O'Daniel named Smith to be life insurance comhering to certain basic living missioner, he cast one of his choicest plums to a section of the state which has always been ignored by previous governors in making major appointments. It was the first time that the rich agricultural South Plains had received such an appointment.

But in making that selection, the governor did not please Lt.-Gov, Stevenson because the man the governor chose happened to be a close friend and former law partner of Sen. Nelson.

Behind the scenes Stevenson began maneuvering his forces to block Smith's confirmation, and that has put the lieutenant-governor in a paradoxical position. In the first place he is cast

in the role of working against confirmation of a popular West Texan for one of the most important posts in the state government.

In the second place he is cast n the role of working against the choice of the governor. Stevenson, endorsed by O'Dan-

el in last August's Democratic runoff against Pierce Brooks of Dallas, several times has announce ed he would co-operate with the

Gov. O'Daniel, whether or not has been appraised of backstage maneuvers against his appointee, has indicated he will not lift a finger to bring pressure on senators to approve any of his appointments.

Meanwhile Stevenson is reported busy pulling strings to line up enough senators to keep Smith out. He needs only 11 of the 31 senators to block confirmation.

Attempts have been made to have Smith's name withdrawn from consideration by the Senate to avert a showdown, but these attempts apparently have failed.



GAY BANDS FOR GULLS

The newest thing in bird banding is the "sight band," a brightly colored ring fastened on the leg which can be identified without capturing the bird. Various colors are used in tagging a species, so as to give clues as to where and when the birds were banded. Last year, on ten gull rookeries along the Atlantic coast, 5,000 young herring gulls were banded in studying the migration habits of this familiar species, which has greatly increased under the migratory bird treaty act of 1918, according to the National Wildlife Federation.



Fear Man's Greatest Scourge, Says New York Clinic Head

EAR, according to Dr. Edward Spencer Cowles, founder of the Body and Mind Clinic in New York, is the most prevalent, the most sinister disease in the world. Eight out of ten surgical operations are unnecessary, he contends, since many people suffering from bodily disorders are not sick at all, in the usual sense of the word, but simply are victims of a broken nervous system. And fear stems directly from this loss of nerve-cell energy.

This is true he maintains, despite the fact that pains may be actual and the symptoms so real that an X-ray will often reveal them. In other words, fatigue of the nervous system can act as an imitator of all sorts of disease; it can even cause blindness, deafness, paralysis, crooked arms and withered legs, where the victim's consciousness is dilled with painful sensations and he nerve-cell energy back to mormal.

In the April Cosmopolitan, Rex Beach continues his series of "Modern Miracle Men" with an interview of this strange humanitarian, Dr. Cowles, who for twelve years supported the clinic mainly out of his own pocket. Now the patients pay about twelve cents a treatment. The clinic, a nonprofit, nonsectarian institution, is the only one of its kind in the world, and was started by Dr. Cowles to meet the growing need for a study of mental and emotional disturbances. More than five thousand treatments are given every month.

Dr. Cowles' experiments have led him to the conclusion that a normal, healthy person represents one hundred units of energy in the nerve cell. No one, of course, has a perfect score, but as long as the figured doesn't drop below eighty there's nothing te fear. As it nears eighty, however, a person becomes physi-





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

Analysis of official records of accidents in which trucks were involved reveals a further vital fact that the heaviest and largest trucks, as a class, operating over Texas highways in 1937, showed a death rate of four and one-half times that of all trucks, large and small, and almost seven times that for all motor vehicles, including trucks.

The combination of weight and size of motor vehicles is thus definitely proved be the controlling factor in fatal highway accidents the heavier the vehicle that harder it hits the more surely it kills or cripples.

The statutes now in effect have governed truck operations on Texas highways since 1931 and the ever-growing toll of truck accidents, injuries and deaths, reflects only the increasing ingenuity of the operators of overloaded trucks in evading or openly defying the laws created to control them in the interest of public safety. 
