the A. & M. College and the prize winning boys from every county in the state where extension work is being done are given this three days outing as a reward for their work. About four hundred boys will attend this encampment this year. A large dormitory has been built by the fair for housing the boys and they are given their lodging and meals by the fair association in addition to passes to all shows and every thing of educational nature on the fair grounds. In addition to visiting the fair they will take trips around the city of Dallas and an opportunity to see the large office buildings, factories and other things of interest in a large city.

## RAILROAD OFFICIALS VISIT MATADOR

Mr. Sam Lazarus, president of the Q. A. & P. Railroad together with Mr. Charles H. Summers, General Manager, A. F. Summers, Superintendent and C. B. Dorchester a director of that road were in Matador last Saturday afternoon for a meeting with the citizens of Matador. They arrived about three thirty and were at the station by Homer Sheats, President of the Chamber of Commerce, G. E. Hamilton and others. The visitors were taken to Mr. Hamilton's office for a short conference and then to the District Court room in the court house for a general meeting at four o'clock. Mr. Sheats called the meeting to order and explained that the officials of the Q. A. & P. had requested this meeting with the citizens of Matador for the purpose of conferring with them in regard to the extension of their road from Roaring Springs to Floydada. Mr. Lazarus was then introduced and he very briefly explained the reason for asking for the meeting. He stated that it was their intention to extend the road from Roaring Springs west to Floydada if they could get permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission and he wanted the people of Matador to join in with them in petitioning the Commission to grant this permission. A general discussion was then gone into with explanations by both Mr. Lazarus and Mr. Summers. It was brought out that Matador would receive a much better train service, the opening up of western markets for our products and with the absorption of the Motley County Railroad by the Q. A. & P. the elimination of one of our present differentials. Following this discussion a motion was made by G. E. Hamilton and second by C. L. Glenn that we join in this petition. The motion carried and the meeting adjourned.

## MORE COTTON ON FEWER ACRES

The attention of contestants in the "More Cotton on Fewer Acres Contest" is called to the following points.

All cotton picked from this patch must be kept separate and ginned by itself.

Receipts showing weights of seen cotton, lint cotton and seed taken from the ginned and kept.

Sample stalks from the patch pulled up and kept for inspection if called for.

Samples from both sides of each bale must be taken and sent to the Textile Department, A. & M. College Station, Texas for stapling.

Seigler, proprietor of the filling station was very painfully burned on the hands and legs. They were immediately rushed to a doctor for treatment. Mr. Boyd and family reside in the vicinity of Olney. They had been on the plains near Lubbock seeking work and were returning to Vernon where they had secured employment. 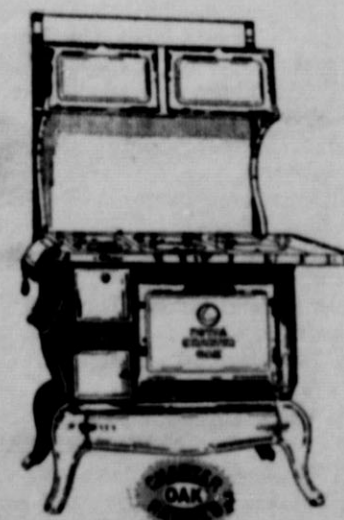

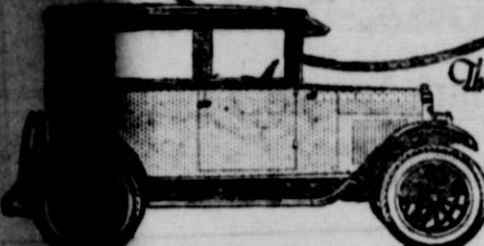

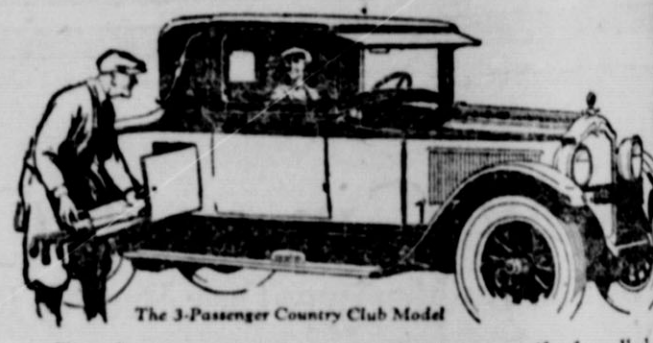

tries. During September deliveries in the United States increased to approximately 44,500, placing September second only to April and May of this year and exceeding the domestic deliveries for June, July and August respectively.

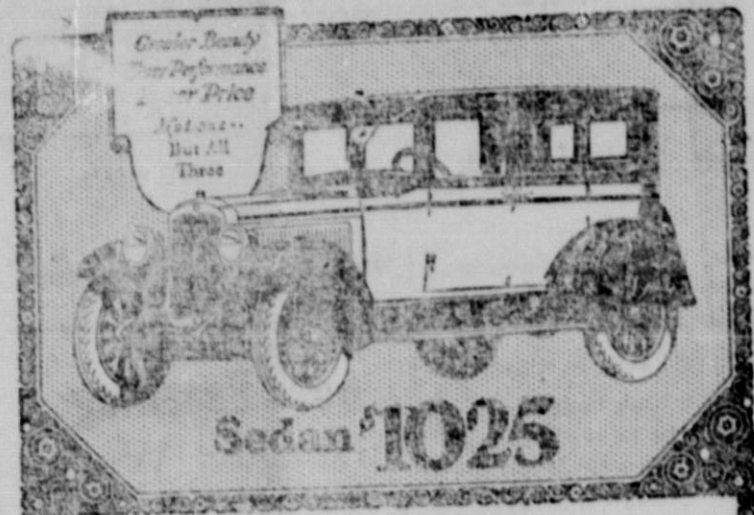

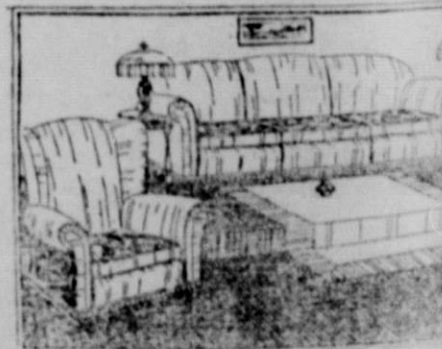
