PLANS TO ERADICATE COYOTES

Mr. C. R. Landon, who is connected with the Biological Survey, a department of the United States Department of Agriculture, was in Matador one day last week conferring with a number of ranch men and farmers and the County Agent in regard to putting on a coyote eradication campaign. A number of parties were interviewed and all expressed themselves as interested and anxious for such work to be done in Motley County. The plan is for the poison to be purchased in large lots by the agency, to be determined later, and then distributed to the farmers and ranchmen for putting out. Mr. Landon will give demonstrations in the proper placing of the poisoned baits. A great deal of this type of work is being done in other parts of Texas and excellent results are being obtained. If Motley County is ever to accomplish much in the way of turkey and poultry production we must get rid of the wolves. Any one interested in this matter should see the commissioner from their precinct or the county Agent.

ECONOMICAL USES OF MEAT IN THE HOME

(By Laurie Browning)
Because meat is an important part of the diet and because meat is more expensive than other food, it is a problem of the housewife, or the cook to buy and prepare meat dishes. Care should be taken in buying meat in order to get good cuts at the lowest price possible; too, meat should be cooked in such a way as to retain all of its food value.

The best way of reducing the expense of meat in the diet is as follows: Take advantage of the best markets, serve smaller portions than usual, and attend to the use of meat, bones, and fat.

Many people say that Americans kill themselves by eating too much meat. This should be avoided, and other foods should be eaten that give us nitrogenous materials. The main value of meat is nitrogenous materials and eggs, milk, and cheese should be substituted for meat.

It is advisable to buy meat in large quantities if possible, thus reducing the cost.

Meat pie or meat served with dumplings is a good way of giving the meat flavor to a large quantity of food. Also, rice, hominy, or mashed potatoes may be served with starchy foods.

Meats may be served with salads or with eggs. In this way we might use and scraps or left overs of the meat, and as a result have an inexpensive but good dish.

One of the best ways of practicing economical uses of meat in the home is the utilizing of the cheaper cuts of meat. The greatest difficulties are toughness and lack of flavor.

Often by pouring or chopping the meat it is helped, because this helps to break the muscle fibers. In pounding meat, flour can be pounded into it, this catches and retains all juices.

As for the flavor, it depends entirely upon the cooking. The surface may be seared before being cooked, thus holding in the flavors it contains. After searing, meat can be cooked at a low temperature, and the result will be a good flavor for the meat.

Meat may be soaked or cooked with vinegar, this gives a good flavor and has a tendency to make the meat tender.

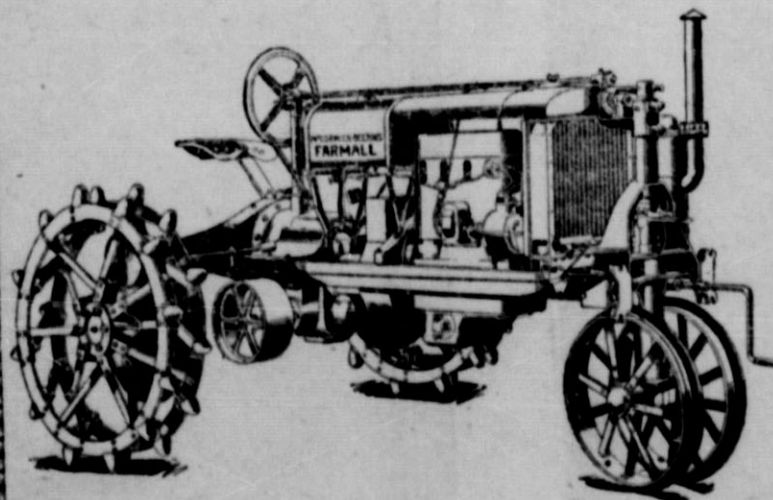

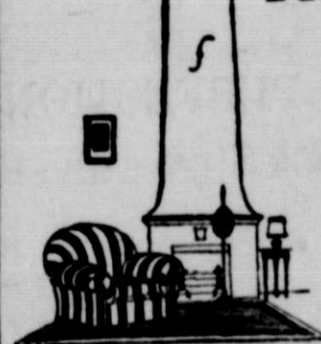

About Your Health
Things You Should Know



by John Joseph Gaines, M. D.

