



Producers should not wait for committeemen to come to them, county agent, Frank A. Buckley explains, but should go to their local committee headquarters and bring with them their survey card, properly filled out. It is necessary that a survey card be accurately made out on every farm in the county, whether or not it is to be covered by a 1934 contract. The deadline for signing contracts is January 31. It is not wise to wait until the last day, for it may require two or three days to get all details of the contract complete.

All committees with the exception of Darden will maintain central headquarters, as follows: Roaring Springs, old bank building; Matador, Farmers Gin office; Whiteflat, gin office; Flomot, school house; Northfield, church. These beadquarters will be open at all times, and producers should feel free to ask committeemen for any informstion desired concerning the plan.

Everyone should keep clearly in mind that the purpose of the Agricultural Adjustment Act is to adjust production in order to bring the price to parity with articles which farmers have to

The co-operation of every individual is necessary to make the plan a complete success Landlords tenants, or others should not allow minor differences to prevent them from doing their part in this great program which is for the benefit of all the people.

Unless sufficient acreage is contracted by January 31 to make the plan feasible it will not be put into operation by the Secretary of Agriculture.
