Congressman Bob Price Wants Motley Out of His District

REPUBLICAN REPRESENTATIVE PRICE IS DISGRUNTLED BECAUSE HE DID NOT CARRY MOTLEY COUNTY IN THE NOVEMBER GENERAL ELECTION. HE RECEIVED 309 VOTES TO DEE MILLER'S 292. IN 1952 REPUBLICAN DWIGHT EISENHOWER CARRIED THE COUNTY 675 TO THE LATE ADLAI STEVENSON'S 515.

Will we go to George Mahon's district?

The following is a statement made by Motley County Democratic Chairman Furman Vinson after reading the Price article:

"I know that we were to be moved to another Congressional district, but not knowing the reason, I had asked to remain in the 18th district as we have always felt that we belonged geographically, and we have always been in common with the Texas Panhandle.

"Naturally if Congressman Bob Price feels he can't give impartial representation to a county which he failed to carry in the last general election, certainly we are anxious to go to another district, preferably the district now represented by Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock. I have a very high regard for Mr. Mahon and for the people of the South Plains which he represents.

"I know that Congressman Price is a freshman in Congress and with a little more experience, he will realize that his attitude toward Motley County is one that carries many inherent dangers. Just as our free enterprise system is based on political competition, so is our political system based on people having the right to disagree. The Democratic voters of Motley County are always glad to work with Congressman Price, or whoever our Congressman may be, on anything that is good for our county and district, so long as our right to disagree is protected.

"Just in case Mr. Price thinks Motley County automatically votes Democratic, I would remind him that Dwight Eisenhower carried the county in 1952 by more votes than he (Price) lost to Dee Miller in 1966."

El Progreso Club Hears Program On Parks, Museums and Antiques

El Progreso Study Club met Thursday afternoon at the lovely ranch home of Mrs. R. W. Overstreet in the caprock foothills, and heard an interesting program on Texas parks and antiques.

Miss Sue Glenn, president, opened the meeting and Mrs. John Barnhill, program director, gave a report on the district meeting of Santa Rosa District, Texas Federation of Women's Club held last month in Wichita Falls.

Members were reminded by Miss Glenn to remember Daylight Saving time, in attending the two remaining meetings of the year.

Mrs. A. C. Traxwek gave some very interesting facts pertaining to Texas Parks and Museums and stated that Texas State Parks are not adequate to take care of all the visitors expected. The Park Board, she said, has asked that a tax be provided to take care of the parks.

She said that parks fall into three categories: 1. Recreational, 2. Historical, and 3. Scenic.

She pointed out that the Big Bend is the only National Park in Texas. "Shirtsleeve weather prevails the year around, and there are many animals within the park, including deer, mountain lion and javelinas. New museums in the state include the Hogg Museum in Houston, donated by the late Miss Ina Hogg, which includes 14 acres of land for park development."

Mrs. Overstreet, who has furnished her home with many antiques,

spoke on the subject, "Values expressed in Antiques."

She explained that any object made before 1830 is considered antique. "An antique is simply a record or display of history," she said.

Her collection includes a pair of early English chairs, but made by the French; a baby high chair which has four adjustments; a divan of German design which tells the story of the bear hunt in the Black Forest, and a desk which tells the story of love, with engravings of angels, cherubs and doves, on the high back. One of her most prized possessions is an Italian Renaissance chair, approximately 400 years old, which the dealer described as a "Priest Chair." A set of crystal quail and a rug on the floor will be antiques of tomorrow.

Roll call was answered by members, giving "My favorite Heloise Hint." Closing prayer was by the president.

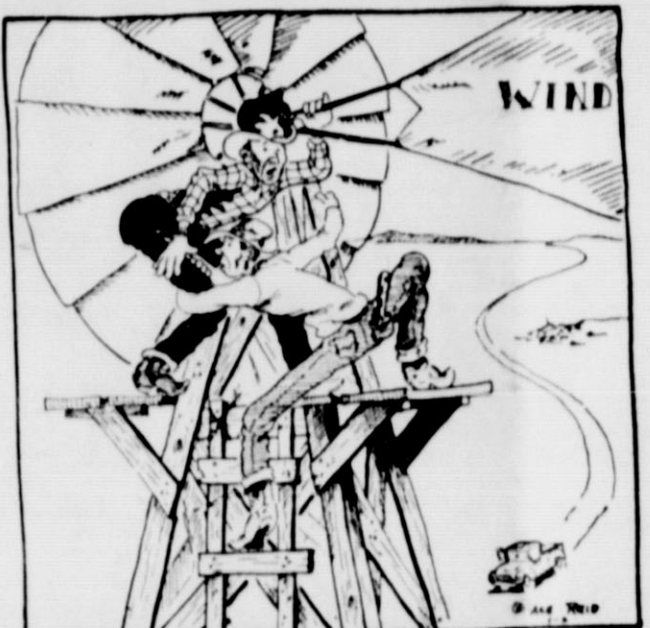

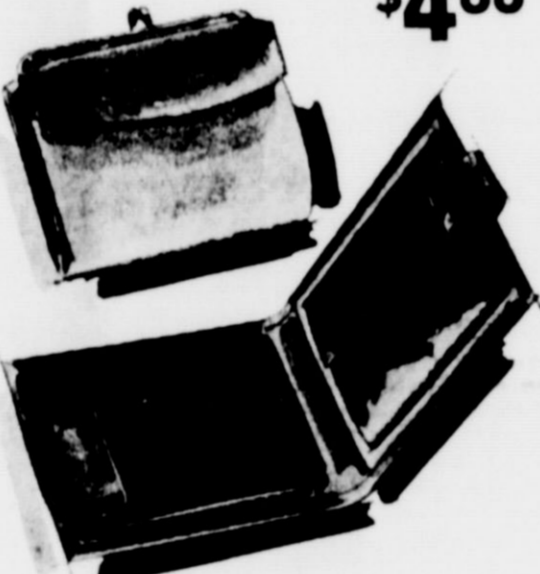

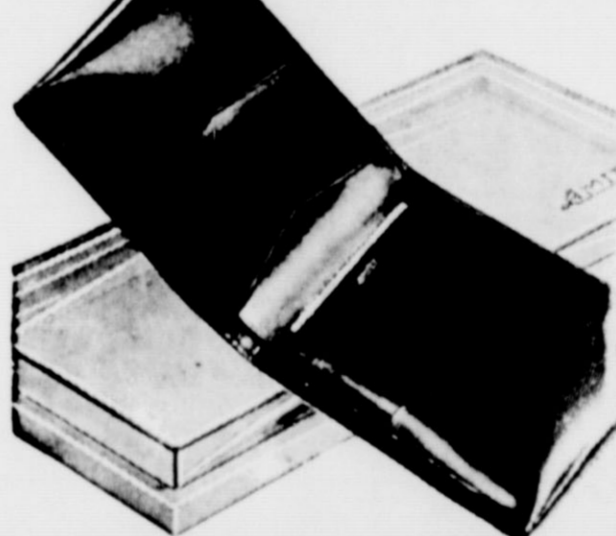