"COLITIS"

Most every one knows the location and general outline of the great sewer of the body. Colitis is defined as "any disturbance of the secretion or innervation in the colon." It is not necessarily inflammatory. Displacements or sagging of the colon may be a partial cause, and overloading contributes to the ugly process. Protracted errors of diet are probably the most real source, and these errors, if known, may be avoided. I have seen chronic colitis intensified by surgical operations in the abdomen, leaving the patient wondering why she didn't get entirely well—the operator apparently overlooking the complication. And, too much, even of the right kind of nourishment, will keep colitis active.

Diet is all that may be suggested here. Swallow no fibers, skins, or seeds. Fibers may be animal or vegetable; tough meats, fried steaks, celery, radish, or hard, raw fruits,—abandon them. Skins of grapes, baked apples, prunes, cherries, tomatoes—all harmful. Seeds of blackberries, raspberries, and pies made of those berries—avoid them. It is well also, to exclude dressings, such as are served with baked fowl, and sharp, peppery condiments. Do not use irritating cathartics, unless you would keep the smouldering fire burning. Use boiled or stewed meats and vegetables; stewed fruits are better than raw fruits, though citrus fruit-juices are advisable for the nerves. Soft cereal with cream, butter and toast are excellent. Eggs too. Brown bread and not white bread, should be eaten. If you are over-stout, cut your dietary in half until you reduce. Buttermilk is most valuable—sweet milk is objectionable, unless ordered by your physician. The treatment of colitis may involve many months.

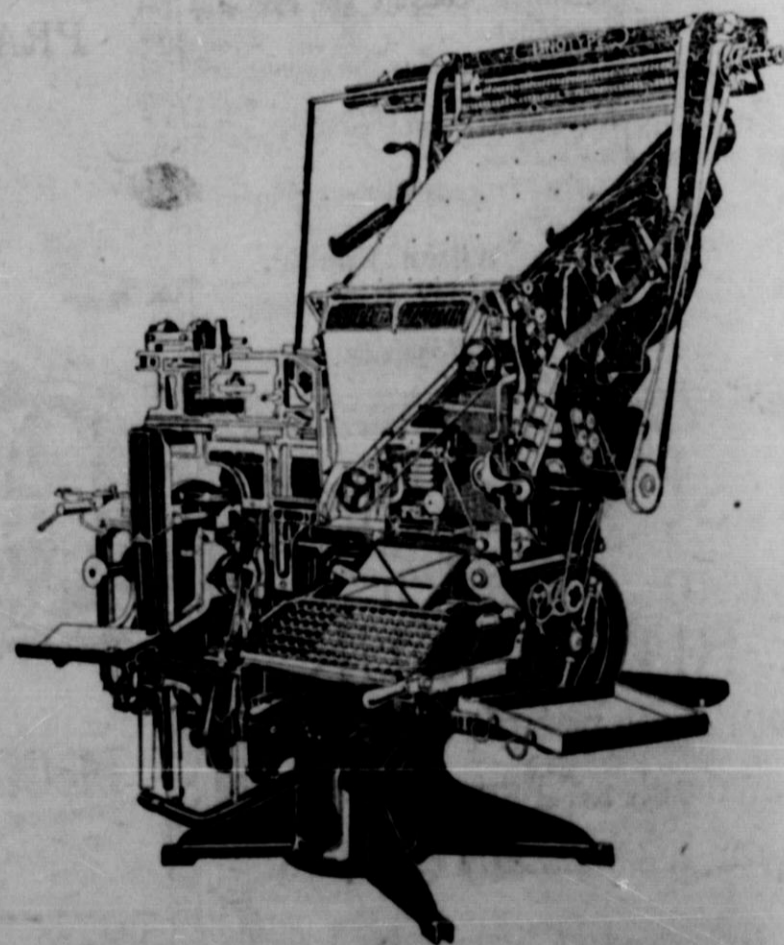
