

There is little that needs to be checked on such a canner except to see that all the parts are together. There needs to be a tight-fitting lid and a rack for the bottom to set cans or jars on. A wash boiler or a bucket makes a good waterbath canner if it is high enough to permit covering the cans or jars with one to two inches of

Not highly recommended by home economists, but possible ways of canning certain fruits and tomatoes are steamers, oven and the open kettle method. Tin cans should never be used for oven canning. Nor should peaches, pears, or apricots be processed in the oven, because they develop a brownish discoloration.



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



Premiums and guaranteed vields will be figured in terms of pounds of lint cotton, and the premiums will be based on the crop-loss history of individual farms adjusted to reflect the croposs history of the county. Yields and crop-loss averages will be figured on the basis of historical or appraised productivity over a period of years.
