That's better than in old days, before the French Revolution, when miserable peasants watched deer eat their crops and wild deer eat their crops and whip-boars root up their gardens, help-less because noblemen wanted the pleasure of killing those animals and would not let the peasants touch them.

That is one of many things that brought on the French Revolu tion. To avoid revolutions, make the masses contented. Give them something to live for.

That is done here by manufac-urers of radio apparatus, automo-illes, moving pictures. The fact that a revolution might break up the movies, and disturb the broad-casting stations, would make the


