Roaring Springs and several other surrounding cities adopted this tax in May, 2000.

Since 1989, voters in many Texas cities have had the option of impos-ing a local sales and use tax to help finance their communities' economic development efforts. Cities may adopt an economic development sales ax under 4A or 4B at a rate of 1/ 8, 1/4, 3/8, or 1/2 of 1 percent if the new total rate of all local sales and use taxes would not exceed 2 percent. Under both 4A and 4B, the city's governing body is required to establish a corporation to administer the use of tax funds. The corporations will be run by a board(s) of directors. The 4A corporation's board is composed of a five member board with terms not to exceed 6 years. The 4B corporation's board is composed of seven board members. Three of the seven directors cannot be employees, officers, or members of the city's governing body.

After soaring temperatures in August, the cooler weather in September was a welcomed relief in Motley County. Motley County needs dry, sunny weather to mature cotton to full potential and to harvest. Some fields. The Extension Service in College Station reported in mid-August, Texas cotton prices received by producers averaged 31 cents per pound,

an increase from last year's 28 cents per pound. Would you believe a 37 cent postage stamp costs more today than a pound of cotton?!

Motley County National Weather Service Volunteers officially reported the total rainfall for September:





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
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Poverty





Hanging Ghosts Squish a wad of toilet paper or tissues together to form a small ball about the size of a golf ball. Place the ball in the middle of a white tissue. Gather the tissue around the ball and tie a string around it. When you turn add features. Leave these trash bag it a side down the hanging part of the front leaves into giant, heavy-duty trash bags. You can create a different pumpkin to resemble each member of the family, and place the pumpkins on top of the haystack. Variations on pumpkin decorations can include yarn for hair, cotton balls for beards, hair bows, and ribbons.

Milk Jug Creatures

Plastic milk jugs make great Hal-loween creatures. To make these, be sure to first thoroughly wash out the milk jug and let it dry. Turn the milk carton upside down, so it takes on the shape of a square. Use paint or construction paper to cover the milk carton with a desired color. Paint or glue on facial features, hair, nuts and

bolts, for Frankenstein, etc. Attach a string or ribbon to the bottom of the jug (since the jug is turned upside down, the "bottom" of the jug is now on top). Hang the character.





The USDA has released a new pear variety. The U.S. pear industry only has four major pear varieties. "Blake's Pride" is trying to make its way into number five. "Blake's Pride" ripens 10 to 14 days after the widely grown "Bartlett" variety. Budwood of "Blake's Pride" is available free to nurseries.

E. COLI CONTAMINATION COULD BECOME NIL

USDA scientists are developing an automated food safety inspection system for preventing E. con in truits. E. coli can infect people who drink contaminated and unpasteurized cider or juices. "Machine-vision" detects contamination that the human eye cannot see. This on-line system would direct a camera to take three spectral images of each fruit through different color filters. A computer would then analyze the spectral images to detect the telltale signatures of fecal contamination, fungi, rot and other diseases. Chances of fecal bacteria contaminating fresh produce or fruit juices could be nearly zero when fruit and produce-packing plants implement this system. Researchers are starting with apples, but they expect the system to work with all fruits and produce.

NEW LIVESTOCK COMPENSATION PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to provide approximately \$752 million in (LCP) assistance. In order for a county to be eligible, the county must be designated a primary disaster area for drought in 2001 or 2002. In 2001 Motley County was designated a "contiguous" county, but not a primary" county. The request for a "primary" designation for 2002 has been sent to Washington. If approved, we can start taking applications and you will be notified immediately. There has been no final date year. announced to sign up for this pro-

This program provides direct payments, per head to producers who suffered livestock losses as a result of severe drought conditions. Eligibility for LCP is not a pasture loss issue, but rather a livestock loss program that provides financial assistance to farmers and ranchers who would otherwise have no opportunity for loss compensation. LCP provides assistance to eligible livestock producers who owned livestock for at least 90 days as of June 1, 2002. Livestock meeting these requirements 1, 2002, and prior to LCP sign-up proved contracts

would still be eligible for payment.

Eligible livestock are beef, dairy cattle, sheep, and goats. However, swine, poultry, equine animals, live-stock owned by meat packers or commercial feedlot operations, livestock kept for recreation, cattle that weigh less than 500 pounds on June 1, 2002, purchased or born after June 1, 2002, livestock that were sold or died before June 1, 2002, are ineligible for this program.

There is a \$40,000 payment limitation per "person" and qualifying gross revenue of \$2.5 million or less per "person" for the preceding tax

This program is 50 percent larger than any of the previous livestock assistance programs paying on a per head bases and not prorated for herd liquidation.

Verifiable livestock records must be available for spot check.
