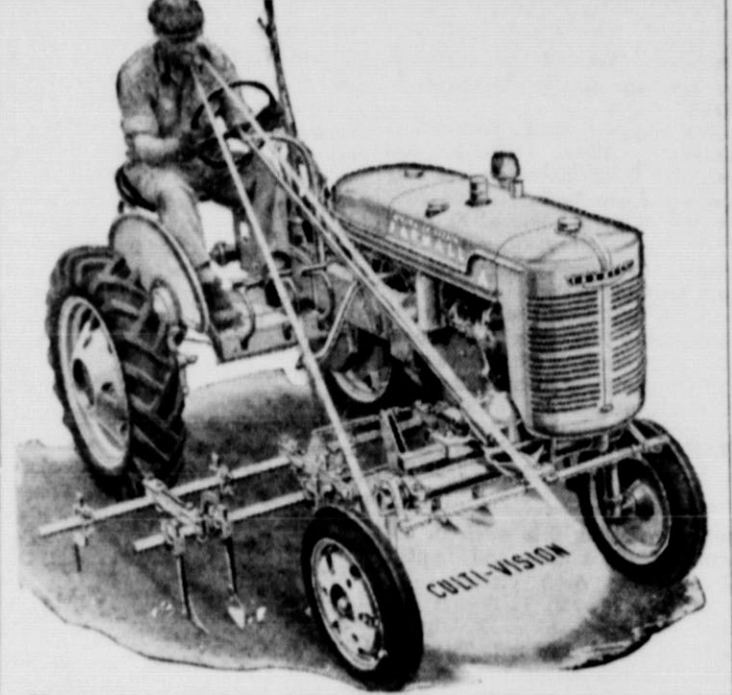

BIG LIVESTOCK SHOW PLANNED

DALLAS—Plans are being made to have one of the largest livestock shows ever held in the entire South at the 1939 State Fair of Texas, October 7 to 22, it has been announced here by Frank P. Holland, director in charge of livestock.

Premiums have been increased in practically every classification of livestock. Beef cattle alone has been increased to more than \$20,000, and one of the features of the livestock show will be the Hereford classification for which \$10,000 in awards will be made.

Due to the increased herds of dairy cattle in Texas premiums in this classification have been increased to \$7,500, as have the awards offered in the various swine classifications.

Texas has rapidly forged ahead during the past few years as the outstanding beef cattle state in the entire union, and are selling many animals of registered stock to farmers of the South and the Southeast for breeding purposes.

State Fair officials plan to invite many officials and visitors from Southwestern states to visit the Hereford and other livestock shows at the Fair.

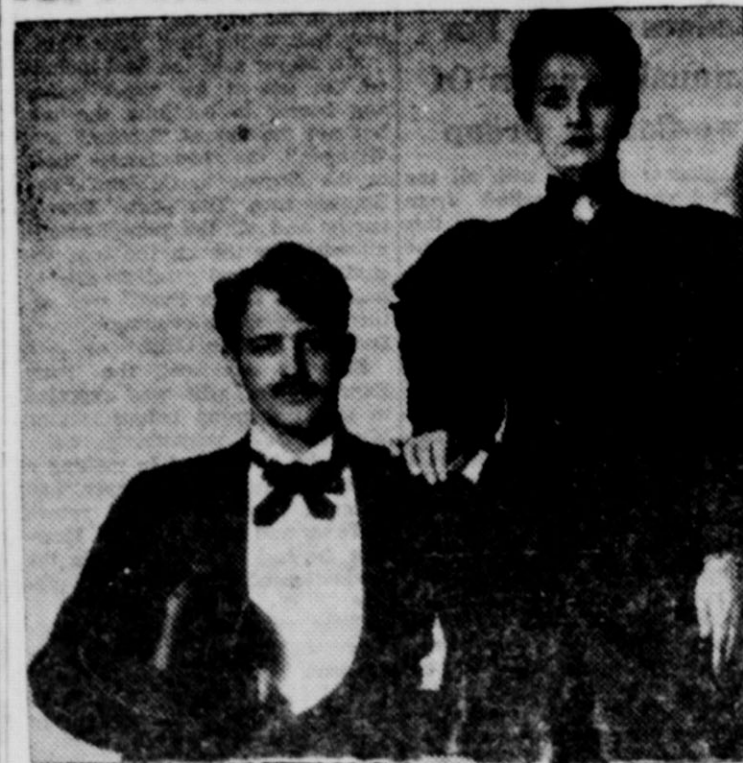
Reception Held

Allotments On Wheat To Be Received Soon

Fulfilled this week was the AAA's promise of an early wheat program, as 1940 acreage allotments sped to wheat farms in 24 counties. Texas wheat farmers will receive their allotments by August 1; last year it was September before the first ones arrived.

The 1940 state allotment of 4,221,702 acres is 505,502 acres more than it was for 1939. Texas wheat farmers who planted within the prescribed limits last fall have received almost three million dollars in 1939 price adjustment payments.

They are scheduled to receive about \$5,500,000 in 1939 wheat conservation checks, besides other payments that remain on the price adjustment series.

As wheat harvest progresses over the state, a number of Commodity Credit Loans are being made. Last year, wheat loans amounting to more than two and one half million dollars were made in Texas.
